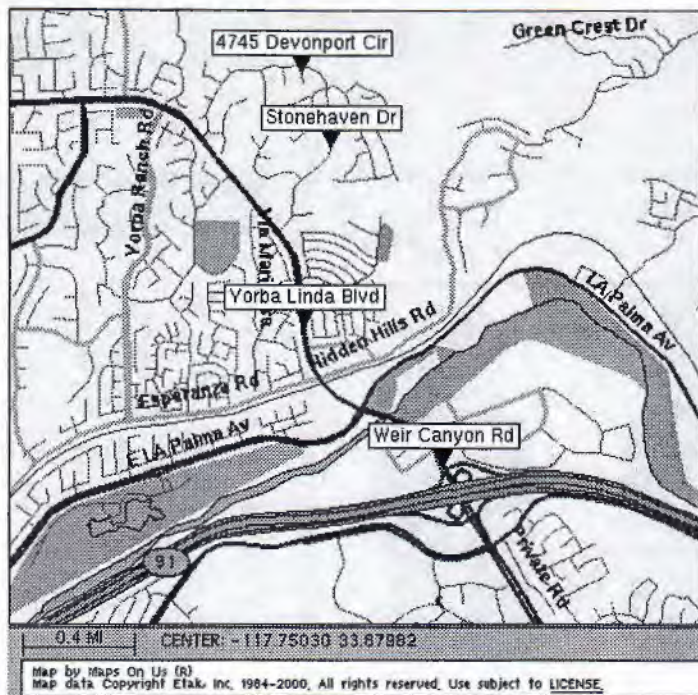

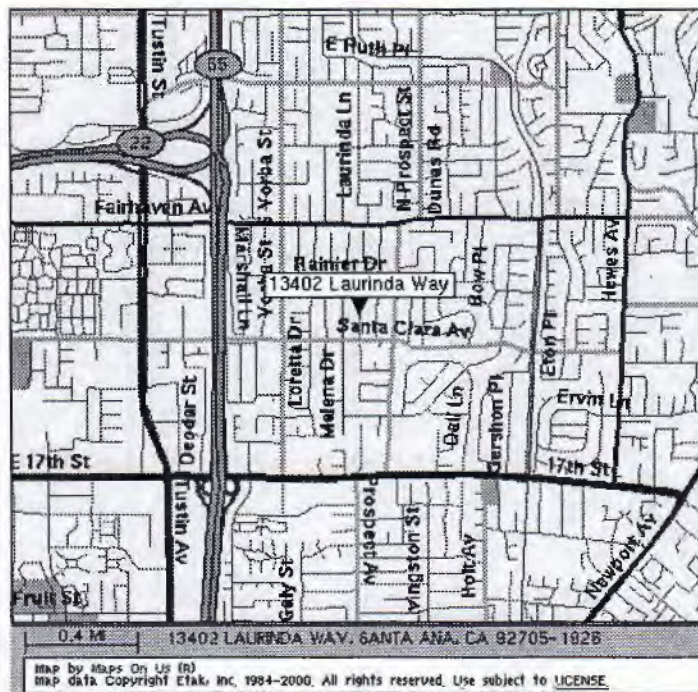

## New Business

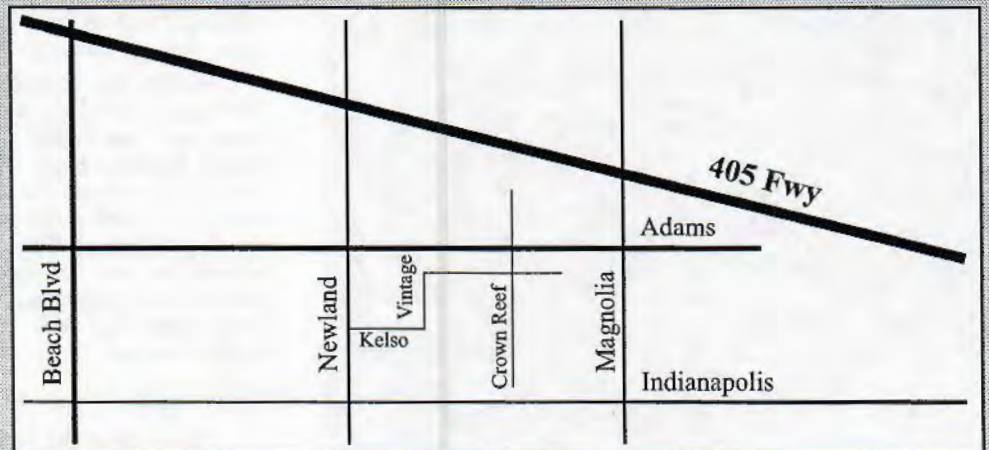

# NATIONAL NEWSBRIEFS

## Big Broadcast Brightens Banquet

To be quite honest about it, the national banquet, with its usual speeches, committee reports and somewhat formal format, is by nature and necessity normally something less than exciting. But not so with the eleventh annual banquet. Orange County Chapter saw to that. And club members from near and distant points apparently suspected as much, as they turned out in record-breaking numbers to pack the dinner hall at Michael's Restaurant in Los Angeles on December 3. More than 160 diners were treated to an evening they will not soon forget.

