





THINGS YOU AUTO KNOW

In 1934 Eastern Airlines was owned jointly by General Motors Corp. and North American Aviation.

In 1920 Chevrolet produced a one ton truck called the Model T.

The first car with four wheel brakes was a Rickenbacker.

The U.S. Post Office was the first governmental agency to use motorized transportation. It was experimenting with small collection trucks as carsy as 1899.

In Colorado Springs the post office is still using a few Model A's.

The Bantam car company of Butler, Penn., not Willys, orignated and designed the first U.S. Jeep in 1938. Their Jeep #1 is in the Smithsonian Institution on display.

Henry Ford wanted an eight oylindor

engine in the Model A. He had one developed. It was a X eight four cylinder up and four down, had 286 cubic inches displacement. Failure was due to the four from early roads causing many problems.

The first Model A was built on Friday Oct. 21, 1927. It was a tudor sedan. At a later date 5-31-28 Henry had the engine no. 1 removed and placed it in a phaeton to be used by his good friend Thomas Edison. It is now in Greenfield Village.

Rumors were that the new Ford would be called Edison other rumors were it would be called Linford as a combination of Lincoln and Ford. When it finally arrived it was just plain Model A.

A tip for Model A owners:

Use chassis lubricant in your Model A water pump fittings. Never use the new style water pump lubricant as any surplus lubricant forced into the cooling system may lodge in the radiator tubes causing the engine to overheat. Chassis lubricant will melt when it gets hot causing no blockage.

RESTORATION HINT

If you are ready to mount your model A body back on the chassis you will be needing new rubber pads that go between the wood blocks and the frame. There is a company in Irvine called the Accro Gasket Co. They make gaskets out of black newprene 1/8" and 1/4" thick. You can buy scraps of this black nooprone by the pound and, using your orginals as patterns, make new pads for your car. The Accro Gasket Co. is located at 17365 Daimber St. in Irvine shich is 2 blocks north of Mac Arthur Blvd. and 2 blocks west of Rodhill.
