





Model A 'Tudor Sedans' were safest for children


Many years before seat and shoulder belts became a standard feature, children were often hurt or killed when they accidentally opened a back side door of a four-door car and fell to the pavement—often when the car was moving along at a good clip!

There were no childproof reardoor safety locks back in the days when Model A Fords were new (namely, in the late 1920's and early 1930's). As a consequence, many families chose two-door sedans (commonly known then as 'coaches,' or as 'Tudor Sedans' in the case of Ford).

But two-door sedans were spurned by many childless usedcar buyers. Unless these old

coaches had been cleaned thoroughly, they might often bear the gummy, greasy marks of children's hands on the side windows, food stains, and rips in the upholstery,

popcorn and old bits of candy down between the cushions, pet hairs all over the place, and in the case of unhousebroken toddlers, even worse.



But now collector cars. old two-door sedans have mellowed and highly desirable to old-car buffs who have kids! Henry Ford couldn't make up his mind where to locate the emergency brake (also known as the parking brake) control lever on the Model A. The first examples of 1928 had the lever on the far Then it was left. moved to the center and then, in mid-

1929, to the right of the gearshift control.

The 1928 and '29 Model A's had a low, rounded hood and a comparatively small radiator. The 1930 and '31 Model A's had a higher hood and a taller radiator, which made them less prone to overheating.

All Model A's have been prized by collectors for years. The value of the illustrated Tudor Sedan ranges from \$450 to \$11,500, depending on its condition.

Did you know?

For the first 16 years (1908-1925) of the Model T Ford that Ford Motor Company sold 40% of all automobiles sold in the United States.

In 1924 Ford manufactured almost two-thirds of all the cars sold.

The Model A Ford has a vanadium steel frame.

The Model A styling was a scaled down version of the Lincoln.

Joan Crawford owned a 1929 Town Car, Franklin D. Roosevelt owned a 1929 Cabriolet, and Delores Del Rio a 1928 Sport Coupe.

No New Business.


Old Business: John Riggs reported that he is in the process of assembling new member packets for the next meeting.




