
In February of 1993 for her 65th birthday, we had a combination coming out and birthday party. She stole the show and everyone was thrilled to get a ride in her rumble seat.

## Technical Talk

The Model a is truly a symbol of simplicity and reliability. Every part was designed to function just the was Henry wanted it to. And one part, which is subject of the article, deserves its share of attention, the generator. This little dynamo will faithfully keep charging for years if properly maintained and serviced. Not only that, but they're fun to work on!

#### No Two Are Alike!

Four different types were used on the A, but this time we're only going to focus on the later ones, referred to as the "long type, cylinder, or L1/L2 style". The L1 was introduced in October, 1928 and was produced until about April, 1930. This type is easily recognized by the ball bearing recess at each end, as well as the output terminal located near the front. Only the longer, 7 9/16" armature with the 7/8" tapered end shaft will work in this unit. Also, there were at least 5 different pulleys produced. Just make sure you have one with a 7/8" long tapered hole and you use a 1/4-28 X 7/16" hex bolt and lock washer. The second type, the "L2" was introduced around April/May, 1930 until the end of production. It has only one ball bearing in the front and a porous bronze bushing in the rear. The output terminal is located towards the rear of the unit. The armature for this model is only 3/16" longer, but will not work in the earlier model. It can be identified by its 1/2" tapered shaft end, which also uses only the later 1/2" tapered pulley and a 5/16-24X7/8 bolt.

#### Make It Hum!

Disassemble the entire unit and clean all parts except the armature windings in solvent. I have found that most existing windings are serviceable and can be reused. If they look frayed or burned, then it's best to replace them. Armatures usually need turning in a lathe to restore the commutator to

perfect roundness. Irratic charging is usually caused by this problem or "brush bounce" due to weak brush springs. Don't forget to replace the bearings with the newer, sealed typed and the rear with a fresh bronze bushing (L2 only). Also replace the three brushes if worn. I have an excellent "exploded" view of a generator and all its parts which details the entire assemble. I would be happy to provide a copy to anyone interested.

#### Cheap Insurance!

I strongly recommend converting an original style cutout to use a modern diode. This combined with an in-line fuse (usually mounted on the starter), is cheap insurance and will prevent nasty little surprises. Set the charging rate at about 10 amps by moving the third brush (use a small wooden stick) at a fast idle and call it a day.

#### Bargain Prices!

Replacement parts are readily available from most suppliers. I'm sort of partial to Brattons because their parts fit right, the prices are excellent and you can order via Internet. Check out their site at:

www.modelatrader.com/brattons/brattons.html. Keep your eyes open at swap meets because sometimes old, cruddy looking generators can be acquired very cheaply. I've picked up several complete ones for only \$1-\$2, only to open them us and find a host of brand new parts inside!





### An update on the Benslers & a 45 Year Old Dream Comes True

Pat Bensler was in a very freaky accident way back around Thanksgiving. Now to let you in on the interesting way we found out about her accident.

We went to the Post Office Box to be sure we had any important mail as Board Meeting was on the 19th. Among our mail was a postcard from Mr. & Mrs. Dave Pastor of Chelsea, Michigan. They

are the parents of Pat Bensler and reported that they get the *Distributor* every month and they read all the news and find it very interesting. They wanted to let us know that Pat had an accident with her eye and thought we would like to know.

We put a call in to Joe and Pat Bensler and had a nice informative talk with Pat. It seems that their 1931 Sedan originally belonged to Pat's Dad in Michigan. Joe and Pat's daughter was being married here and the grandfather was unable to attend so the car was sent to be the marriage carriage-which made the grandparents part of the wedding. Pat was in her van and had shut off the engine and noticed her phone card on the floor. She tried to pick it up but somehow, the card was stuck. To make a long story shorter, the card slingshotted and hit her in her right eye, causing eighteen stitches and four days in the hospital. She has had several surgeries, had a cataract removed-caused by the trauma and is still awaiting further healing to have a special contact lens She feels very fortunate to have had made. excellent doctors and eventually hopes to get clear vision.

## The Benslers sent us the following story about their 1931 Model A.


When I was 18 I wanted a New 1931 Ford Town sedan with a slant windshield the worst way, but it was not to be because of the Depression. I only was paid \$8 a week wages and could not afford to buy one. Then in 1976 we bought one and I,

along with my wife refurbished it. The motor had to be rebuilt, the roof had to be replaced. At that time they did not have a metal roof. My wife helped with the upholstering inside the car. The car had to be repainted, it was rusty. We hauled it on a trailer from Illinois, it originally came from Colorado.

We worked for 3 years on it on and off to make it drivable. We get a great kick out of driving in parades. It brings back great memories of the 1931 era. We also take our friends for a Sunday drive, they are all thrilled about riding in a 67 year old car. In 1931 you could but parts for the Model A car at all gas stations, sears Roebuck and Montgomery Ward stores, even at the 5 and 10 cent stores. Gas was 10 cents a gallon.

At one parade the car stopped and all the people along the street came and helped push it to get it started. We enjoyed it so much but it did not change our life--too much.

## CB Antennas

I will be ordering some more CB antennas on March 16th. The Hustler antennas have a stainless steel mast with a small tunable coil located at about the roofline of a Model A. The whip or top part of the antenna (which goes into the top of the coil) is above the roof which makes these antennas work perfectly on a Model A. The antennas come with a solid stainless steel quick disconnect and coax cable connector. I order these antennas directly from the factory in Texas. The cost for the antenna, quick disconnect and cable connector is \$50.00.
