Both backup vans had heating problems and while one went on to catch up to the group, the other suffered a 6 hour delay in beautiful, downtown Mojave for radiator repairs. The good news was that the van was carrying all of Johnson's lunches, so we eagerly scarfed them down during our wait in the hot, windy afternoon outside of Bud's Garage.

The tour spent the night in Leevining, which is north of Bishop on 395, and leaving about 7:30 A.M., made the trip into Reno in a little under 5 hours.

Most of the group set up house-keeping around the pool at the Holiday Inn South, Morgans and Bradts were at the IGN Hotel. Kathy and Lloyd Marcacci and their daughter, Lennie and son-in-law, Bud, joined us for the week and the McNabb's daughter, Julie drove down from Chico for two days.



At 1:30 on Wednesday, there was a parade of 515 Model A's, which looped around Reno and through the downtown section and back to the IGN pre-judging area. At this time, 101 cars were pre-judged and were directed into the ballroom for display and final judging which lasted far into early Thursday morning.

Outside of the pre-judging area, McNabb blew a fuse while checking their headlights. It was due to a shorted out cowl light. Dick McNabb handled it well, didn't even panic. (How can you panic when you are comatose?).

Thursday, the cars were on display and in the evening we enjoyed the cocktail hour, followed by the banquet and awards. The awards were presented a little differently than usual. Chief judge, Tom Moxley, presented the winners and the top 23 cars were driven through the banquet hall by pre-arrangement, stopping in front of the head table for pictures and to be handed the trophy by the winners of the Miss Model A contest. 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RAK Krist was almost kidnapped recently on his vacation to Michigan. While he was walking down the main street, he heard one girl say to another, "get him!".



With it she might wear a wool tweed coat with a full shawl raccoon collar. The big news in women's and older teen's coats that year was the cuff interest. They were large and buttoned or covered with fur.

A younger girl might wear a one-piece suspender dress with a jersey yoke and upper sleeve.

Boys were wearing an all wool ensemble with short trousers and flap pockets. The all wool coat had broad lines, large, roomy pockets and raglan sleeves.

Popular songs of the day were: Choo-Choo by Paul Whiteman's orchestra, Dancing in the Dark, by Jaques Renard's orchestra, Falling in Love, by Naring's Pennsylvanians, and I Found A Million Dollar Baby and I'm Through With Love, sung by Bing Crosby.



Hydraulic fluids for Houdaille Shock absorbers: Contrary to the belief of many Model A owners, the glycerine and alcohol which was recommended during the Model A production era is the least desirable substance for filling the shock. The glycerine base fluids oxidize rapidly and give no corrosion protection.

By today's standards, the best shock absorber fluid for Houdaille shocks, recommended by hydraulic oil experts, is SAE 20 transmission and axle lubricant. The oil base fluid has a SAE 50 viscosity and can withstand extreme pressure, does not oxidize, and it contains anti-scuff and anti-corrosion additives.

Another recommendation is SAE 50 engine oil. This oil has similar qualities and better cold test characteristics, but is not as readily available.
