KEEP A KOOL "A" by Hal Martin, Tech. Adv.

The high tension coil is a part of the ignition system that is very often neglected. This part functions by taking battery voltage and stopping it up to about 9, to 11,000 volts and delivering it to the distributor for firing the cylinders. A common service practice should be put in effect by the owner every time the engine oil is checked by looking closely at the high tension coil outlet and cleaning away any dust or dirt that may have gathered there. The dirt if allowed to accumulate will hold moisture and carry a large amount of current away to ground causing poor or weak spark. If this condition is allowed to continue eventual failure of the coil is certain.

Another common cause of coil failure can be blamed on the pop-out switch. The switch, if not pushed in all the way, until it locks out and the breaker points are closed current will continue to flow causing excessive heat to the coil and discharge to the battery. The pop-out switch, to insure correct current shut off, should be depressed all the way until it pops back into locked position. This way it is sure to be disconnected from battery circuit.


