

Here's a few notes on our "A's"..... The weight of the Model A power plant, including the clutch and transmission, is 475 pounds. The weight of the "T" Ford powerplant was 450 pounds, including the clutch and transmission

The weight of the flywheel is 63 pounds, 4 ounces and it is dynamically balanced to 1/5 the weight of a dime. The weight of the "T" flywheel was 32 pounds and it was not dynamically balanced.

Get ready for another busy but fun-filled month ahead! Our Spring Pancake Breakfast is fast approaching us. The date is March 18 so be sure and mark it on your calendar. At the March meeting I will be asking for volunteers to help with this event. The success of the Breakfast depends greatly on the co-operation of the membership, so I hope I will be able to count on each and everyone of you. There will be a Gymkhana following the Breakfast from 10 A.M. till 2 P.M. at the Union Bank Building Parking Lot Upper Level. There will be awards given so come and join in the fun.

I found an open weekend in March, the 25th, so I decided to plan a tour to the Tropico Gold Mine in Rosamond. For a mere admission price of \$2.00 for adults and \$1.25 for children (5 through 11) you get a tour of the Gold Mine and Mill which includes a personally guided tour inside (underground) the Tropico Gold Mine

to see the main mine shaft, (900 feet deep) open stopes, mine skip and unmined deposits of gold ore; a journey through the entire Gold Extraction Mill where millions of dollars worth of gold and silver were separated from ore; and a visit to the Mine Museum to see mining equipment and artifacts. Also included in the admission price you can browse around in the Tropico Goldcamp and the Goldcamp Museum. In the Goldcamp are authentic Antelope Valley buildings furnished in the manner of the 1800's, historic memorabilia, artifacts of mining and Indian lore. In the museum there is a display of gold nuggets as well as thousands of items of historic and enduring interest. While we are there we may as well have a short tour through the Wildflowers which I understand will be a bumper crop this year. I think this will be an interesting as well as an enjoyable day. The tour will leave the Parasol Restaurant in the Orange Mall on Tustin Ave. promptly at 7:30 A.M. Please read your tour rules and come prepared to leave on time. If you don't have a copy of the tour rules they will be available at the next meeting. (They are also printed in this issue of the paper - Ed.). Also bring a picnic lunch and we will stop at a park along the way.

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
ON THE CUFF
