
Broken Water Outlets!

Have you heard the old wives tale about putting match sticks between the cylinder head and the upper water outlet casting to prevent cracking it when torquing the #11 and #13 head nuts? This subject has come under discussion recently by a number of club members who have managed to crack several of these outlet castings while torquing the head.

Like any procedure that isn't properly documented, the information tends to get distorted. What is the size of these match sticks, what are they made of, and exactly where do you put them, and why? One of our chapter members who lives in Placentia insisted that it's not a match stick at all, it's a Zippo lighter, and you're supposed to put it between your lower lip and your gums.

Hoping to locate some authentic documentation, I searched through my library of "how to" books, but found nothing. A search through the back issues of the *Restorer* finally yielded some results. The 1987 July/August publication, page 32, has an article by Robert Donovan of Framingham, Massachusetts. Donovan says you use matches from an ordinary book of matches. You place the non-burning end just outboard of each stud and cut off the excess. The idea is it adds an extra amount of supporting thickness to the outboard edge of the casting to keep it from drooping and cracking. Don't light the matches!

Just in case you don't have faith in wives tales, find yourself another water outlet at a swap meet and carry it with you as a spare. If you want to try the Zippo lighter method, go ahead, just don't light it. O

Men's Era Shirts!


Back when Model A's were new men's shirts all nad long sleeves, except for what they called Polo shirts. The Polo shirt was like the modern day Golf, or knit shirt. This was about the only type of shirt considered casual enough to warrant short sleeves. There must have been a thing about bare arms, though it was often common for shirt sleeves to be rolled up to the elbow.

Flannel shirts were also worn during the Model A era. They of course had long sleeves. Some folks say they were just like the ones worn in 1987. They were of both cotton and wool and appeared in all mail order catalogs. They were worn for work or outdoor sports like hunting and fishing.

Dress shirts came with either attached or detachable collars. The attached collars all seemed to be pointed, though rounded fronts were often seen on the stiff detachable collars. Detachable stiff collars were available in numerous styles during all four years of the Model A era. They varied in stiffness and the celluloid collars had a dull linen like finish that cc____ be cleaned with a damp cloth.

Think about a detachable collar for a minute. Why did they go away? The first thing that wears out on a man's dress shirt is the collar. Wouldn't it be great if you could still get extra collars for each shirt you buy. Could it be that the manufacturers recognized an excellent opportunity to pursue modern day obsolescence? President Herbert Hoover is seen in many era photographs wearing a detachable stiff rounded collar, and he certainly knew the value of a dollar.




