



I raced and raced but didn't win anything except a wonderful day running up the hill. I told everyone that I placed second even though there was no trophy awarded. I was, the second fastest Lady driver, with Barbara Mutschler winning her class.

We enjoyed going on a trip to the mines and learning all the different ways that gold was removed from the countryside. That night we went to an ice cream social and evening of entertainment at the hotel.

The next day we decided to try to make it over Loveland Pass. The cars ran so good, no problems. The four of us, Art, Olive, Lar & I stopped for a roadside picnic before going back to the hotel. We had a Lady's seminar we needed to attend. I guess the guys stayed out in the parking lot, talking about cars? What else?

Along the road we saw a herd of buffalo and further along we found some antelope on Hwy 24. As we neared the Pikes' Peak turnoff we decided it was too late and went on in to Manitou Springs. Lucky thing, when we pulled in to the parking lot of the motel we had a flat rear tire. A few phone calls and we had new tubes located for the next morning.



Getting to the top was a piece of cake. McSpeed ran like a dream! It didn't care if was going up to 14,110 feet, just another day on the road. We spent time at the top checking out the view. We could see the entire 360-degree around the summit, and everything was down hill from there. It was 38 degrees at the top, and we needed to put on our sweatshirts. The ride up was very comfortable and quite a change. We shopped, snapped pictures, headed down. We had miles to cover and just about then it started to rain. Not a good sign, at least it wasn't snow. Ray & Judy Jo Beardsley had snow a couple of days later. We thought we might stay in Pueblo for the night but there was a mega car show weekend and the town was full of Street Rods. The rain was still coming down and was not looking any better. We finally stopped in Walsenberg for shelter and dinner. The motel had a big porch and we were able to park the car and trailer where it was under a roof, just in case it really rained.

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Wayne's World!

Hawaii, the Big Island

Former members of the Orange County Model A Ford Club, and current residents of Hawaii, Wayne & Joclyn Krug, I am pleased to report, are alive and well and enjoying life in paradise. The Krug's moved to Hawaii in 1997 when Wayne retired from Edison. They like the Big Island so much that they have only been off it once in four years, and that was only to go over to Honolulu, on the island of Oahu. This past March Lynn and I went to Hawaii and had the opportunity to visit with Wayne & Joclyn for three days. The Krug's live in the community of Laupahoehoe, which is about 20 miles north of Hilo, on the east side of the island.

Captain Wayne

When Wayne first arrived in Hawaii he immediately joined the Laupahoehoe volunteer fire department. The fire and police station are just a few hundred yards from his house. Wayne had been a fire fighter in his early years. Since he joined the force, Wayne has been appointed the fire chief. I was very much surprised to learn just how much he is involved in this activity. Wayne has more than a full time job on his hands. He is on call 24 hours a day and responds to many varied emergencies such as car wrecks, tourists trying to drown themselves, and numerous other medical emergencies, not to mention fires. It is safe to say that Wayne is very much involved with the protection of his community.

Laupahoehoe

The very tiny community of Laupahoehoe (pronounced lapahoyhoy) is located right on the ocean. Wayne & Joclyn's home, which is very nice and has a large piece of property, sits up on a hill overlooking the ocean. The community gained historical notoriety in 1946 when a large tsunami wave came ashore and struck the school that was then located on a peninsula right on the ocean below the Krug's house. The wave struck on a school day in the morning just as the students were coming to school. Approximately 50 teachers and children were swept out to sea and drowned. I had the opportunity to meet one of the Krug's neighbor's, a woman in her 60's. She and a brother and two sisters were at the school when the wave hit. All four of them ran trying to escape. She was the only one of the four who survived. The peninsula is now a county park with a monument to those who were lost.

There are remnants of the school building foundation still standing. The story of this tragedy has been featured on the history channel a number of times. During our visit with the Krug's we went to the park for a BBQ one evening. It is hallowed ground for the local residents.

Model A Fords

Wayne drives all over the island in his 1930 Model A panel truck. For those of you who may have missed it, check out page 20 of the July\August 2000 publication of the Restorer. The Krug's Model A is pictured sitting in the county park described above. Wayne and I did some roaming around in the Model A one day. Strangely enough as we came around a corner we encountered another Model A. The owner had just brought it over from Oregon. Of course we had to stop and talk to him. Pretty soon there was a small crowd. It's fun to listen to the island resident's talk. No matter what their ethnic background, they all speak with a touch of pidgin, which has a charm all it's own. In fact, Wayne even talks pidgin now. The enthusiasm for old cars is certainly alive in the Islands. Dale McCall's old Model A pick-up is still around the Hilo area. It is driven often, if not daily. I did not have the opportunity to see it while I was there. Every once in a while Wayne comes across an old car that the jungle has swallowed up. He has also discovered some to be Model A's, what's left of them anyway. While I was there Wayne gave me some very rusty, gecko impacted Zenith carburetors that he removed from one such Model A remnant. Things tend to want to rust out on Hawaii. In fact, Wayne showed me the exact spot on the island where rust was first invented. @


Directions:

around Europe with the Johnsons, Dwingers and Caldons in their "A's".


Dan Adelmann and Larry Conkol absent, therefore no reports available.

HARD LUCK TROPHY: The HLT will remain with Dale since apparently nothing major happened (at least nothing anyone will own up to).




