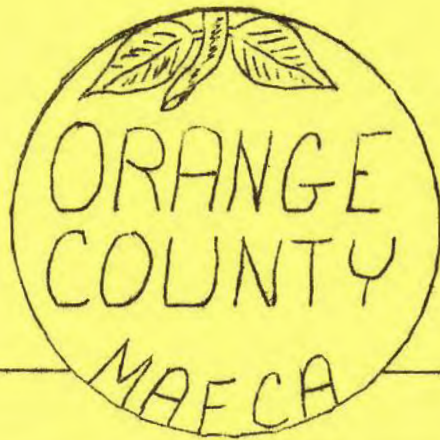

I think everyone enjoyed the Gymkhana and again thank you to ALL those who worked over there too. A special thank you for Maynard Grunklee for making all the arrangements for us to use the Union Bank Building.

Our tour to the Tropico Gold Mine was very interesting and a lot of fun. The drive was very nice and "sneaky" Hal Martin deserves a big thank you for leading us all the way up and all the way back.

On to our next fun filled month of April, another busy one!

On April 15 we hope everyone will come out to the Orange County Raceway for the Antique National Drag Races. Any car having a 1948 or earlier engine can participate in the drag races. Also there is a parade lap, a car show and a speed equipment swap meet for an admission fee of \$3.00 for adults and \$1.00 for kids under 12. An additional \$2.00 entry fee is charged if you race. Anyone participating in the parade lap receives a dash plaque. Bring a picnic lunch and join in the fun. Time trials start at 8 A.M. with the actual races starting around noon.

Also on April 15 we will have our bowling night at Carter Bowl in Fullerton at 1501 S. Lemon which is just north of the Riverside Freeway. The time is 7:30 P.M., the cost is 70¢ per game which probably will be 3 games if everyone holds up and the shoe rental is 25¢.

On April 28 and 29 the Takersfield Chapter is having their annual Heritage Days Parade and Car Show.

On April 29 another full day of activities. In the morning starting at 6 A.M. the Early Times Car Club is having their Swap Meet and Pancake Breakfast at the Cars of the Stars. At 12:30 our own tour will be leaving the Parasol Restaurant in the Orange Mall on Tustin for DePalma's Italian Village south of Corona. For those who have never been there, this is an 8 course authentic Italian meal for about an average of \$5.00 per person. Also in the village there is an Italian

delicatessen, a flea market, a train ride and a petting zoo for the kids and a few other shops. It takes at least 2 hours to eat the 8 course meal but they do have ala carte things, too, including pizza. This is truly a meal you will remember for a-while.

Also on April 29 there is an Antique Auto Modified Auto and Motorcycle Swap Meet plus Antique and Modified Vehicle Show and Sale at the Rose Bowl.

May 6, the Orange County Model T Club is having their annual Swap Meet at the Santa Ana Bowl.

Also on May 6, the Stanton Lions Club is having a charity car show and swap meet. Proceeds will be used for sight conservations, youth groups and the City of Hope that are sponsored by the Stanton Lions. The event is being held at the Los Alamitos Race Track, south parking lot on Katella, from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. Tickets will be sold at the meeting.

Mother's Day, May 13, we are planning a winery tour if the wineries will be open. Larry Boef is taking care of this one. More on this next month.

Our campout this year will be June 16 and 17 at El Lorro Ranch Camp on Hiway 78 just east of Ramona. The rates are \$4.00 per family per night which begins at 4:00 P.M. It is a western style campground with horseback riding at \$2.50 per hour, covered wagon ride, weekend hay rides and square dances, chuck wagon dinner on Saturday night, a 40 X 60 foot swimming pool and a wading pool for little ones, horseshoe pits, hiking and rock hunting, playground area, a juke box for dancing and a big recreation hall. It is minutes from bass fishing at Sutherland Dam Reservoir and San Diego Wild Animal Park. You may bring your dogs if they are kept on leashes. NO mini-bikes or other motorized vehicles are allowed. There are restrooms with hot showers. At the next meeting I will need to take firm reservations with a \$2.00 deposit per family. There is also a general store on the grounds with supplies, ice, etc.

This year we have decided to have a giant beach party on July 22. We are inviting other clubs to participate with us. For a charge of \$2.00 per person, \$1.00 for children, everyone will be able to dig for prizes and have all the corn and watermelon they can eat. It will be at

Doheny State Park as usual.

At our last board meeting it was decided that from now on on each tour, the tour chairman will make a legal safety check on each car before leaving. Make sure your lights are working, your windshield wiper is working, that your tires are driveable, that your brakes work, and that there is a sideview mirror on your car.

Another thing that was decided was that the tour patch will only include club sponsored tours, that is miles for tours set up primarily for our own club activities.
