



NUTS AND BOLTS by Maynard Grunklee

Recently, Tom McCahill, who writes for Mechanix Illistrated tested a 1928 Model A Ford. This will note some of the highlights of that article, if you didn't read it. This car sold for \$585 because it sported a few custom extras.

The Model A was the first car to use safty glass windshields as standard equipment. Model a engines were rated at 40 horse-power, about double that of the T's. The spring used is called a Transverse-leaf type, both front and rear, which incidently Ford used until 1949. The Model A was the first Ford to come in the color other than black. The Ford was guaranteed 65 MPH top speed, more or less as it came off the show-room floor, even better with a good tail wind.
