



DEATH VALLEY TOUR

On Thursday Jan 22 Hahn, Manos, Nesbitt, Osborne, and Wavra, driving Model As, and Girdlestone, Plotkin, and Reed, driving moderns, left for a fascinating weekend in Death Valley. They were joined on Friday by Riha and Justice, driving Model As and Marsh and Dwinger driving moderns.



MODEL A' ING IN DEATH VALLEY

Far from being a desolate hole in the middle of the desert, Death Valley offers much to see and do. On Friday, those who were there drove to ghost town of Rhyolite, Nevada. As we were crossing the border into Nevada, Joe Wavra remarked, "Where are the slot machines?" Would you believe they have machine in Rhyolite! Nothing left but an old depot the renowned bottle house, but they do have a slot It was a real onemachine. armed bandit, too. It took every nickle the group had and didn't give a single one back! Our sharp-eyed Model Aers also spotted a tudor body with no rust spots. anyone feels like building car from scratch, we know where you can get a good body!

The big tour-within-the-tour was a 50 mile drive to "Scotty's Castle" on Saturday. This spanish-style mansion was built from 1924-1931 by a Chicago Millionaire for his winter "vacation home" at cost of 2.5 million dollars. He had to stop work after losing 37 million in the crash of 29 leaving the enormous swimming pool unfinished. Among the fabulous furnishings is a big pipe organ. The property was willed to a religious organization who sold it to the government in 1970 when they could no longer afford the upkeep. We the people of the United States got the property for the bargain price of \$850,000.




ORIGINAL BOTTLE HOUSE "RHYOLITE"

On the way back from "Scotty's Castle" we stopped at the sand dunes of Death Valley. Keith Justice held a miniseminar on desert ecology while we tromped around on the dunes.

We were fascinated with the different kinds of geology represented in the We visited a place called "The Devil's Golf Course" where we walked out onto massive formations made out of rock-solid salt "The Artist's Pallate" mud. rock formation was a out of several different vivid colors greens, golds, purples, reds, and "Mustard Canyon" browns. was a short winding drive through high mustard-colored formations. It reminded me of Knott's Berry Farm Disneyland ride. At a place called BAD WATER we reached the lowest point in the USA. 282 feet below sea level, but there was no problem because Joe Wavra always made us put on our snorkles. We also made a nice walking tour up Golden Canyon with Joe & Marion Wavra.

Several forms of mining were carried out in the valley, but the most successful was the mining of borax. On display at the ruins of the old Harmony Borax Works was an old "twenty mule team wagon" which consisted of two wadons that carried 18 tons of borax each and the third wagon was a huge water tank that supplied the men and animals with water for the 10 day trip over 165 miles of desert to the railroad in Mohave in the 1880s. Two men made the trip, the "driver" on the first wagon and the "swamper" on the second wagon. If they completed their journey without one of the men killing the other, it was considered a good trip!!!



SCOTTY'S CASTLE

There were several tribes of Indians who lived in the valley, but the first white people to enter the valley were a group of emigrants looking for a short cut to the Mother Lode country in 1849. They became lost and had to suffer severe hardships

before some of them were able to make their way out of the desert. Their experience provided the valley with its morbid name.

On Saturday night all 28 of us, including the Porters who arrived in their camper that day, piled into the available moderns to drive the 30 miles to the ghost town of Death Valley Junction for an evening at the Amargosa Opera House. This previously abandoned meeting hall was discovered in 1967 by dancerperformer Marta Becket as she was looking for a place to retire. Her dream was to express her imagination through dance, pantomime, music, and art in a place Her theater of her own. opened in February 1968 and many nights she played to no audience at all. She decided to paint an audience from 16th century Spain on the inside walls. After she completed that in 1972, she painted a huge mural on the ceiling. She now plays to sold-out audiences every Friday, Saturday, and Monday nights. We saw her dance classical ballet and perform a routine called "Comeback Vaudeville" in which she played all the characters through dance, tap dance, and mime. Marta Becket's is open for speculation, but I should have legs like that! When she started in 1968, she rented the theater for \$45.00/month. She now owns the whole ghost town and is in the process of restoring the old hotel.

On Sunday, some of us returned through Mohave. After we climbed out of Death Valley Les Nesbitt learned the hard way that you are supposed to take your car out of overdrive before starting down a 9% On our way to Mojave grade. we stopped in Inyokern for Sunday Brunch at the famous TWO SISTERS Restuarant, all you can eat for 3.95. The sisters both have unbelievable backgrounds. In Mojave we met the Hamptons, McKinneys, Balmers, and McDonalds for a visit to the Voyager aircraft. Would you believe that the two groups arrived in Mohave from opposite directions at exactly the same time! We all arrived home safely, tired but looking forward to our next tour together.



In 1969 I bought a brand new Yellow Ford Fairlane Station Wagon. It was a great practical car and I used it to haul my family, supplies for my business, and Model A parts for eight years. In 1977 I bought a new Van and the Wagon (Old Yellow) was retired to be used occasionally as an extra car or loaned to friends and employees. Old Yellow has suffered more than it's fair share of dents, dings and general abuse over the years but it still runs well and although it's only worth a few dollars it has some sentimental value to me. However, when it was brought to my attention that the Farmers Insurance coverage on Old Yellow was \$600.00 per year I rejuctantly decided that Old Yellow would have to go. Fortunately before someone bought Old Yellow, I had an idea. If my inexpensive antique car insurance covers my car trailer and my Pantera. why not Old Yellow too? We called our agent and sure enough they accepted Old Yellow as part of my collection. Having more than three cars on this policy, the public Liability and public damage coverage is free and the comprehensive coverage is \$.90 per hundred dollars of the car's value. We valued Old Yellow at \$500.00 which adds up to \$4.50 per year instead of \$600.00. Old Yellow will probably never be a classic, but I think I'll keep her forever----just like a few people I've met who still have the Model A they bought new.




