Motor Oils

Motor oils are classified on the basis of both measured performance and viscosity. The number value assigned to the oil is an indication of relative viscosity. The letters indicate performance

grade. Changes in classification occur from time to time as oils are modified and improved to suit more sophisticated and demanding engines. The system is called the API Engine Service Classification System.

This ranking, which was approved for industry wide use in 1970, divides motor oils into two general categories and a number of subcategories. The two general categories are labeled S and C. S grouping includes oils required for normal passenger-car, gasoline engine applications. The C grouping includes oils for diesel engines and heavy load applications. The S grouping is subdivided as in the following: SA; This classification, which was formerly for utility gasoline and diesel engine service, is now used to describe an oil that has no performance requirements and is intended for use in older engines operating under mild conditions such that the protection afforded by compound oils is not required. These oils should only be used when specifically recommended by the equipment manufacturer.

Oil (continued)
SB; Oils designed for this service have been used since 1930's and only anti-scuff capability and resistance to oil oxidation and bearing corrosion. They are intended for older gasoline engines operating under mild conditions. They should only be used when specifically recommended by the equipment manufacturer.

SC; This grade was recommended for many 164-67 gasoline engine vehicles. These oils provide control of high and low temperature deposits, wear, rust, and corresion.

SD: These oils were compounded for use in most 1968-70 gasoline engine vehicles. They also may apply to certain 71 or later models; when recommended by the manufacturer. These oils provide a higher level of protection than SC.

SE: These oils were recommended for use in most 1971 through 1980 automobiles. They provide the same type of protection as SC and SD. but to a greater degree.

SF: These oils were first compounded for use in 1980 automobiles. differ from SE oils in that they provide increased oxidation stability and improved anti-wear performance. They also provide protection against engine deposits and corrosion. They can be used where categories SC. SD, or SE would be used. The SAE viscosity designations 5w, 10w, 20w, 20, 30, 40, or 50 refer to the oil at a specified temperature. The higher the number, the thicker the oil. The W stands for winter and is used to indicate oils. by Lou Spielberger, From Motor Tech, Summer 1982
