

I am writing this column on Sunday evening, March 30th, after completing our successful 47th Annual Pancake Breakfast. We always advertise that our pancake breakfast goes on rain or shine. We had a chance to prove that point as we woke to a light drizzle. The drizzle lasted on and off till about 8 AM or so and then the weather turned very nice by 10 AM. TECHNICAL 2008

Impromptu Tech Sessions

Remember, if you have special Model A needs, it may be possible to arrange an "impromptu" session to address those needs. The membership possesses a wealth of Model A knowledge and with the convenience of e-mail connections all things are possible. (Contact: D. Ratzlaff).

March Tech Session

The March technical session presented by Tom Endy and Pieter Dwinger was held at CHOC. The subject dealt with the disassembly, repair and reassembly of the Model A drive line, differential and rear-axle components. Photographs of the various procedures, highlighting the hardware and tooling required, were presented; a printed hand out of the material was also provided. As Pieter projected the photographs onto the screen, Tom provided a dialogue describing the procedures and tooling being shown. In addition, all of the hardware being discussed was physically present on a viewing table. The session was well attended, and very informative. It was also noted that the donut and coffee disposal activity went well!

I'm almost certain that most of the attendees will be tearing into their Model A differentials and rear-axles in the coming weeks – or NOT!

April Tech Session

This brings us to the April technical session; do any of you have fenders that could use a "face-lift"? Fender straightening/refurbishment (on or off the car) will be the topic of the upcoming April and May technical sessions. Paul Steed has offered his expertise and location (18081 Hallsworth Circle, Villa Park, CA 92667) for these sessions. It is anticipated that multiple sessions will be required to successfully restore a fender to "like new". The April sessions are scheduled for Tuesday, 4/15, and Saturday, 4/19, and again on 4/22 and 4/26. The sessions will start at 9am on all dates. The May sessions are to be scheduled. If you do not have a fender to work on perhaps one can be made available; wrinkles are easy to put into fenders. Maybe a loaner would be better. The purpose is to learn technique and also to share knowledge. Bring your body and fender tools if you have them; we will determine the tooling needs and scope the effort during the first meeting. Hope to see you there. As usual, donut and coffee disposal will be seriously undertaken.

<u>Model A Tech Clue</u> For those of us that "don't have a clue".

<u>**The Model A Cooling Fan</u>** (Taken From: Heart of America Model A Ford Club, Missouri Chapter MAFCA – Bob Hess)</u>

Prior to touring this summer check the condition of your cooling fan. Grab hold of one of the blade tips and move it in and out. Look for any play between the hub and the water pump shaft. Don't confuse this with water pump shaft end-play. The fan must be tight on the shaft with no play. If the fan is loose damage can result to the hub or shaft. Get the mounting nut tight to eliminate the play. If you can't eliminate the play then you already have damage and the fan or water pump shaft must be replaced. Failure to fix this problem will result in unwanted vibration and eventually the fan will fail. There are a number of Model A owners who can tell you horror stories about fan failures. The fan or parts of the fan can go through radiators or hoods and make a real mess out of engine and electrical parts or, heaven forbid, some-one.

For those of you with four bladed fans there are generally two types. The safest one is the original Ford fan in which the blades are riveted onto the hub. However, there are aftermarket fans in which the blades are bolted on; be sure the bolts are kept tight.

For those of you with the two blade fans you need to be extra careful. If the blade is bolted on be sure to keep the bolts tight.

If you have an original Model A two blade fan you need to GET RID OF IT! They are simply too dangerous to leave on your car.

I don't care about originality. Safety takes priority here. Original Model A fans were made by folding the metal over and shaping the blade then welding the two edges together. The blade is hollow inside. Over the years the inside rusts and stress cracks develop near the hub. It's not a case of if, but a case of when a blade will come off. The result is a lot of damage and some very expensive repairs. Every time a car comes into my shop with one of these fans I strongly suggest it be replaced. For my safety I just won't work around a running engine with one of these original fans on it. If you want an original looking two blade fan most all Model A parts suppliers have a cast aluminum version that looks very much like the original. It is a very nice quality fan. It comes balanced and black powder coated. If you are not sure if your car has an original or the aluminum type you can use a magnet to check it. If you have an overdrive I recommend using an original Ford four-blade fan or the new plastic five blade fan for better cooling performance.

Historian I By Richard Parrish

What an exciting time in history as the 19th century came to a close. The automobile, air plane, telephone, electric lights, radio, indoor plumbing and a host of other new inventions were appearing almost daily.

Henry Ford was the chief mechanic at Detroit Edison Illuminating Company. He was captivated by the new horseless carriage craze. June 4, 1896 at 2 AM the city was awakened by the new Ford "Quadra-cycle".

Henry was nothing if not ambitious. His first company failed. His second was taken over by stock holders, and the third founded in 1903 flourished and bore his name The Ford Motor Company.

He built two race cars which set speed records of the day. Barney Oldfield provided the publicity that put Henry "over the top" to become a major force in the new automotive field.


From 1903 to 1908 he made a large number of different configurations. There was right hand drive, left hand drive, single, 4 and 6 cylinder, large cars, small cars etc. He started with Model A. and added sequentially.

While most manufacturers of the time hand built each car individually and the parts were not interchangeable between cars, Henry's methods of mass production and extremely close tolerances of parts made everything interchangeable and of course cheaper. His assembly line quickly moved him into a major player position.

In late 1908 he created a car that would change the world forever, the Model T. He built them faster and progressively cheaper until 1927 with minimal changes throughout that time. Henry would have still been making Model T's if it hadn't been for the entire industry catching up. The Model T held the distinction of being the greatest number of cars of one model in the world for over 50 years until Volkswagen overtook their record.

Finally with much trepidation Henry gave in to his son Edsel's insistence they design a new car of mechanical excellence and outstanding styling. This was the car that truly should have been named "Edsel", instead, a new beginning with MODEL A.

More on Oil



SHADE TREE MECHANIC

A couple weeks ago, I was installing a new camshaft and tappets into an engine and I ran across an on-line article on flat tappet cam failures. It seems that the EPA has caused the oil companies to remove from their oils an additive called zinc dialkyldithiophosphate (ZDDP) because as engines age, it is hard on catalytic converters. But this additive has been in oils for many many years and is essential to long cam/tappet life. The muscle car crowd and the Porsche gang are apparently experiencing extreme wear in as little as 1000 miles. This whole controversy made me perk up my ears, because we have flat tappet cams in our Model Ts and lots of other antique cars as well. Maybe our lifter forces aren't as high, but I suspect that our old stuff is wearing out faster also. So ... what to do? I found three recommendations: 1) Add GM EOS (engine oil supplement) PN 1052367. This is a breakin additive but a lot of guys add 4 to 8 ounces at each oil change, 2) Use heavy-truck diesel-oil which is formulated for 18-wheelers and at present still has a full complement of traditional antiwear additives. Available at truck stops, Wal-Mart, and major auto parts stores, ShellRotella T oils as of '06 still have plenty of ZDDP additives. 3) Use specially formulated racing motor oils. Although the most expensive solution, these oils usually contain even more antiwear additives than diesel truck oil. Quaker State's line of Q-Racing, full-synthetic oils is one example of a product that has all the necessary antiwear additives and friction modifiers and is specifically formulated to keep extreme performance engines alive. I opted for the first recommendation. All my vehicles are the flat tappet type, so I added EOS to all of them, it is certainly not going to hurt anything.






