

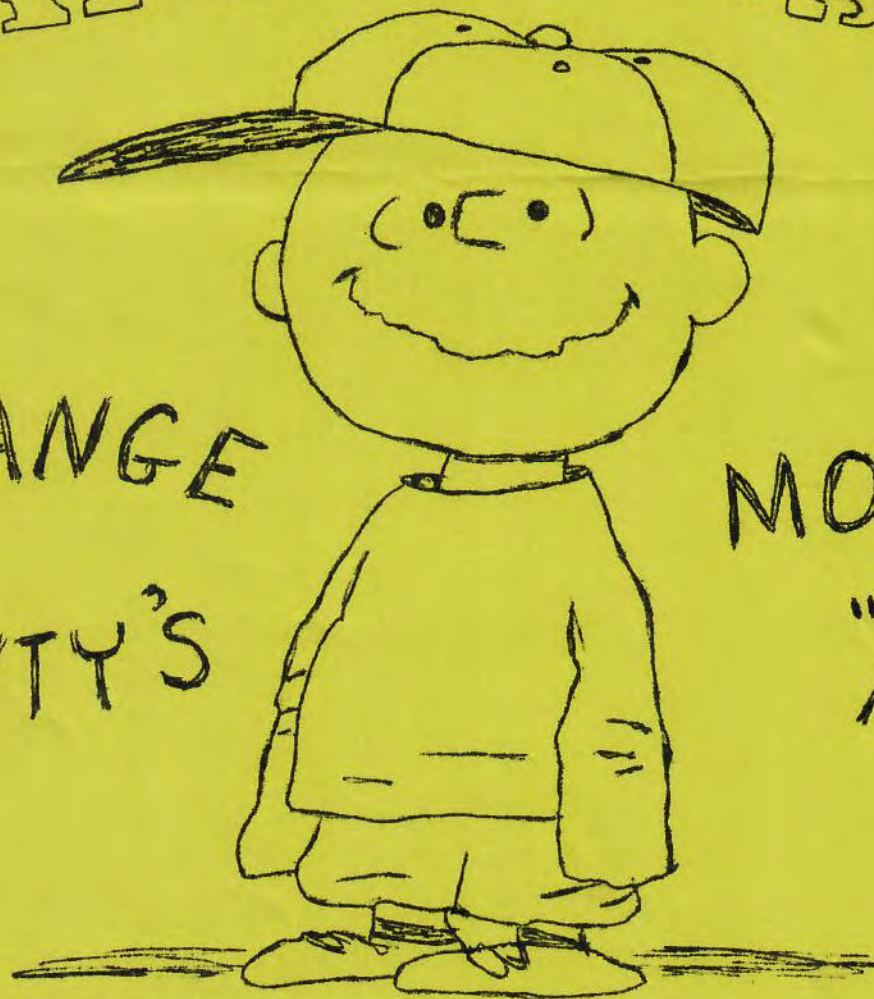

BOARD MEETING MINUTES 9-30-71

Meeting was called to order by President Larry Boef. Minutes were read. Treasurer Vivian Payton reported a balance of \$1101.26. Lu Saez, Round-up Chairman, said there has been \$290 turned in so far for the T.V. raffle. The T.V. cost \$303.40. Lu also said there will be a dinner for the judges as in past years. Also there will be an area set aside for Double A's as was last year. She brought plenty of flyers on the Round-up to be distributed where ever the board decided. She said all was going well and this years Round-up should run smoothly as in the past.

The "goodie bag" packing party will be on Oct. 6th at 7:30 at the Roggenbucks.

A few cases of beer were donated for us to use in our raffles. The Board decided we will use the T.V. raffle tickets after the drawing for the T.V. set. You must be present and be over 21 years old to take home the beer. Rak Krist brought a sample of the flag and bracket he found for approximately \$1.50 if we buy 100 or more. 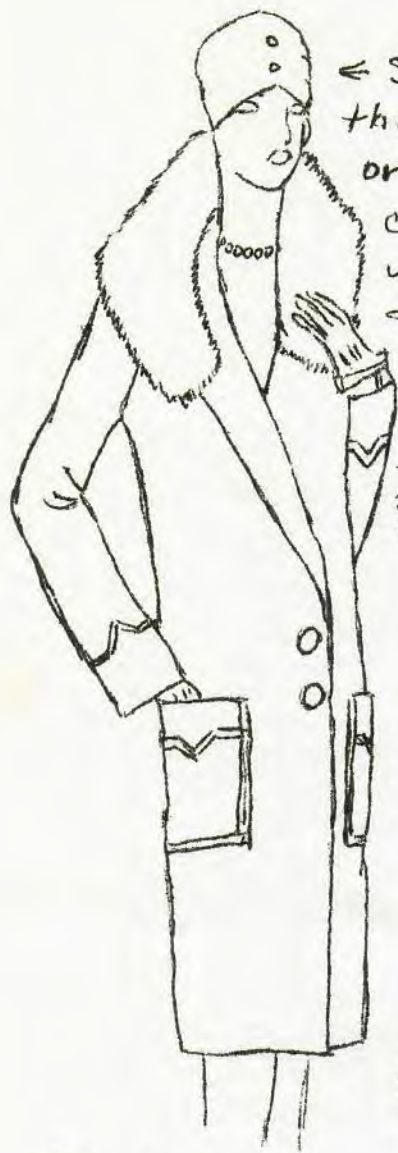

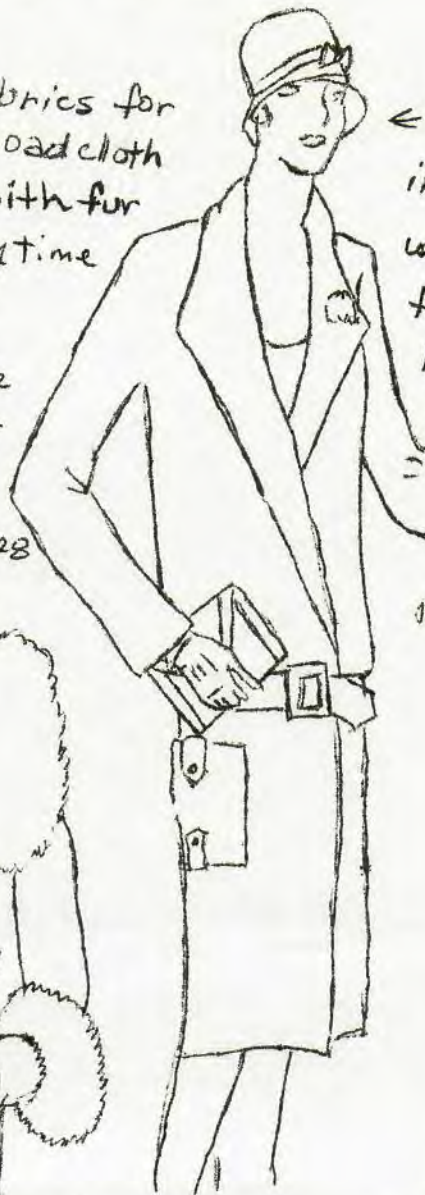
