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# Notes From Your President Mark Schwing. . .

February 2007 President's Letter

If you missed the January club tour to the San Antonio Winery in Los Angles, vou missed a great tour. Twelve Model A's and four modern irons made the tour. It was a wonderful day of fellowship, wine tasting and a great lunch. Put some air in your Model A tires, blow off the dust and join the club for the next tour. Modern cars are welcome too.

Kudos to our members Drain and Doris Marshall for receiving the MAFCA Service Award. The purpose of the award is to provide national recognition to those Model A club members who have demonstrated service within their chapters for not just a year but for continued service to their chapter and the Model A hobby. Drain and Doris were nominated by the Screenland A's chapter.

When I called MAFCA HQ on Friday, January 19th to arrange for the certificate of insurance for our pancake breakfast, I learned that MAFCA will not have general liability insurance after March 1st until further notice. It seems that J.C. Taylor had just informed MAFCA that the annual insurance policy premium would increase from under \$4,000 to \$92,000, a 25 fold increase. MAFCA's board says that this rate increase is simply not affordable. MAFCA is involved in preliminary discussions with other insurers in an effort to find a policy which covers our needs and is also affordable. These discussions will

not be completed until some time in February or March and will not be timely enough to provide insurance coverage for our annual pancake breakfast. There is a letter explaining the issue on the MAFCA web site at www.mafca.com. I urge all of you to take a moment and read the letter.

Apparently the increase is due to a settlement in the \$300K range over an incident involving a member and a golf cart at the Turlock swap meet several years ago. I understand that this was the only claim MAFCA ever had.

I am working with several insurers to obtain a special event policy to cover our pancake breakfast so the event can go on. The City of Orange requires that they be a named insured before executing a contract for Hart Park. Estimates for a single day event policy range from \$350 to \$800. I expect to have further information by our February meeting.

If your Model A is insured with J.C. Taylor, MAFCA's insurance issue does not affect you and your car insurance. Food for thought - my Model A's are not insured with J.C. Taylor. My modern auto insurance company, USAA, suggested American Collector Insurance of New Jersey. My policy has better coverage and a lower annual premium than J.C. Taylor.

# **OCMAFC Military Veterans**

# Donald Ratzlaff U. S. Army 1954-1956

In March of 1954 my "friends and neighbors" in Havre, Montana, offered me a 2-year, "all expense paid" world tour, as a member of the US Army. This offer wasn't optional so, with a few other draftees, I traveled to the induction center where we were met by men in white coats who directed us to "strip" and line up for inspection. We were asked questions like: "Do you have a pulse?" "Are you breathing?" "Have you been to school?" etc. In addition, we were told to cough, bend over, run in place, etc. We were told we would be spending time at Fort Ord, California where the US Army would devote eight weeks to educating us in the ways of self-defense, weaponry, and discipline. It sounded pretty good to me since I'd never been to California. They forgot to mention long marches with heavy packs, early morning musters conducted by drill sergeants with limited vocabulary, culinary disasters served daily without remorse and, training classes conducted outdoors, rain or shine. We were promised that, if we excelled, we would receive an additional 8-weeks of "advanced" basic training. Thank god I didn't excel; so was assigned to the US Army Security Agency at Fort Devens, Massachusetts. Here the Army decided I had an aptitude for code work and I was attached to the Army Signal Corps at Camp Gordon, GA. I was taught the wonders of translating audio dots and dashes into letters and words and vice versa; known as "Morse Code".

At the completion of training I was told to select the location of my next duty station. I requested Alaska so; the Army placed me in Southern Germany. My detachment was tasked with monitoring eastern-block military transmissions for decoding and use by Army Intelligence. At the time this was serious business and played a small part in maintaining a strong US presence in Europe. The good news was that we received a 3-day pass every 10 days; unusually generous for the Army.

In September of 1954 I read in the "Stars and Stripes" newspaper, that volunteers were needed for the Army ski patrol at Garmish, Germany. Being from Montana I thought I knew all about snow and sliding downhill on skis; so I volunteered. I received orders to report to Garmish in October. My first view of the Bavarian Alps made me doubt my sanity; they were mountains, not hills. The "volunteers" were assigned billeting at the "General Walker" hotel; nice quarters for the time. The following morning we were issued skiing equipment and taken by cable car up to the mountain slopes for a test of skiing abilities. The test was to negotiate a slalom course set down a steep slope where only the suicidal would go. Aiming for a slalom gate and then falling down repeatedly, got me to the bottom of the slope. The officer in charge sadly decided it would be easier to teach me to ski than seek another volunteer! The responsibility of the ski patrol was to care for US Personnel injured while skiing. I became proficient in skiing and administering first aid but Mother Nature then took control; the snow melted and my first ski season ended. During the summer of 1955 I was assigned as company courier to Munich. At 6 am each weekday I carried dispatches to headquarters in Munich and, dropped the CO's son off at his high school. At 1500 hr I would pick the son up and return to base; all day in Munich - tough duty. I returned to ski patrol duty

in Oct. 1955 and did request to extend my service to the end of the 1956 ski season. Sad to say, my CO declined my offer to further serve my country and so, I was rotated back to the

states for discharge in March of 1956.

