What Happened to Black in 1928-29?

When the 1928's came out, each passenger car body style was offered in a minimum of five color combinations, black not being one of them. Black could be ordered, but was not included in the initial releases.

Lets look back a couple of years before the Model A was introduced. Black had been the only color available on Model T's from 1915 to 1925. The reason was, cranking out Model T's as fast as they could for ready buyers, any slow down in the production line cost money. The pigmented colors of the day took longer to dry than black until better faster drying proxylin colors came out in the later 20's. Black was chosen by Henry Ford as the only color. Until the middle 20's when sales alarmingly slowed down, Ford couldn't make Model T's fast enough. But by the mid 20's sales were being lost to other makers (such as the C- word), who offered more advanced designs, options, and colors. Ford offered the new 1926 closed cars in colors. Deep Chunnel green for coupes and tudors, Windsor maroon on fordors.

With the introduction of the Model A, Ford in 1927 considered this new car so advanced that he jumped back to the letter A in the alphabet instead of calling it Model X,Y,Z. Black was not a standard color, but could be ordered. The introduction of the faster drying proxylin pigmented paints made it possible to mass-produce cars in colors. Black was retained for the fenders and splash aprons. Yes, there were black Model A's and lots of them. It was a color that lasted a long time and was easy to match in case a panel needed to be repainted. It was still cheaper because pigmented paints were more costly. Black was always a standby color.

1930-1931 HATS

The year 1930 was transitional for millinery as well as for apparel. Fashion magazines everywhere were proclaiming the "new look." However, the following quote from *The Millinery Trade Review* (MTR) of November, 1930, p. 40, puts the changing fashion scene into perspective: "It is a mistake to believe that every woman wants, or will even wear, the new, extreme hats. The average woman is cautious and does not too readily jump at the newest. In fact, it usually takes about three seasons for any innovation to establish itself generally."

The shape of hats in 1930 could best be described as "off the face." There was a resurgence of the ever popular beret. Brimmed hats were very popular, with brims ranging from small for dress wear to extremely large umbrella brims for beach wear. Side



brims were wide; back brims sometimes showed a cape effect, sometimes were quite narrow, sometimes nonexistent. Hat crowns were shallower, usually with a skull-fitting short front, exposing the forehead. Many hats were trimmed with insets, handwork or embroidery.

In 1931, many ladies were growing their hair longer. Shallow, cap-like crowns appeared in spring, sometimes draped or with one side longer, showing graceful waves of longer hair. Hats usually matched the accessories worn, rather than the dress or coat.

In January, 1931, MTR noted: "The women of the United States like their hats close fitting and brimless. That is most of them do. Many more prefer this hat to the hat with a brim that flares away from the face, which is second choice".






