



Map to Glenn Johnson's House




Map to Pieter Dwinger's House



#### **Unange of Club Jacket Color!**


At the May General Meeting the club voted to spend \$450. to program a machine to embroider a four color logo on jackets or other apparel. If you wish to have your jacket or other article embroidered you can take it to the embroidery company and for an estimated \$25. they will embroider your name and logo on the upper left chest area and a large logo on the back.

At the meeting it was stated that the vote had nothing to do with changing the color of the club jacket, but the May issue of *The Distributor* stated that it is also on the agenda. The following is my opinion for your consideration.

I was signing in at the Calgary Canada Meet last July when I heard "Orange County?" It was Doc Ingwerson from Downey. He recognized my orange jacket. Here I was 2,000 miles from home in a foreign country and the Orange County Model a Club was recognized. One of our members told me he was Kingman, Arizona at an antique store wearing his orange jacket when a lady said, "you're from the Orange County Model A Club"! It was Anabel Pope, the wife of past national president George Pope. Large corporations pay untold millions of dollars for this kind of recognition.

I know of no other Model A club with the opportunity to use a color which identifies them. I don't wear my jacket to church or social functions. I only wear it at Model A functions and it serves its purpose of being visible and distinctive. Why throw this away! I have no problem with people wearing other color jackets, vests or other apparel with the club logo, but keep the orange jacket as the official club jacket. Those who want to be different may do so.

It also comes to mind that if the jacket color were changed, all mileage patches would have to be exchanged, removed and reinstalled in addition to the purchase of a new jacket and paying to have it embroidered. If the argument that both colors are reptable the club will have to stock both color purches. The existing stock of club items will be of questionable value. O



You got oil leaking out of the back of the transmission. So what's the big deal? Oil leaks out of the back of everything on a Model A. But there are a couple of ways to fix it. Oil tends to want to leak from the end of the idler gear and cluster gear shafts. The easiest way to fix it without pulling the transmission out of the car is to buy a transmission shaft seal. Some suppliers carry it under part number 7112 and it costs about \$16. This part is a casting that bolts over the end of the shafts where that little cross piece is located that prevents the shafts from rotating. The seal dams up the oil and stops the leak.

If you have the transmission out of the car, there is a better way. The ends of the two shafts can be machined to accept o-rings. There is an excellent article that appeared in the July-August 1985 publication of the Restorer (page 13), by Harold Powers of Scotia, California. Harold explains exactly how to do it and even provides the part number of the o-ring. The problem is you gotta have a lathe and a grinding tool to do the job. Once we had a member of the club here in Orange County who had the capability, the willingness and a whole bag of o-rings. Trouble is he moved to Missoula, Montana and took his lathe and all the o-rings with him. No one has since stepped up and offered to provide the service.

While you have the transmission out it's a good idea to install new front and rear bearings that have a seal on one side. Be sure to face the seal to the outside so that the bearings will receive lubrication from inside the transmission. Your favorite Model A parts place should have them. If not, bearing stores carry them. Ask for an SKF-6208-2RSJ for the front and SKF-6306-2RSJ for the rear. Both bearings have a seal on each side, so you have to pry the seal off of one side before you install them.

But wait! There's one last thing. Make sure you install the front and rear oil baffles correctly. They can go in two ways, right and wrong. Both baffles have an off-set and when installed correctly there should be about a 1/16th of an inch space between the outer edge of the baffle and the bearing.

## Improving the Model A Transmission



At the 20th Northern California Roundup, I assisted Jerry Lema in putting on a transmission seminar. Jerry did the "tear down and build up" phase. Since I am a machinist, I had some machining tips and parts changes that I felt would improve the transmission. Most of the people at the seminar wanted me to write an article and put it in *The Restorer*. SHAFT SEALS

First, I would like to tell you about installing O-rings on the cluster shaft and reverse idler shaft. The reason for installing O-rings on these shafts is because these shafts fit loose in the case and when the transmission gets hot, it seeps oil. The seepage and drips leave a mess.

The part numbers for the O-rings are Victor 72113 or National 622711. The size of the O-ring is  $3/32'' \ge 9/16'' \ge 3/4''$ . You must grind the groove for the O-ring in the shaft because the shaft is too hard to machine. The groove should be ground square, not round like the O-ring. This is per National's specification. The length of the groove is 9/64'' or 1.406. We will call this dimension "A". The bottom of the groove should be .571 or dimension "B". The groove center should be 3/8'' from the part of the shaft that is flush with the case: dimension "C".

Here are two examples of different shafts. Install the Orings on both ends of the cluster shaft.



#### MAIN SHAFT PILOT

The next tip is, if you have a rear main shaft that has been damaged on the pilot end by the pocket bearing going out. Do not worry about buying a new one. I have a fix for that also. Just go to a bearing dealer and purchase two I.R. -981212 Thornington bearing races. The dimension on these

.e: bore - .500-.4996, outside diameter - .7493-.7488. These will fit the standard Model A bearing. Turn down the pilot on the shaft to .5005 and press on both of these races. You then

have a shaft as good as new. When you turn this pilot down, stay approximately 1/8" away from the shoulder and don't machine it square at the shoulder. Leave a small radius. SHAFT BEARINGS

Next, the front and rear bearings. If you are replacing the front and rear ball bearings, go to your bearing dealer and buy double sealed bearings. The reason 1 say double sealed and not single is because it seems to be easier to find the double sealed ones. Be sure they are sealed, not shielded. The part number in a SKF is: front - 6208-2RSJ, rear - 6306-2RSJ. Your dealer can cross reference this to other manufacturers.

When installing these bearings, take a small screwdriver and pop off one seal on each bearing, leaving one seal in place. Next, install with the seal to the outside of the transmission, that is, with the open side to the inside of the case. Make sure you install the original oil slinger on the inside of the bearing. This slinger is easy to install wrong. Be sure it is turned so that the outside of the slinger is away from the outside of the bearing and leaves a gap of about 1/16" at this point for oil to enter the bearing. Otherwise you will have a bearing failure.

The reason for using the sealed bearings is to help prevent the possibility of oil going from the transmission into the clutch or the U-joint.


#### BEARING RETAINER

One more problem I have encountered is the retainer on the front of the input shaft or front shaft of the transmission. This retainer has a problem when you spread it apart to remove it. Most of the time it will not spring back tight when you reinstall it on the shaft. If this retainer comes off of the shaft, it will let the shaft move back into the rear shaft, resulting in damage to the pocket bearing and both shafts.

To improve this condition, I have made a spacer and used a snap ring to retain the bearing. If you have a lathe (or go to a machine shop), make a spacer that is 1.843 outside diameter, 1.576 inside diameter, .435-.437 length. Install this spacer, then a snap ring. The snap ring is Spicer part #21-381-1, available from any Spicer dealer or large truck dealer. 
