The first time we saw her was on a trip to Victorville for the opening of the Highway 66 Museum and car show in Oct. 1995. A gorgeous 1928 Model A Sports Coup. You may have noticed her on some of the tours, she is the only one with brown fenders. Don fell in love with her at first sight. The owner, Lee Bishop of Apple Valley, first purchased her in 1991. She was rusted out and in pieces on a farm in Idaho. The farmer had been planning on restoring her for about 20 years, but never got around to it.

Lee started work immediately, restoring her from ground up over a period of four years. This was his first restoration and he did a great job, winning several trophies, the last being Best of Show, losing points only for brown fenders.

We had no idea of buying a car that morning, but when Don got bit by the bug, Colleen said if you want it, buy it. I couldn't believe it! Lee hadn't planned on selling, but needed room for other restorations in progress. We're happy to say we were able to agree on a sale that evening and Lee was kind enough to trailer it to our home the following day.

I always wanted a car I could drive, but this one was stock and for show only. Our first trip was the Havasu/Laughlin Tour the following April. We kept up with the pack, but we realized that some changes would have to be made if we were going to continue to tour with the club. As we drove through the Cajon Pass, Colleen held the stick shift in gear while I fought with the steering wheel. Gussie started to shimmy and shake while going down hill at 65 mph. She definitely was a show car. The first change I made was to put in a 1956 Ford Pickup steering box. Recently we put in a four-speed synchromesh with overdrive. Some of the other improvements were to add a stock battery and a 6 volt heavy duty alternator for future addition of halogen lights.

I feel somewhat confident now when going on the freeway and longer trips. My ambition is to drive her to St. Louis one day.

My 1928's

My 1928 Tudor Sedan has been a member of our family since November 1968. I disassembled the entire car in early 1969 and started a ground up restoration with the help of the How to Restore Your Model A, Vol. 1 book. We joined the OCMAFCA in January 1970 where we made new friends and learned a lot more about Model A's. I finished the restoration in September 1971 and we began going on tours and showing our new treasure. Over the years, I've done my best to maintain the car and have upgraded some of the areas that I was not satisfied with. In 1994, before the Tacoma National meet, I installed a better engine and a Volvo overdrive in the Tudor. Our twin girls Heidi and Holly drove the Tudor to Tacoma and Sharon drove it back home without any breakdowns.

I also have an unrestored 1928 Roadster that I've owned since 1975. I used to drive it often but it has been in storage since 1990.

My 1929 Station Wagon is a '29 model but was built in December 1928 and has some '28 features.

I am fascinated with the 1928 Model A's because they have so many unique features. Many 1928 parts are different from later parts and are often of better quality. Parts like fender braces, running board brackets, seat frames and many more are solid forgings on '28s instead of the less expensive steel stampings of later years. The multiple disk clutch, although more complicated, is a much smoother clutch that the single plate type. My favorite '28 parts are those beautiful fluted glass headlight lenses and that wonderfully functional looking drum taillight with the big STOP letters behind the dark ruby red glass.

1928 is definitely my favorite Model A year.



In 1928 all the *real* fashions came out of Paris. It wasn't until after the depression that eyes turned to some of the New York and London designers.

Most Model A families could not afford those anyway and if they wanted a special dress it meant a trip to get fabric and maybe a *Vogue* pattern. Then out came the Singer or a side trip to a dressmaker.

The twenties had changed women's fashions forever. From the well-covered and sedate "Gibson Girl", to the flapper who sped around in her newly acquired Model A--some times with the top down and her bobbed hair flying in the wind.

They could make that knee length dress, and maybe even that <u>wrap around</u> coat, but that cloche hat was the one item that literally topped off the new styles and that would be found at the millinery shop. Where did they all go?

Big Island Carburetor!

