"Laintainance of shock absorbers"

The hydraulic principle of the Mddel A shock absorber being double action may be adjusted for comfort and safety to match your cars requirements. The following procedures should be followed when adjusting.

The old style shocks require movement of the indicator needle from number one on the pointer to #8 which would be the hardest setting. They came from the factory pre set with pointer on 2 for the front shocks and 3 for the rear. However, after a few years of driving in a fixed setting they may need moving of the needle to get a balance between wear and age. The movement if changed, should not be varied to far beyond factory recommended settings.

The new style shock has a slotted end which is screwed in to increase resistance and unscrewed to decrease resistance of the shock. The new style shock may also be found with a square end instead of a slotted end, however, its adjustment is the same as the slotted varity. The average adjustment on the new style shock during warm weather for the rear is screw needle in until seated then back needle off $\frac{1}{4}$ of a turn. The front shocks do same but back modele off 3/8 turn. During cold weather $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ or 5/8 turn for rear and from 3/8 to 5/8 or 3/4 for front.

The settings can be changed to suit individual preference. Be in for harder and out for easy. Again, so not back off to point where shock is floating.

A good point to check often is all mounting bolts and link bolt. Also check shock tubes or links for any wear and repair or replace shock for it may be frozen or not giving hydraulic action. Follow lube chart suggestions for lubrication on links and arm balls.


