
FEBRUARY MEETING

ROUNDUP REPORT by Jerry Sterling 586-8469





THOUGHTS ON THE ROUNDUP by Glenn Johnson

1971 was the first time my family and I participated in the Model A Roundup at Knotts Berry Farm. Over 200 Model A's showed up that Roundup morning and, as the line of cars at the registration tables grew longer, the sky grew darker. About 10 AM it started raining and poured for about an hour. We all waited out the storm and then continued one of the best Roundups ever. In those years the Roundup was held on the West side of Beach Blvd. in the tree shaded lot North of the gift shop and the Cable Car Kitchen. Knotts hospitality was great. They gave us free ride tickets and even let us use the covered wagon circle for the trophy and door prize presentations. However, times were already changing. 1971 was the first year we were not allowed to have the Model A parade through Ghost Town. A Stanley Steamer exploded during a previous parade that year and Knotts decided no more cars in Ghost Town.


As Knotts became more of a big business, the Roundup continued to change. They moved us to various locations on the East side of Beach Blvd. and in 1976 told us we would have to buy \$1000. worth of admission tickets to the park before they would let us use their parking lot. We moved the Roundup that year to the Movie Land Wax Museum and, the following year, to the Orange Town and Country shopping center. WHAT A MISTAKE! Attendance fell to less than 60 cars and we all discussed, argued and voted about how to get the Roundup back on its feet again. In 1978, we decided to bite the bullet, buy the \$1000 worth of tickets, and move the Roundup back to Knotts. Attendance doubled the two previous years. Everyone had a terrific time and the Club made a profit.

Well, times are changing again. As of this year Knotts is no longer allowing any car related events in their parking lot. At the February meeting we heard two very well researched proposals for the 1985 Roundup (The Queen Mary and Lion Country). The cost of either place is around \$2000.00 and the break even point at \$20 per car is 100 cars. Roundup attendance has been slipping for some time to less than 100 cars at Knotts last year. Attracting 100 cars to a Roundup at a new location is going to be very

difficult and possibly an expensive mistake. We also heard at the Feb. meeting that our main source of income, the Buena Park Mall car show, has been canceled this year. CAN WE AFFORD TO TAKE A \$2000. ROUNDUP GAMBLE? Maybe it is time we asked ourselves if the Roundup as we all know and love it has become old hat (PUN) and is due for some major changes. Our Club is great fun but I believe it must be run with some business sense. Any businessman knows that when a part of his business becomes a financial drain, it must be changed or eliminated before it drags the whole company down. The Roundup needs some sparkle to increase attendance, and a less expensive location to lessen the financial gamble. I've thought of a few possibilities that I plan to submit to the board at the Feb. meeting. If you have an idea, tell Jerry Sterling or someone else on the board. We can't afford to gamble on the same old event if we don't have another source of income. I love the Roundup but it seems to be oping down the same drain as the Griswold's Car Show.






