On Saturday morning the Boefs, Saezs, Dunlops, Sales, Antonaccis, Earlys, Martins, Krists, and Douglassos left from the Pancake House in Orange County for the 75-mile drive to the Rim of the World. the trip was very uneventful except for the breakdown of one of the automobiles. The Dunlops traveled independently in their 1931 pickup and the Saezs arrived later in their 1931 coupe. The Sales took their 1928 touring car and the Krists took their 1931 sedan on the tour. On the way up the steep grade to the Rim of the World, the late model Thunderbird belonging to the Earlys burned out a transmission and was towed back to Orange County for major repairs on the transmission. Approximately one o'clock the car show began alongside Lake Arrowhead and there were over 35 cars present for judging.

Following a short stay at Lake Arrowhead for lunch the tour around the lake commenced. Besides the car show alongside the lake the participants were also judged in their costuming. 2. Do not register until ready for judging. Dust and buggy windshields will be ignored.
3. STAY WITH YOUR CAR until judging is completed.
4. Enjoy your free passes to Ghost Town.

### JUDGING

1. Each judge may award a top score of 100 points.  
100 points for car plus 100 points for costume (200 points possible).
2. Era clothing will be judged on:
  - a. overall appearance
  - b. major garment
  - c. co-ordinated apparel
3. The scoring is to remain secret. Score sheets remain the property of Orange County Chapter Model A Club.
4. Anyone interfering with or disputing a judge's decision will be disqualified.
