KEEP A KOOL "A"

Charging Rate and Bulb Burnout

Premature bulb burnout may be caused by high rate of charge from the generator. The average life of a 6 volt bulb is 100 hours with the voltage to the bulb at 6.50 volts. However if the voltage increases to 7.50 volts the bulb life drops to 25 hours average.

The other problem which can cause early bulb burnout is loose connections at the generator cutout or at the battery. The corrosion build up at collection of dust on battery terminals will also cause high resistance to battery causing excessive voltage to the bulbs.

The charge rate in winter may have to be reduced because of cold or cooler electrolyte in battery acting as high series resistance. Reduction of charging rate should be made while checking specific gravity of the battery. If the specific gravity drops rapidly you have lowered the charging rate too much.

Program for Nov. 9, 1972 will be disassembly and inspection for Model "A" generator and points for check.

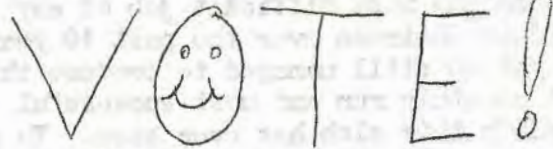
