

SOME FADS AND FASHIONS

This month's fashion column is taken from an article by Lois Rather in The November-December 1963 Restorer.

PAJAFA PARTIES... Rather grimly the editor of Collier's commented on current fashion in January 1930:

Pajamas are stepping out. They're quite the thing for the beach at gay resorts, of course, and now they're dining at the homes of Hollywood stars. What next?

The evidence which brought forth this dim comment was a signed article by Ina Claire, lovely motion picture actress and stage star then married to Jack Gilbert, idol of the screen. She divulged that she and her husband often entertained at their Hollywood pool informally, recommending bathing suits and lounging pajamas as alternate attire. "When I came through Paris," she wrote, "I indulged in a regular orgy of buying lounging pajamas." She especially noted a suit of sapphire blue velvet, another of shantung with straight loose trousers and double-breasted coat, one with very full legs, another of formal white satin, and a delectable number of pink satin with chiffon coat edged in fur.

The Ladies Home Journal stamped its approval on this informal mode by assuring its readers in October 1929 that "the lounging pajama may be distinctly feminine, even picturesque." They showed sample patterns with straight, full trousers and long over-jackets.

By November of 1930 ladies' pajamas were "delightfully piquant" for the hostess, and might boast ruffles of contrasting color on the flaring pants, called "legs" for more delicacy. Innsingwear advanced

from showing rayon and cotton knit bloomers and teddies, to advertise rayon sleeping and lounging ensembles, with "witchery in their stitchery."

By lay 1931, pajamas were common at the beach, now with legs belled like twin skirts and low-cut backs. "Every girl needs lounging pajamas," was the Christmas suggestion of Good Housekeeping in 1931, and even Sears, Roebuck in that year advertised pajama ensembles of run-resistant knit rayon, vat-dyed cottom print with extra-vide trousers, lustrous rayon-and-cotton flat crepe in pastel shades ("adorable for sleeping or lounging wear"), cotton pongette, or washproof crinkle crepe.

As they said, "Delectable" !

TECH TIPS by Jim Buford

For the perfectionist who has spark plug rusting problems: Often vintage production of spark plugs, though new and unused, have developed rust from "shelf wear", and while wire brushing will remove the rust, likewise so does it remove the manufacturer's "blueing"; the result being that rust will re-occur while in use. Painting, of course, is not the answer, as it removes from originality. The answer is a trip to a gun or sporting goods store, and about a dollar of coet.

Purchase a bottle of "do-it-yourself" gun blueing, and follow the simple directions on the bottle. It is, in short, a chemical dipping process. The results are amazing. The plugs finish out a dull, original blue-black color, and have a permanent rust-proof coating.

The lodel A fan belt can be purchased from many suppliers. Have you ever had one go bad on the road, and find that the nearest filling station does not have one in stock? Host stations that stock belts probably have a belt that will fit the A, but it is not listed as such. The Chevrolet belt for years '39-'48 inclusive, and the Willys belt '37-'46 inclusive, and the Hodel A '28-'31 belts are the same. If you are looking through Gates belts, the Gates Vulco 700 will fit.
