



Technical 2006

July Seminar:

There is no seminar scheduled for July.

Technical tip:

Reproduction gas caps have a quality issue that can cause you some amount of grief. A large single rivet in the center on the bottom of the cap holds the assembly together. The rivet goes through the bottom metal grabbing device, a red colored gasket, and a large brass flat washer. Off to the side is drilled a vent hole through all three parts. Without a vent hole the tank would experience a vacuum lock as the gas in the tank is depleted. Eventually it would stop the gravity flow of gas to the carburetor and the car would appear to run out of gas.

It is possible, and extremely likely, that as the cap is twisted on and off the tank numerous times, one or more of the three parts will rotate out of position on the center rivet. When this happens the vent hole will be blocked off and the vacuum thing will happen. When you remove the cap you are liable to hear a "Whoosh" sound as air rushes into the tank to equalize the vacuum.


Before you allow the vent hole to become blocked it is a good idea to modify the cap. Drill a second hole through the three pieces. Be careful not to drill clear through the top of the cap, just the three pieces. Tap the hole for a 6-32 screw. Lock-tight or epoxy it in place so it won't fall out into the gas tank. The screw will prevent the three parts from rotating out of position and the vent hole will maintain alignment through the three separate parts.

OCMAFC Military Veterans

Mark Schwing USN 1959-1984

I was born and raised in Johnstown, PA, and graduated from Johnstown High School in 1958. During that summer my mother encouraged me to contact my congressman for an appointment to one of the military academies, with her choice being West Point. My congressman, John P. Saylor, conducted an annual competitive exam for all those applying for one of his academy appointments. In August of that summer about 180 of us spent a full day taking academic and aptitude exams. In the meantime I enrolled at the University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown College, as an aeronautical engineering major and an Air Force ROTC Cadet. In March of 1959, I learned from Congressman Saylor that I would be his principal appointee to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis (my first choice) for the graduating class of 1963. On July 5, 1959, I took the oath of office along with over 1200 other candidates as a Midshipman at the Naval Academy, and a member of the Class of 1963. Four years later 921 of us graduated on June 6, 1963, earning officer commissions and bachelor degrees in naval science, which is essentially electrical engineering.

In the fall of my senior year at the academy about 200 of us were sent to Washington D.C. to be interviewed by Vice Admiral Hyman Rickover for his nuclear power program. The Rickover interviews are everything you have heard about, and then some, tilted chairs and all. VADM Rickover accepted me for his program should I choose to volunteer but he ordered me to take an elective course in nuclear physics my last semester. However, naval aviation was always my first career choice. In fact, I was one of just two classmates who had a perfect score on the navy flight aptitude test taken during our "Second Class" summer at Pensacola. Fate said aviation was not to be for me, as I failed a portion of the flight physical eye exam just before graduation. My second career choice was nuclear power submarines. I believe to this day, that if the Navy had needed pilots more than nuclear submariners that year, my eye problem would have been waved and I would have gone to Pensacola for flight training. Instead, I was sent to Nuclear Power School at Mare Island, CA for six months, followed by six months at the reactor prototype site at West Milton, NY. Then it was on to Groton, CT, for six months of Submarine School. Finally in February 1965, nearly twenty months after graduating, I reported to my first ship, USS James K. Polk, SSBN 645, under construction at Electric Boat in Groton. When Polk was commissioned, I became the Blue Crew Electrical Officer and later the Communications/Sonar Officer and made a number of Polaris patrols operating from Rota, Spain and Holy Loch, Scotland.

In 1968 I reported to the Submarine Training Center in Charleston, SC, as the Operations Department Head responsible for teaching communications, sonar and electronics courses. In early 1969, Polk was in refit in Charleston and my former CO called and asked if I would like to ride on their sea trials. I thought this would be a great four-day sea vacation, but I immediately learned after reporting aboard, that Polk was short of qualified officers of the deck and that I would be the OOD to get her underway and out to sea and I would be one of just two OOD's underway while training several junior officers. The captain told me his navigator was being transferred soon and asked if I would like to come back to Polk as the Navigation Officer. The job called for a Lieutenant Commander rank, so I was immediately "spot" promoted to LCDR. I

was awarded a Navy Achievement Medal for my performance during that second Polk tour.

In 1973 I was assigned to the Strategic Systems Project Office in Washington and was responsible for inertial navigation system performance aboard all 41 Polaris and Poseidon submarines. I had the opportunity to work with and ride 20 of our 41 Polaris/Poseidon submarines and 2 of the 4 British Polaris submarines during my four-year tour. My next assignment was in Anaheim as OIC of SSPO Detachment A, the Naval Plant Representative Office at Autonetics. I retired from the Navy in 1984. I now operate a business manufacturing electronic accessories for radio controlled model airplanes. Finally back to aviation! ©

HISTORIANS CORNER

This month I'd like to share some light hearted tips from an article in the Sept-Oct '85 Restorer, New Maintenance Tips for Model A's, by Dutch Nelsen, which as you know can be checked out FREE by calling me 949-770-6847.

- (1) When using a battery charger remember that the Model A is wired up opposite of modern cars, and that it is a 6-volt system, not a 12-volt. If you hitch up the charger backwards and have it set on 12 volts when you plug it in, all sorts of interesting (and undesirable) things will happen.
- (2) You should check the water level in the battery from time to time. I check mine faithfully every year. This is also a good time to check the oil in the engine. A minor complication is that these two items are not in the same place. One is under the floorboards and the other is on the side of the engine.
- (3) From time to time you will need to check the water level in the radiator. When the Model A radiator is less than half full the car may tend to overheat particularly on the road to Pikes Peak.
- (4) Water pumps (packing nuts) on a Model A tend to work loose and need to be tightened from time to time. You can tell when this is needed when you see little droplets of water on the windshield and it isn't raining. Another, but more subtle indication is icky looking stuff all over the firewall. The water pump is located at the very front of the engine. You can't miss it because you can usually see the water running out.

 Many experienced mechanics tighten the pump while the engine is running: however, I have found it best to bring the car home put it up on blocks and then tighten the pump. If you turn the packing nut in the wrong direction you will soon be able to tell as the water runs out much faster.
- (5) As you drive in parades and on tours you might find it necessary to adjust your brakes. If you push hard on the brake pedal but the car does not stop, this is a clear indication that adjustment is necessary.

 There are adjusting knobs behind each wheel. These are little square looking things and clearly have no other purpose. I tried to remember which direction to turn these little knobs but they differ from front to rear and from left to right. It is best to turn them and then drive the car. If it fails to stop you have turned them in the wrong direction. If one or more of the wheels starts to smell or smoke, then you have turned them to far. A little practical experience (and a lot of test driving) will soon make you a master at this particular adjustment.
- (6) The Model A has a tendency to occasionally stick the starter. I am told this is because the Bendix and the flywheel really don't really like each other. But for whatever reason, it does happen. When it does, all you have to do is get a bunch of the guys from the club to rock the car. This didn't work for me the first time because (1) I had the emergency brake on and (2) I had my foot on the clutch.
- (7) The gas gauge in the Model A can also be a problem. If not properly installed when you fill the tank, gas may spill out into your wife's lap. Most wives don't like that.
- (8) I am also told that after a few years the mains may begin to leak. But since I don't know what these are or where they are at I just don't worry about it. Actually oil seems to drip out from all sorts of places. A simple solution to this is to just keep pouring in more oil.
- (9) Another problem is that sometimes when you turn left the horn honks, and when you turn right the lights go out. I haven't figured this out yet, but when I do I will write another article for you.