Following the excellent prime rib dinner and abbreviated business program, Orange County Chapter presented its famous parody, "Big Broadcast of 1930," a pantomimic performance based on the live musical programs once popular on radio, using rare recordings contemporary with the Model A period.

Radio station K-I-S-S . . . smack in the middle of your dial . . . came "on the air" with announcer Larry Boef (Orange County President) giving a commercial message from the "sponsor," Ford Motor Company (who else?), followed by master of ceremonies Gene Robinson who gave proper flowery introductions to each of the musical numbers "conducted" by Joe Eatherton (audio engineer).

Stars of the show were appropriately costumed ladies—wives and daughters of Orange County club members—who "sang" and danced with some startlingly real effects.

After a grand finale number, a closing commercial from the "sponsor" and "off the air" introductions, the entire cast retired offstage to a standing ovation.

### Attendance Notes

Noteworthy was the chapter representation at the banquet, with no less than 17 chapters accounted for, ranging from at least one delegate to the large contingents from Orange County, Pomona, and San Fernando Valley.

Among the 160-plus people attending were many familiar faces, including five club founders, several past presidents and one MARC representative, Robert O'Cain, a regional director from Torrance, California. There were several couples from the distant San Francisco area. But the one who traveled the most miles had to be Jim Estep from the Poco Quatros Chapter in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He arrived in Los Angeles only hours before the banquet, remained overnight just to attend the banquet and returned home early the next morning. That should establish some kind of record.

### Year-End Reports

Business at the banquet was kept to a minimum to allow time for the special entertainment. Several year-end reports

were waived, others were brief. But even in condensed version, a summary of the past year made it apparent that the club was continuing to grow and improve.

Membership increased again, as it has every year since the club started, with the central and northern areas of the country accounting for a greater percentage of the new members in 1966 than in previous years. Two recent developments pointed out as aiding and sustaining the growth were: (1) continuous, year-around advertising and publicity plus (2) increased efforts by chapters to encourage support of the national club.

New chapters continue to be formed at a rate averaging almost one a month, with the total number of chapters now at 120. The addition of two chapters in foreign countries—there are now six—reflects a significant growth outside the United States.

Financially the club continues to prosper. The year 1966 was one of high expenditures—almost \$42,000—due mostly to three new projects. Construction of the convention display booth, starting the film library, and publishing the *Ten Year Index*, three projects unique to 1966, together required close to six thousand dollars more than was budgeted at the start of the year. Yet the 1966 board managed to underwrite these expensive projects without sacrificing any of the standard services which members have come to expect.

Another unforeseen expense was the big jump in the budget item "Postage and Office Supplies" — up from \$2,549.40 in 1965 to \$5,679.37 in 1966. There were two major causes. First was the growth of foreign memberships which require extra handling, money exchanges, more postage, etc. (and is the reason foreign memberships were raised from \$5 to \$6 beginning this year). Second cause of the high postage expense was the exceptional number of address changes and returned copies of the magazine, resulting mostly from members going into military service.

But in spite of these big expenses the club came through the past year in good financial condition and starts 1967 with a black ledger and a highly optimistic outlook.

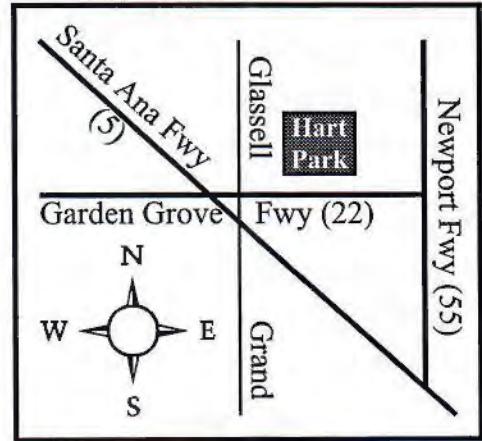
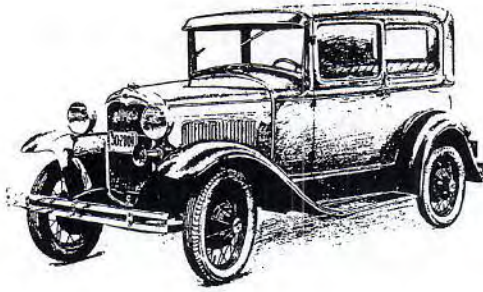