Probably the most significant benefit of my army experience was the "gift" of the Korean GI bill. This allowed me, and many other servicemen, to attend college and secure a future in the American Dream.

# **Historians Corner**

Over a year ago I discussed with Tom Endy the possibility of a seminar on steering wheel repair. The idea fell apart because we didn't know of anyone who had the expertise to put on this type of seminar. A new revelation came to me; I'll check with our club Historian and have him research this type of repair. Oh Ya, I'm the club Historian. Well, here is an article from the Restorer, Volume 33, Issue 1, May-June 1988, I found. The prices and contact names may or may not still be in business but with the internet we can probably fine substitute suppliers.

# **Repairing Steering Wheel Cracks**

An original steering wheel has a nice feel to it and can be an attractive part of your Model A. However, cracks are often one of the features of the originals and can be a major problem. Eliminating them can be a demanding, and yet satisfying project.

## **Materials:**

- 1. Bowling ball plastic (example: "Ball Mate" from Terry Stevens Company). The local bowling pro shop will probably give you some. Take along a couple of 3 oz. medicine bottles. Although only slightly darker, this material does a good job of repairing our black composition wheels. For 1928 "Fordite" steering wheels, I suggest experimenting with epoxy glue and plastic dyes. 2. "Visco Fill II" from TAP plastics, Inc., Dublin, CA 94568
- \$3.75 per 1/4 lb. (enough for 100 wheels!). You will find retail sources in the Yellow Pages under the heading of "Plastics." This or a similar powder is the "secret ingredient" which prevents the plastic from running around the corners of the spokes, etc. It should take up about a third of the mix or until the running is controlled.

# Procedure:

First, clean up your steering wheel and go over it with 400 grit wet sandpaper. Prepare the cracks with an electric rotary tool, or dental H.P., to make a clean Vshaped groove to hold the repairing plastic. You may use a Sears pointed carbide or #701 tapered fissure dental burr. The tool will follow the crack nicely. Very small cracks may not need this treatment, and may respond to daubing on the plastic with a small brush.

Place the plastic — two to one mix — in a 2 oz. shot glass using a 1/4 teaspoon measuring spoon. Then add 1/3 Visco Fill. Make a mixing tool by bending the end of a 1/16" welding rod or similar. Dip the tool in and check how easily the plastic drips off. If excessive, add a small amount of Visco Fill. Put the mixing tool in an electric drill and mix the plastic for five minutes. A thorough mix is important. It will help bring bubbles to the surface and avoid porosity in the final repair.

Make a "spatula" by pointing the end and flattening the side of a three inch nail. Dip the spatula into the mix and work the material down into the base of the grooves and around the spokes. Continue filling the grooves to a 1/32" overfill. This bead should be just high enough to accommodate shrinkage, but not high enough to cause runs. Prevent possible runs by rotating the wheel back and forth, to counteract the force of gravity, for 30 minutes in a 75 degree room. Practice on a junk wheel if you are not sure of this process.

After the repairs have set for 24 hours, use an oval steel cutter to remove excess bulk. Then wet sand the areas flat with 220 grit paper for a smooth finish.

At some stage of this repair you may discover some voids in the repair despite your best efforts to avoid them. This may be okay on the under side of the wheel where they cannot be seen or felt. On the tops or sides of the spokes, however, you will want a perfect finish. This can be accomplished on a clean surface by daubing on another thin bead of plastic with a small paint brush. Unless the touchup is on an edge where gravity may cause a run, you can eliminate the Visco Fill.

Smooth the repairs with 220 grit paper, then 400 and 600, all wet. Buff the entire wheel using Tripoli or Shurshine compound. A satin finish is nice, and probably more authentic. Finish with a hard wax for a satisfying result. I hope this is helpful. Remember you may borrow any **Restorer** in my collection or any **Distributor** in our clubs collection. 

(This was about as bad as the traffic going on the freeway where there was an accident.) The rest, except for one passenger, enjoyed seeing how Valley Blvd. had changed. Many of us had a lot of memories of old Valley Blvd. from our youth. Some of the area looked like we were in Asia. Some areas looked a little familiar and some looked old like many an old city that is in transition without doing much about it. And, we especially enjoyed the country likedrive up over and then down Brea Canyon.

I think Saturday must be a big shopping day for our Asian neighbors in the San Gabriel Valley but we sure turned many a head to look at our cars. If we are to promote the Model A, we did it. The return trip took us about 1 hour 20 minutes.

### FUEL FOR THOUGHT

A new year is upon us and by the count of Model A's on our first tour it will be a great year. In preparation of happy tours it is necessary that we consider the possibility of break downs. Yes, we have had many road side seminars. As a car owner, either new or old, we must consider the need for parts and tool when the time arises.

The list that follows is composed of items needed in the past. The list may seem long, but in reality all items can be easily stored in the car. Do not use a tool box(s). Many items are small, and weigh almost nothing. So for example I use cotton socks, cotton gloves (for open and closed end tools, spark plug wrench etc.) and Zip Lock baggies. The most important then is a list of these items and were they stored. Make a list and keep it in your side door pocket. On a tour, time is important. Test every spare part by actually running it on your Model A before placing the part among your spares.

The list is divided into two groups: tools and supplies that should be carried all the time and stored under your seat. The other list is for those long tours.