Most of the membership will remember Wayne & Jocelyn Krug who were very active members of the Orange County Model A Ford Club until May of 1997, when Wayne retired from Edison and they Moved to the Big Island of Hawaii. I have been over there to visit them and they very happily live in a little town about 20 miles from Hilo, with a name that is almost impossible to pronounce. Wayne drives his 1930 Model A Ford Panel Delivery almost daily and has quickly become the Island character. Everybody on the Island knows him by now.

An Old Fellow In His Eighties!

It wasn't long before an old fellow in his eighties befriended Wayne and told him about a stash of Model A Fords buried in the jungle on a section of his property. The old fellow told Wayne that if he wanted any of the stuff that was buried there he was welcome to it, if he could dig any of it out. It was not an easy task, but Wayne and a few friends dug what was left out of a very dense jungle. There were about six Model A Fords there. Most of the bodies and frames were rusted beyond salvage and had to be hauled off to the dumps. But many of the components that were shielded from the very damp Hawaiian environment were salvageable.

When Kennedy Was In Office!

The old fellow had told Wayne that the cars had been back there in the jungle for about 20 years. When his wife heard this she rolled her eyes and said " twenty years my foot, he parked those cars hack in there when Kennedy was in office".

The Phone Call!

One evening Wayne called to tell me about his find and to also tell me that he had recovered a side bowl carburetor. Wayne knew that I had been looking around for one for a spare for my Model A Ford Victoria, which has an indented firewall and uses a side bowl carburetor. At any rate a few days later a package showed up on my door step. Inside was the nastiest looking Zenith carburetor I have ever seen. It wasn't so much that it was coated with rust, it also had a coating over the rust that can only be described as a patina of Hawaiian fungus. Also included was a heavy deposit of Gecko eggs packed in the throat of the carburetor. I'm not sure I know what a Gecko is!

The Restoration!

A few days later I started the restoration project. One way to get a carburetor apart easily is to heat it and then drop it into a bucket of cold water. The metal expands when heated, then when quenched it has a tendency to loosen things up. I made the mistake of putting the carburetor in the oven at 500 degrees. The plan was to leave it there for an hour. After a half hour the house was so badly stunk up I had to remove it from the oven and dump it into the bucket of water. Cooked Gecko eggs don't smell too good. Whatever Geckos are! surprising thing was that after I headblasted the carburetor I found it to be like brand new. There was virtually no pitting of the cast iron housings. The throttle shaft was in excellent condition with little or no wear to it, and the filter screen found inside was like new when it was cleaned up. The original jets were checked for size and found to be right on the money. I was able to put the carburetor back together using all the original parts except for the venturi, which was corroded, and the float which came apart because the solder melted when I put it in the oven. All in all, it became one of the best restored carburetors I have, and it came from the worst I have ever seen. There must be something to be said for the protection afforded by Hawaiian fungus.

Wayne's Living It Up In Hawaii!

Wayne has joined the Volunteer Fire Department in the community he lives in. The fire station is just down the hill from his house. Wayne told me that the Federal Government recently bought them a new \$300,000. fire engine. Unfortunately there are six hridges in the area that they cannot drive the fire engine across, because it is too heavy. Their only alternative is to send Wayne across the bridge in his Model A Ford Panel Delivery with a garden hose in the back.


A Big Island Model A Ford Clnb!




Recipes


The following is from the Sept. 1928 issue of the Modern Priscilla magazine.

Watermelon Pickles

- 3 pounds prepared watermelon rind
- 5 cups sugar
- 2 cups vinegar
- 1 cup water
- 1 tablespoon stick cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon whole cloves
- 1 tablespoon allspice
- 1 lemon

Prepare the watermelon rind by removing the green skin and pink pulp and cutting in small pieces. Let stand over night in salt water (two tablespoons salt to one quart water), drain, cover with fresh water and boil until tender. Mix the sugar, vinegar and water, all the spices in a cheesecloth bag, and the lemon sliced. Boil five minutes, add watermelon and cook until transparent. Turn into clean, hot jars and seal, first removing the spice bag. Makes 4 pints.







