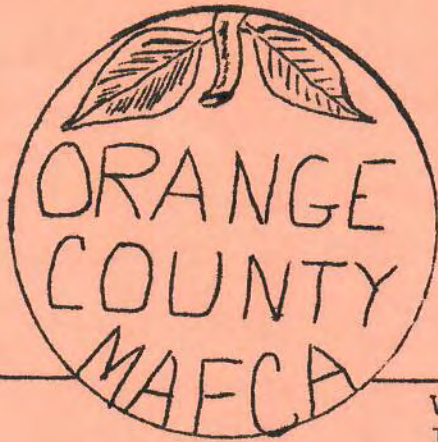


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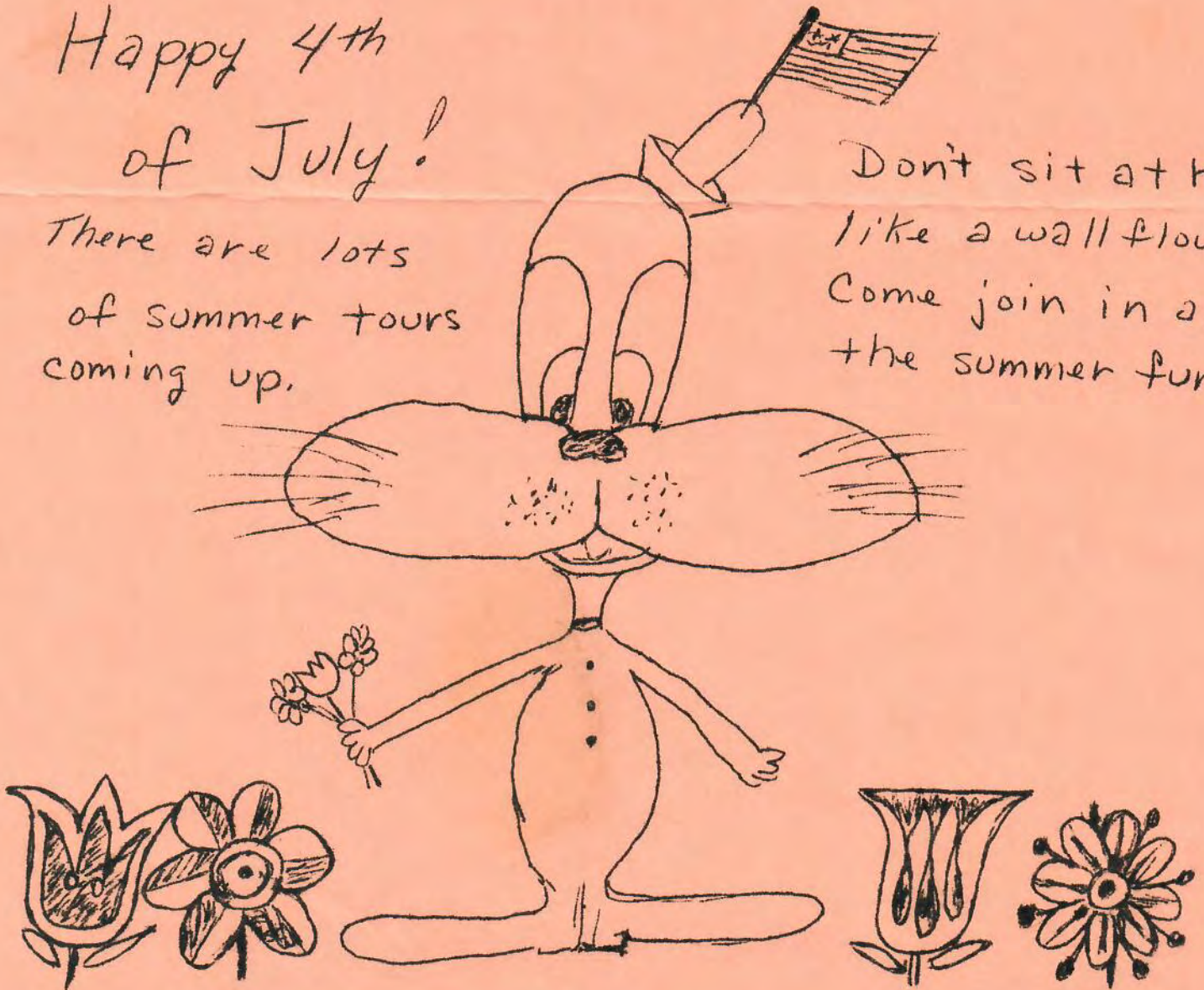

UP YOUR EXHAUST PIPE

This is in part a review of an article written by Andy Baudino approximately five years ago with a few additional helpful hints on restoration of steering column. For longer life of your sector shaft and ease of steering, the housing can be machined out to accommodate inside and outside roller bearings Ford # 68-3576. To keep the grease from coming through the outside bearings, the housing can be machined larger for the press fit of a seal 1 5/8" O.D. and 1 1/4" I.D.

Before inserting the upper bushing of the steering column insert the spark and throttle levers in the bushing, measure approximately 12" down from the top of the lever, mark 2" on either side of this mark and slip a 4" piece of vacuum tubing up the shaft to these marks. If tubing is not available the shaft can be wrapped with 4-5 layers of friction tape. Before sealing the upper bushings be sure to insert the ends of these shafts into their respective positions in the steering column.

This procedure will eliminate the annoying rattle of the throttle and spark levers which usually occurs.

"Fashions and Fancies"



This dress has adopted the ever-flattering diagonal line in bands of pin tucks on the blouse and a pointed yoke and band, from which hangs the new 1930 tunic; the original of deep blue crepe satin, with tucked bands of lighter blue georgette. (Ladies Home Journal, 1930).



The light and dark effect is used in this design which has a simple blouse, hip gathers on the skirt, and a graceful irregular skirt flounce. The original was made of caramel flat crepe, and a deeper shade for the trimming.

The design at left achieves chic through the youthfully blouse waist and circular skirt, and the side-button blouse trimming; collar and cuffs are separate; the original model of this dress was made out of a bottle-green silk, woven with a chevron-like ribbed pattern.

The popular balero theme used in this dress repeats the line in the shaped band which finishes the princess waist and joins the slightly circular skirt to it; a boyish round collar and oddly knotted cravat finish the neck. Made in a fine worsted of brownish gray.

The hats in 1930, according to the Women's Home Companion, were touched by the romantic. Many had jeweled clips, feathers or little net veils. Materials used included velvet, chenille, tweed, caracul, felts and hatter's plush.



The above hat is the 1930 version of the cloche brim. It leaves plenty of room for the hair to show on the left side then tilts down on the right revealing most of the forehead. Felt crown, hatter's plush brim.



This style was known as a bicorne. The one above featured a white felt crown and a turned-up brim of black caracul. The caracul tips on the crown gave a pointed effect which was very new.
