


## Wings and Wheels 1998

## Happy Birthday 1928 Wodel A's

This is the 70th birthday for all those 1928 Fords. Henry Ford had been perfectly happy with the Model T but progress was taking over in the name of General Motors. Edsel was instrumental in getting "Dad" to agree to update the car. The A was due to be born! Model A had actually been the first car for Henry and it was chosen for this new model, but not at the very beginning. It was referred to as "the New Ford."

Here are some of the new prices:

Phaeton	\$395
Roadster	\$385
Chassis	\$325
Coupe	\$495
W/rumble seat	\$550
Tudor sedan	\$495
Fordor sedan	\$570

These first appeared on the showroom floors in December of 1927. But the big push for sales began in January 1928. Police had to be called out to control crowds. The crowds at Madison Square Gardens broke all attendance records. It was like that all over the country. Ford spent something like \$2,000,000 for five days of intensive advertising.

What the Model A brought to the Ford car was: a choice of four colors, some seventeen variations of body style. Standard equipment for the new model included: hydraulic shock absorbers, four-wheel brakes, standard gear-shift, battery ignition, theft proof ignition lock, automatic windshield wiper,

stop light, water pump, gas gauge, foot throttle and speedometer. It was also the first in any price class to include safety glass in the windshield as original equipment.

So this is the start of what draws us together the second Thursday of every month as well as keeping our hands greasy.

## Antique Gas & Steam Engine Museum Tour

The museum depicts farming and industry during the period from 1849-1950. It is a working collection. 95% of the collection is still operational. The museum sits on 40 acres, much of which is actively cultivated with traditional early California crops. The tour will lead you to the following locations: a sawmill, harvest equipment, blacksmith and wheelwright shops, a tractor tow, a museum building, steam tractors, a steam engine tow, a railroad, a gas engine row, and a farm house.

Cost is \$2 per person. We will have our picnic lunch on premises. If it is raining that day the tour will be canceled and rescheduled due to the grounds will become muddy. This is a freeway tour with a fast and slow group. Don't miss the fun. Hope to see you there! Any questions contact Greg.






