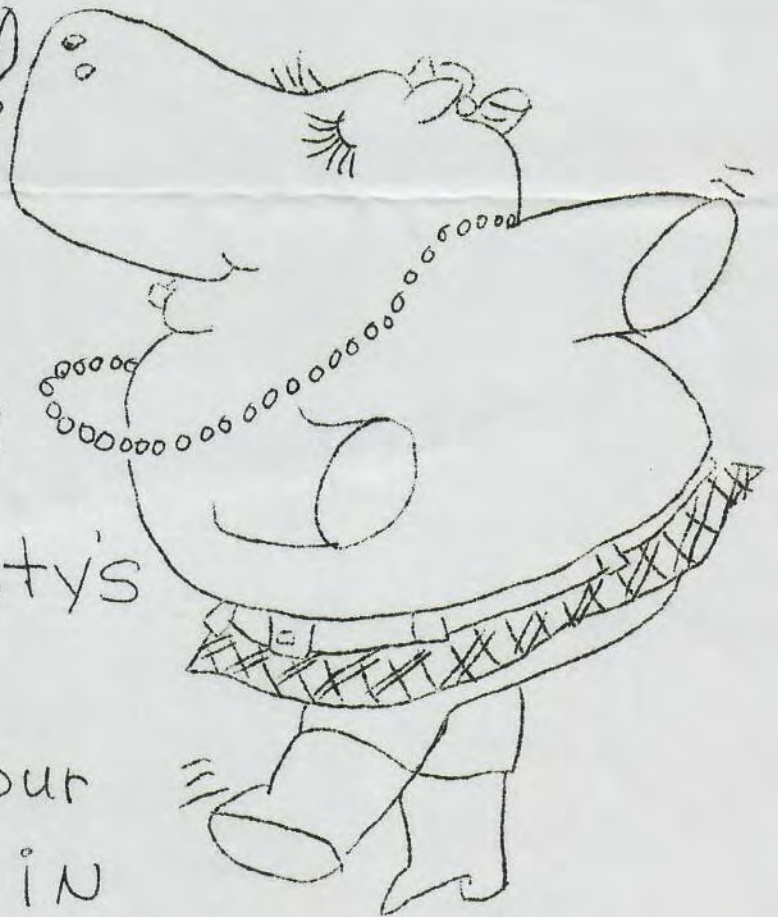

BOARD MEETING MINUTES 10-28-71

The meeting was called to order by Pres . Larry Boef.

The minutes were read and treasurer Vivian Payton reported a balance on hand of \$1816.31.

Lu Saez, Round up chairman said 200 cars registered at this year's event, of these 111 were judged. She said we have 150 dash plaques left. After some discussion it was decided to sell the remaining dash plaques at 10¢ a piece and to purchase a third trophy so the set can be used at one of the clubs future activities.

Lu and Larry told those present at the meeting of the difficulties experienced in planning next years Round-up. Knott's Berry Farm is being sued from an earlier accident involving an antique steam car at one of their meets held there. They originally said no Round-up next year, but after some persuading from Lu and Larry a date was set. But, there will be no parade through Gost Town and a 50% discount at the gate instead of gate pass-

es and ticket books.

Hon Heiland said Emmett Ohlerts house in Hawaii is till available for next years raffle instead of the T.V. The club could furnish the round-trip flight. This was recorded for next years board

Beverly Marsh said this years adult Christmas party should top them all. The Newport Elkd Club is very nice and on the water front. She said bar drinks are 75¢ and Martinis etc are 85¢ . UP YOUR EXHAUST PFPE by Doc Sale

After your car is completely restored and just before the first big car show you'll want to restore you authentic, original license plate. Before removing the paint with a standard lacquer or enamel remover take the plate to your local paint or hardware store to match the paint with their color charts, then immediately buy a spray primer and background color.

After complete paint removal; priming; and sanding spray on an adequate amount of background color and allow to dry for two or three days, Painting the numbers in a contrasting color is the hard part. If your plate is perfectly flat and freed of dents you can run a roller lightly over the numbers and if it is not flat and your have a steady hand you could paint the numbers freehand with a fine brush. If your hand is not steady the only method remaining is a silk screen job which usually requires a professional in that field.
