July Seminar:

The July seminar will be held at the CHOC hospital.

July 9, Saturday, 8:30AM– 1:00PM. This will be part one of a three-part Zenith carburetor seminar planned for July, August, and September. Part one will be an instructional session to describe how the carburetor works, how to disassemble, clean passageways, resize jets, re-bush throttle shafts, paint, assemble, and adjust. Sessions two and three will be held at my house where we will do the actual restorations.

Parts and Tools:

It is suggested that the following parts and tools be obtained. (Bratton part numbers)

Gasket kit	13820	\$1.25.
Plate screws	14170	\$.60.
Choke plate	14200	\$1.50
Bushing (two required)	14460	\$.75
Throttle shaft	14420	\$10.50
Gas Screen (brass hex)	14260	\$4.30 (or)
Gas screen (cad hex)	14280	\$3.90
Carb. Wrench	14080	\$10.55 T-handle
Jet tap	14090	\$8.90 5mm, 75 pitch

A set of very small drill bits ranging is size #61 down past a #75 should be obtained. These can be purchased at tool supply stores or hobby stores. Bratton does not carry them. These are used to re-size the jets. Also required is a pin vise for use with the drill bits.

Float valves:

Most original float valves can be re-used. If a replacement is needed, order an original type.

Float Valve, original 14300 \$4.95

Do not order the other two listed in the catalog. Both the ball type and the rubber tip type do not perform well with So. California gas. They will stick shut and you will have fuel starvation.

Paint:

A black paint that is impervious to gasoline is required. Airplane dope works well, but you cannot buy it in California any more. My preference is POR-15. ©

Distributor Collection:



OCMAFC Military Veterans

U.S Army Air Corps 1942-1945

I was 21 years old at the time of Pearl Harbor. Gwen and I had been married for a few months and I was working with my father at Fellows & Stewart on Terminal Island as a boat builder and carpenter. In October 1942 I enlisted in the Army Air Corps and was sent to Roswell, New Mexico for basic training and aircraft maintenance training. Roswell was a B-17 pilot training base. I became a flight engineer on a B-17 and over a period of time the instructor pilot I flew with taught me how to fly the airplane and encouraged me to apply for pilot training. I was accepted in early 1944 and was sent to Central Washington College of Education at Ellensburg, WA for initial training. Following that I was sent to the Santa Ana Air Corps training base, which today is the location of the Orange County fair grounds and Orange Coast College. I was there several months and graduated with class 44J. The next stop was Thunderbird Field, Glendale, AZ for primary training. I was the first in my class to solo in an old Stearman trainer. Intermediate training was at Minter Field near Bakersfield. I trained in twin engine Cessna's. Advanced training was at La Junta, CO where I trained in the B-25. In January 1945 I was graduated as a bomber pilot and was commissioned a 2nd Lt. Immediately after I was sent to Del Rio, TX where I was trained to fly the B-26. In May 1945 I was scheduled to pick up a new A-26 from the Douglas plant in Long Beach and join a squadron in the South Pacific when the war in Europe ended. My orders were cancelled and I was sent to Yuma, AZ, which was a B-25 training base for bombardiers. For the rest of the war I flew training missions for bombardiers all over the southwest. I was discharged from the Air Corps in October 1945. In the early post war years I was offered a job with a map surveying company flying surplused B-26's in South America. However, by then I had a young family and so I declined the offer.

SERIOUS OFFERS ONLY

This guy thinks he's got something really special. This one always makes me want to call and very seriously offer a ridiculously low price.

RARE

How many were originally built??? How many still exist???

TRAILERED CAR

The car probably doesn't run very well.

NEW PAINT OR NEW UPHOSLTERY

Who did the work? Ask for dated receipts. Are the colors or materials correct??


Remember accidents?




