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TECHNICALLY SPEAKING

I've come across a way of preventing the leaking took at the head gasket. I can't say that it works, but it's a possibility.

The metal used in the head gaskets is different than the cast iron head and block so electrolysis sets in and the oxidation gives the appearance of a leak.

To start with, brush some engine enamel (¼ to ½" wide) on the outed edges of the block and head. Then spray the head gasket with aluminum or silver enamel just before assembly. These enameled surfaces will seal the metal and reduce corrosion. Good Luck!

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
