

The original signers of the club's Articles of Incorporation notarized them on August 31, 1967. The Orange County Model A Ford Club was Incorporated in the State of California on October 27, 1967. Richard Parrish was one of the original signatories of the articles, and as well we all know, Richard is still very active in the club and he is still wearing his original orange club jacket. Richard Parrish and Jon Heiland (our official club greeter) were also on the original By-Law Committee. If you have any questions regarding the history of our club, Richard and Jon have the answers.

Officially our club will be 27 years old on October 27th of this year. So Happy Birthday OCMAFCA! During the last 27 years we have revised the By-Laws five times, in 1972, 1980, 1984, 1989 and 1993.

Our club has grown substantially over the years. Along with the growth of the club, we as Model A owners have become very knowledgeable about our cars. If we consider how many cars used to break down on tours in the early years compared to today, it's easy to see we have come a long way in developing the skills needed to improve and maintain the reliability of our Model A's. We encourage all members, especially the new ones, to come to the technical seminars and learn more about the Model A and how to keep it running properly.

Increase in club membership dues!

After a lengthily discussion during the September Board Meeting, the Board voted unanimously (though quite reluctantly) to institute a small increase in the club annual dues, which will be effective for the 1995 calendar year. The club dues have not been raised in over 10 years and the routine cost of running the club has gone up mainly due to the increased cost of postage and the printing of the *Distributor*. Terry Lucas has said OK to conducting another super raffle, and Glenn Johnson will be taking over the judging, which will be expanded.

Secretary's Report

September Board Meeting Minutes.

The meeting was called to order by Co-President Pieter Dwinger at 7:35 P.M. September 15, at the home of Pieter Dwinger.

Co-President, Pieter Dwinger:

Pieter discussed the status of the on-going effort to resolve the issue of our non-profit tax deferred status being reviewed by the California State Franchise Tax Board.

Treasure's Report, Red Kiser:

Red advised the board that the club's funds are in proper order. Red explained his system of book keeping and reported the status of the club's finances. There was a question concerning when the membership year for chapter member's dues should start. It was suggested that the cut-off date be the same date that the MAFCA National uses. Paul Steed put forth a motion to the affect, it was seconded by 1 Endy and passed by unanimous vote of the board. Paul Steed will check with the National to find out what date they use.

Special Events, Roger Aday:

Roger advised that the Jim Marsh Family Award will be finalized at a meeting at Roger's house on September 22, at 7:30 P.M. Roger was appointed by the board to the position of 1995 Pancake Breakfast Chairperson.

Tour Chairperson, Glenn Johnson:

Glenn discussed the February 1995 tour being planned to Death Valley and the need for people to sign up early and make firm hotel commitments.

Club member tour mileage is being entered into a new computer program and it is hoped that the project will be completed in time to be able to pass out mileage patches at the November General Meeting. Technical, Paul Steed:

It was suggested that the club purchase a Model A conversion overdrive from Dan Simmons to be used for the primary raffle item at the 1995 Pancake Breakfast. Paul Steed put forth a motion, seconded by Tom Endy and passed by vote of the board.

Terry Lucas agreed to be the 1995 Raffle Chairperson, which includes the raffle at the Pancake Breakfast.

It was agreed that the membership will be encouraged to participate in a mini-swap meet at each General Meeting. A table in the meeting hall will be set aside for small items.

The board discussed the decline of the club's yearly income and the increased costs they are facing. It was suggested that the yearly membership dues be increased, along with the increase in dues requested by the ACCC. Paul Steed motioned that the yearly chapter membership fee be raised to \$22. and that the ACCC dues be increased to \$3. The motion was seconded by Glenn Johnson and passed by vote of the board.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:30 P.M.




Technical



You may have noticed that the chapter membership fee has been raised this year. "Let's lynch the Board!"



Having had the opportunity to work on a number of people's Model A's I've noticed a number of pit falls that Henry came up with, and over the years people have consistently stepped right into them.

