



The Hoganburetor!

Black Smoke!

For a period of many months, at various club functions. I had a number of conversations with fellow club member Warren Hogan about a problem he was having with a Model A Ford carburetor. He told me that he had rebuilt the carburetor at one of the club seminars several years ago. The problem was that his Hoganmobile would emit black smoke, cough, sputter, and could hardly get out of it's own way. Hogan was afraid to drive the car more than a block from home. We discussed the possibility of some of the jets being sized wrong. I explained that the orifices could be soldered shut and redrilled to the proper size. On several other occasions we discussed the possibility that an internal passage way in the castings may be plugged up. I explained that it was possible to drill out the brass plugs and clean out the passages with a length of wire and install new brass plugs. After much time and many conversations it became apparent that we could not fix the carburetor by further discussion. I suggested to Hogan that he bring me the carburetor and I would take a look at it and try to fix it for him.

The Fix Was On!

At the May General Meeting Hogan brought me the carburetor. I took it home and examined it. It was very clean with no signs of rust and everything seemed to be in it's proper place. I did notice that the throttle shaft had a lot of slop in it, and I made a note to install some repair bushings in the upper casting. I proceeded to disassemble the carburetor. When I got the two casting pieces apart I noticed that the secondary well was missing. In it's place was a small rolled up piece of paper. I removed the paper and unrolled it and found it was a note. The note said that the brass thing that was supposed to be here was gone, and a small sketch of what it looked like was drawn on the note.

The Evaluation!

After inspecting the entire carburetor and finding that everything else seemed to be correct, I came to the conclusion that the problem Hogan was having with his carburetor was that the sketch on the note was an incorrect size, or it may have been that the paper was soaking up all of the gasoline. Somehow I had the feeling that I had half of a starring role in a Laurel & Hardy movie. ©




