DID YOU KNOW THIS?

The Model A Ford Club of America was founded in the city of Glendale, Calif. in September of 1957. This official date was preceded however by a date of Oct. 1955 when a small group formed in Los Angeles to organize a club called the Model A Restorers Club of Southern Calif.

In May of 1956, the "Restorer" appeared and it's dissemination caused much national interest in the club. The club, by necessity, was reorganized and renamed in 1957 with provisions for the affilliation of other Model A Clubs and chapters.

The Jan-Feb national directory now lists 208 chapters. The Model A Ford Club of America is a non-profit corporation of Calif. and a national historical society dedicated to the restoration and preservation of the Model A Ford automobile as manufactured from 1928 through 1931. It is said to be the largest car club in the world devoted to one make of automobile.

WHO STARTED ALL THIS, ANYWAY?

The Orange County Chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America was founded in Orange, Calif. in Aug. of 1961. Two charter members and their wives are still active in our club. They are, Bill and Penny Vaughn and Joe and Betty Eatherton. Early meetings were held at a variety of places including the Izaak Walton Clubhouse in Santa Ana. In 1972 the growing club moved to South Jr. Hi and finally to Trident Jr. Hi in Anaheim.

Occasionally we must meet at Hart Park in Orange when the school uses the rec. room for other purposes.

THE CLUB HAS PROSPERED

According to the 1979 roster of members, we had 92 paid memberships plus even more members who joined since the original printing. These people, combined with their children, who often attend meetings and activities, total over 200 members and family. That is a good sized club. Of course all members are not necessarily active all of the time. We are happy to see people turn out for tours, meetings, seminars and especially the car shows that support our club so well.
