NUTS AND BOLTS by Haynard Grunklee

Here is a reprint from a previous issue of Restorer, which you may have lost.

RESTORING AND PAINTING THE MODEL A ENGINE 1--Engine block and head painted Ford engine green onamel, light or dark. Radiator goose nock painted Ford engine green. Water pum p housing painted Ford engine green. Water roturn pipe, lower part with radiator drain plug, painted black enamel. 2--Distributor body, carburetor, fan starter, generator, oil roturn pipe, oil pan, painted black enamel. Pan bolts cadmium plated. 3--Stud bolts blue steel. Head bolts and watwe pump housing bolts cadmium plated. 4--Exhaust manifold natural cast finish, not painted. Intake manifold painted black enamel. All nuts and bolts holding exhaust manifold cadmium plated. 5--Radiator painted with special black paint (available at radiator shops). Radiator hoses black. Hose clamps are split type. 6--Accelerator assembly black emamel. Accelerator arm button (that screws onto cadmium plated arm) either black enamel or cad plated. 7--Gas and vacuum lines steel. Cast iron filter bowl on 1928 and 1929 cars black onamol. For above, lacquer paints not recommended.

1--Carburetor fittings, idling needle valve, idling jet, fuel screen and compensating jet, all brass. Air shutter plate cad plated. Main jet kower plug brass or steel. Main carburetor belt cad plated. Make of carburetor: Zenith.

2--Spark and throttle rads cad plated.

3--Starter switch cad plated.

4-- Dip stick painted black or cad plated.

6--Firewall same color as body.

6--Breather tube black. Oil filler cap

black or cad plated.

7--Gonerator pulley black. Cutout cad plated.

8--Crank pulley black.

9--Timming goar cover bolts cad plate or engine green.

10 -- Steering gear housing black.

11--Electrical bulb at bottom of steering gear housing cad plated.

12== Radiator support rods black.

13--Terminal box black, ½-wing nuts brass.

14--Ford coil black enamel.

15--Spark adjusting leads cad plated.

16--Water pump shaft steel. Packing nut: 1928-29 brass, 1930-31 cad plated.
17--Wire loom clip (on bottom goose neck)

17--Wire loom clip (on bottom goose neck) black enamel.

18--Spark plug bases gun-metal black.

19--Choke rod cad plated.

20--Ignition armored cable to distributor painted black enamel.

(oh yes, Note to Paul Kagel----We have your trophy. HA..HA.