A common one concerns the nuts and bolts that hold the front wheel backing plates on. They're supposed to be installed so that the bolt head is inside the drum and the castellated nut is on the outside, inboard of the wheel. This is backwards to the way the rear backing plate bolts and nuts are installed. Stands to reason Henry would do it this way. If you install the front backing plate nuts incorrectly inside the drum, the hub will contact the outer edge of each nut and grind them down as the wheel rotates.

The two rear emergency brake mechanisms also seem to collect their share of abuse. They are assembled with four special thin headed clevis pins. The head of the clevis pin is supposed to face out, toward you. This puts the cotter pins on the inside where they won't score the drum when you put it on. A lot of people seem to want to get this one wrong.

Pay particular attention when you install the rear backing plates. It is possible to tighten the nuts down to the point where they appear to be tight, but they may have bottomed out on the end of the threads on the bolts without pulling the backing plate tight against the end of the axle housing. If this happens the backing plate will be loose and will "rock" back and forth each time you accelerate and brake and eventually elongate the bolt holes in the backing plate and ruin it.

It is not clear why this can happen. One of our chapter members wrote to the technical experts at the National and they didn't know the reason either. In any event check it closely. If it looks like you're nearing the bottom of the thread travel on the bolts, add some washers to shim it. Using shims will also allow you to align the castles on the nut with the hole in the bolt so that the cotter pin will do some good. ©

Fox Furs!

"Imitation fur" - usually rabbit, opossum or squin was worn for more casual or sporting occasions. Sable and martens are also mentioned in a few of the catalogs of the Model A era.

When it comes to awarding points at a National Fashion Judging event a lot of subjectiveness must go into assessing a fox fur. The judge might base the point score on the expression on the animals face. More points might be gained if it has a serene look such as if it met a calm and peaceful demise as opposed to one of stark terror as it saw a Double A truck bearing down on it in it's final moments. The latter of course being known as a "road kill". And if the judge happens to be an animal activist, you can no doubt expect to lose some points. \odot


December

New Mexican Chili Bean Salad

1 can (15 to 17 oz.) each of garbanzos, kidney beans, pinto beans and whole-kernel corn.

1/2 cup chopped green union.

1/3 cup chopped cilantro leaves.

1 large red bell pepper coarsely chopped

1 can (4 oz) diced green chilies.

New Mexican Dressing

1/4 cup red wine vinegar
1/4 cup of salad oil
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 tsp. each of chili pepper, dried oregano leaves
and ground cumin.

Drain and rinse well all beans and corn. Mix all ingredients well. Add dressing and chili 1 hour or until next day. Makes 8 & 1\2 cup servings.

Spinach Peach Salad

6 cups (about 10 oz.) fresh spinach, torn into bite size pieces.
1 cup sliced red union.
1 can (29 oz.) peach slices, drained.

Dressing

1\3 cup mayonnaise.1\4 cup orange juice.1 tsp. sugar.1 tsp. poppy seeds.Stir together until well blended. Set aside.

For salad, toss together spinach, union and peaches in a large bowl. Cover and refrigerate salad and dressing in separate containers until ready to serve. To see pour dressing over salad: toss until well coated. Yields 12 servings.

Best Ever Chicken Salad

5 cups cooked chicken, chopped.

2 Tbsp. salad oil.

2 Tbsp. orange juice.

2 Tbsp. vinegar.

1 tsp. salt.

3 cups regular rice cooked.

1 & 1\2 cups small seedless grapes.

1 & 1\2 cups celery, sliced.

1 (15 oz.) can pineapple chunks, drained.

1 (11 oz.) can mandarin orange sections, drained.

1 cup slivered almonds, toaster.

1/2 cup mayonnaise.

Combine first 5 ingredients in a large bowl: Let stand about 30 minutes to allow flavors to blend. Add remaining ingredients and toss gently. Yields 10 to 12 servings. ©


