As we promised, this month's article is about hairdos and headgear from 1928 thru 1931.

Women wore their hair very close to the head, It might be permanent-waved or marcelled, although the close corrugations weren't as obvicus as they has been several years before. Hair was usually bobbed and shingled but was sometimes worn long, in a knot at the back of the neck.

Men's hair was a far cry from the "crew cut" of today. It was worn long and the wavier the better! A middle or close-to-middle part in the hair was common.

Women's hat, were deeply crowned - a hold-over from the twenties. In 1930, hats began to be smaller and were often worn tipped over one eye. As for men - hats were definitely "in". Caps were good with sports clothes; derbies, homburgs with suits, and opera hats for evening and dress-Straw hats might be copies of felt hats, or flat boaters, always with a higher crown than we are now used to.

With a new Model A year starting, let's work up more interest in fashions of this period. You can find all sorts of treasures at swap meets, put them together as an outfit, and be in style for the next club activity. So let's get ourselves, the kide, and (hardest of all sometimes) our husbands, looking as authentic as our A's.


