


In the twenty plus years that I have been restoring and driving Model A's I've often wondered what oil would be best for the Model A engine. Every Model A owner I asked gave me a different answer so I thought it might be interesting to conduct an oil survey at our own Orange County Club Meeting. Thirty five members responded and here are the results.

If you believe in surveys, use Pennzoil, 30 Weight, Detergent, with no additives, no filter, Babbit bearings, and change it every 500 or 1000 miles. However if something else works well in your Model A, keep using it. Θ



Properly Oiled

One of the more frustrating aspects of working on a Model A is those pesky little cotter pins Henry dealt us. They are tough to remove sometimes. But wait, there's a tool! There really is a tool for removing cotter pins. It looks like an ice pick that had a front end collision. I got one. It's a good quality tool. I'll probably lose it before I ever break it. It has a hardened steel shaft that can be smacked with a hammer once you have the tortured tip of it through the eye of the cotter pin.

Trying to find one is the trick though. I went to a number of tool places looking for one. At the places where the counterman was under 50 he didn't know what I was talking about, nor did he seem to care. I finally found a place where this old crotchety white haired guy knew what I was talking about, but he didn't seem to care much either. But I finally found a place where you can get one. You can buy a U.S. made Mac cotter pin removal tool, part number SP29A from any Mac Tool Dealer. One I know of is John Path at 6451 W. 84th St. Los Angeles. 310-641-3152, 310-790-0123 (pager). Cost is \$12.77 including tax. I spoke with John and he has plenty in stock and would be willing to ship to you. Go get one, you'll like it.

Another tool that is worth having is a brake adjusting wrench. The wrench is a box type with the box part resembling an 8-point star. Some of them have "Ford Brakes" stamped on the side. The box neatly fits the square shank of the brake adjuster at each wheel. Use of this wrench will prevent rounding off the corners of the shank, that is if somebody's grandfather didn't already do it years ago. You can sometimes find these wrenches at swap meets; look for the guys who have boxes full of old rusty Ford wrenches. You have to know what you're looking for though. If you are not sure take an old brake adjuster with you the next time you go to a swap meet to check the fit. If you can find one, you can usually buy it for two or three bucks. Its a good tool to have; it makes it easier to adjust the brakes and you won't have the wrench slipping off while you're trying to do the iob. @



Era Fashions

The fashions shown in this article are typical of 1928. There is a tendency among newcomers into the field of Model A Era Fashion to put together an outfit of the "Roaring Twenties" style. The actual guidelines for fashion in 1928 were as follows.

The length of the skirts in 1928 were usually right at the knee cap or a little below. Skirts were straight, pleated or gathered in tiers, sometimes with uneven hemlines. Waistlines were about three inches below the natural waist and the popular fabrics were: silk, pongee, shantung, crepe, velvet, cotton and wool. Nylon was not available at this time.

Stockings were either silk, cotton or lisle and were in various shades, especially nude for the more fashion conscious.

Ladies dress shoes were made of velvet, crepe de chine, satin moire and every type of cloth and leather. There were four basic types: the "T" strap slipper, sandal, pump and oxford. Most heels on shoes (other than oxfords) had two inch heels. The open toe or open heel were unknown.


The hats were often in the same color shade as the dress. If not, it was the same color as the shoes. Because of the high collars on coats, the winter hats were very small and fitted to the head. The brim came all the way to the browline and the crown was very high, sometimes squashed down with a sort of crumpled effect. Bows, grosgrain ribbon, jeweled ornaments, pins and appliques decorated almost every hat. Hats were even worn with sports clothes. Materials were: satin, taffeta, moire, bengaline, felt, straw, velvet, and silk. The turban style was worn for formal occasions and silk headbands were worn off the forehead for evening. I have seen a few evening hats that were made out of small pieces of metal, netting and satin ribbons. (These were very rare.)






