

PUMPKIN BREAD

1/3 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 cup mashed pumpkin
1/3 cup water
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1-2/3 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon ginger

Cream together shortening and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in pumpkin. Sift together dry ingredients and add alternatively with water. Stir in vanilla and nuts. Turn batter into a greased 9x5x3 inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until done. (May need longer time). Yield: One loaf.

SALTED PUMPKIN SEEDS

Wash pulp from seeds and soak up excess water with paper towels. Seeds should be quite damp. Place seeds on jelly roll pan, salt to taste and put in oven for 30-45 minutes at 250 degrees. Turn seeds often until golden brown.




On Sunday, Oct. 5, there will be a tour to San Bernardino to the Annual Paradise Valley MAFCA Club's bar-b-que and gymkhana.


raffle tickets at the Round-Up.


