



Map to Sherman Gardens







Map to Pieter Dwinger's house








Brake Drums!

Back in the *old days* brake drums were an integral part of the hub assembly, not like modern cars where the drum easily slips on and off the hub. The method used to attach a Model A brake drum to its hub is called swaging (pronounced sway-jing). What it means is that the lug bolt is slipped through both the hole in the drum and the hole in the hub then a swaging tool and a press are used to force the shoulder on the end of the lug bolt into the shape of a collar. The process is much like installing a rivet. Only in this case you are working with a very large rivet and you need a 20 ton press to be able to force a collar onto the shoulder of the lug bolt.

The original Model A brake drums up until late 1931 were stamped steel, not cast iron. Today, after 60 plus years many of these drums have been turned out past their limits. For the sake of safety you may want to consider installing a set of new cast iron brake drums on your Model A. The Plasmeter Corporation in Albany, Oregon manufactures an excellent reproduction cast iron drum. With each drum Plasmeter documents numerous precautions that need to be observed so as not to damage the hub or the drum during the installation process.

In the days when Model A's and V8 Fords filled the streets auto repair shops knew the art of replacing worn brake drums which required swaging in new lug bolts. Today this is truly a lost art. Swaging is not as straight forward as it would seem. If you are contemplating installing a new set of cast iron drums, at a considerable expense, **be careful where you take them**. Unless you can find a shop that has an old guy running the place, chances are they do not know how to do the job correctly and the likely result will be warped hubs or cracked drums and in many cases both. I don't know of any local shops who have the capability and can be recommended. The job can be done within the club, but if you plan to undertake this project yourself, beware of the pitfalls. First and foremost be certain that the new lug bolts you buy fit through the holes in the new drums. You cannot e the old lug bolts because the collars will have been broken off when the old drum was removed. Many of the repro's on the market being touted as "Model A" lug bolts are way too big in diameter, and they will crack the drum if you try to force them through the holes. Make certain you can push the lug bolt through the drum hole with your thumb, or no more than a slight bap with a block of wood. Don't try to hammer them in.

Plasmeter and Bratton's Antique Auto Parts carry the correct diameter lug bolt, they also carry one that is slightly longer to better fit the thicker cast iron brake drum. The front lug bolts are different from the back lug bolts, but both types are available. You will need 10 of each kind.

The first task is to remove the old drums from the hubs. Do not try to hammer them out, you'll only succeed in damaging the hub. They have to be pressed out with a hefty press. And if the hub and drum are not supported correctly you will warp the hub as ______ press the lug bolts out. You must use a proper holding fixture. Beside using a good holding fixture, some shops would use a fly-cutter tool to machine the shoulder off of the old lug holt before they attempted to press it out. This is a good approach, but the job can be done without it if you're careful.

Once you have the hubs removed from the old drums, the next step is to clean them up before you install the new drums. You'll find lots of rust where the old drum sat. Bead blast them, but it is recommended that the drum contact area of the hub be left unpainted. Paint the hubs after the drums are installed.

Next comes the crucial step of swaging in the new lug bolts. You have to have a swaging tool. Bratton's Antique Auto Parts carries them, the part number is A1119. Before you begin swaging, you need to know what you are trying to accomplish. The trick is to put the swaging tool over the threaded end of the lug bolt and force the shoulder down to form a collar. Be certain that the force being applied is to both end f the lug bolt only and that **no pressure what so ever is being applied to the drum or the hub**. What you are trying to do is "rivet" the drum and hub together. Very little expansion of the hub bolt occurs inside the drum hole. If it did it would easily crack the cast iron. The swaging process is usually a two ran operation. Check that you have produced a conar that is about 1/16th of an inch wide. My experience has been that using a Taiwan made 20 ton press, keep pulling the handle down until your feet just start to leave the floor. This is about the amount of force needed.

In addition to the instructions that Plasmeter supplies with their brake drums, there is also an excellent article by Steve Pargeter of Nashua, New Hampshire, that appeared in the 1992 March/April publication of the Restorer (page 32). Pargeter describes how he installed a set of Plasmeter brake drums.

When you have completed the task of swaging the new drums onto your old hubs, the inside diameter of the drums should be "turned". The reason for this is that there may be some tolerance stack-ups that will cause the drum to be not concentric. The turning process will align the circumference of the drum with the center line of the hub. Plasmeter makes their drums .010 under the standard 11 inch size. By r hining .010 off, your drums will not only be concentric, they will also be to the factory size. Do not turn the emergency brake surface diameter of the drum. This area is not critical and removal of metal from this area will weaken the structure of the drum.

One big caution, be careful where you take them to be turned. Most brake shops do not have the proper equipment to correctly mount the rear drums on their turning machine. This is because most cars on the road today do not have a skinny tapered rear axle like a Model A has. What they will do is try to jury rig it on their machine and it will end up worse than before they started. The one place I know where they have the proper equipment and they know what they are doing is Oscar's Auto Center in Stanton.


Vintage Clothing,where to find it! If you are trying to build a wardrobe of Model A era clothing you've probably discovered by now that it's not an easy task to find the correct garment for the correct year. Locating a source for era clothing is also difficult. Many antique stores offer a few articles of clothing for sale, but the pickings are usually slim. There are however a number of shops that deal exclusively in vintage clothing. My experience has been that the owners and operators of these shops don't really know what their inventory is. Your best bet is to visit as many as possible and look to see what they have for yourself. Listed below are a number of shops in the Greater Los Angeles area that are in the business of selling vintage clothing.

Don't rely on the shop owners knowledge. Their knowledge of era clothing from the Model A era is probably not as good as yours, and lets face it, their motivation is to sell. ©




