TECHNICAL 2008

JULY TECH SESSION

It seems like a month ago that we held a window installation session, ah - wait a minute, it was almost a month ago, July 5th to be exact. Where does the time go? Aside from that, we did manage to meet at Paul Steeds home in Villa Park and install several door windows. I brought a door from our Model AA truck which needed a window replacement. (Have you ever tried to remove hinge pins which have been in place 70 some years?) Les Redfield brought his '29 pickup needing both door windows replaced and Alan Perlmutter brought his '29 coupe needing a single door window replacement. A good turn out of club members (willing to help with the project) was had and, by noon all four door windows had been replaced. There were no incidents requiring medical attention and all windows were shown to operate properly, awesome! Did I mention that donuts and coffee were consumed in accordance with proper Model A restoration technique? That is "complete consumption and no parts left over".

AUGUST TECH SESSION

There is currently no tech session scheduled for August however, check the club website for any change in plans.

TECHNICAL CLUE (for those of us that don't have a clue!)

This month's technical clue comes to us via our own club member, Open Hood (John) Riggs. It seems that John's Model A clutch-pedal-attachment-collar broke where it is pinned to the clutch actuating shaft. This breakage is not as uncommon as one might think. The collar breaks roughly in half through the pin location; it's the weakest section. When breakage occurs, the clutch pedal no longer is "keyed" to the shaft so cannot actuate the clutch. To rectify this situation it is necessary to have both halves of the broken collar. The problem can then be temporarily

resolved via the application of a small hose clamp (approximately 1 ½ inch diameter).

Place the broken collar halves in their original position about the actuating shaft and pin. Now, fitting the hose clamp tightly about the broken halves will adequately lock the pedal to the actuating shaft and enable you to drive your model A to a location where a replacement pedal and/or collar can be installed. Our thanks to "Open Hood".

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HISTORIAN V

Clarification:

The "bank robbery" story last month was <u>NOT</u> <u>ME!</u> It is the story told by <u>my dad</u> about him <u>and</u> <u>my grandfather</u> in 1930.

This month's reminisce is by member, Sam Craig.

We lived on a farm in Albion Pennsylvania not far from Lake Erie. My family owned two 1929 Model A's, a Town Sedan and a Pickup.

The Town Sedan was dad's pride and joy. He polished it most every week. It was reserved for family outings, picnics and such. To the best of my knowledge, it was never outside the barn except when being driven and never during rain or snow. The car remains in the area, the restored pride of a new family.

The pickup was another story and more typical of the use of Model A's in my part of the country. It furnished day to day transportation on good days and bad. We transported everything you would expect a pickup to move and then some.

Helping dad drill holes in the maple trees with a brace and bit to gather sap for making maple syrup was a Model A task. She carried out tools, buckets and collection cans through the mud and snow.

Dad had special racks to fit into the bed stake pockets. One was like a cage to take a full size cow or two calves. Another rack turned the pickup into a big flat bed truck to transport hay or other bulky stuff around the farm or to market.

We used to "pull hay" into the barn. A long rope through the pulley at the peak of the barn and hooked to the pickup and we could drive foreword while the hay went up to the barn loft slick as can be.

Cutting wood with the "buzz saw" was another Model A task. Dad would back the little pickup near the saw,

jack up one rear wheel and loop a flat drive belt over the tire. We made short work of a pile of logs and made a little money to boot during hard times.

My favorite Model A memory is my Mom driving the pickup and Dad following behind with a plow intended to be pulled by a horse. Many acres were plowed with that pickup year after year. Our tough little pickup handled everything we could throw at her.

Model A's were used for every imaginable task. Many early ski area's had rope tow lifts run by a Model A. Thousands of skiers gave thanks for eliminating the exhausting uphill walk, side step or "herring bone" ascent of the mountain for a single run.

MY COUPE IS BACK

Back in 1975 I bought a 1929 coupe from an OC club member named Fred Yaw. The coupe had 60,000 original miles on it but had been painted and reupholstered in the 50s so it was not a car to show in the unrestored class. We used it for a while on local tours but it needed some mechanical work. I started to work on a few of it's problems and before I knew it the coupe was more apart than together. I finished taking it apart and in mid 1976 decided to restore the whole car to the best of my ability. The coupe would be my 3rd Model A restoration and the first time my goal would be to build a show car for national competition.

As part of my previous mechanical work I had done a valve job and adjusted the mains and rods. The engine ran really well so all I did to it was to strip it to the bare metal short block and repaint it and all the engine accessories. I had the frame and all the chassis parts sandblasted. I replaced all the bushings and bearings and then primed and sanded all the chassis parts and the wheels twice to remove any imperfections in the metal. I then painted everything with black, synthentic enamel. By today's standards, the chassis and wheels are over restored but that's how we did it back in the 70s.

The body and fenders were almost perfect and did not need any bodywork so I hand stripped everything with paint remover. A light sandblasting cleaned up the door jambs and other tight spots that were hard to get to by hand. Next I began the job of priming and wet sanding the body parts and fenders. I used various colors of primer for each coat so my block sanding would reveal any imperfections. I was running my business at the time and the 1978 MARC and MAFCA national meets were a little more than a year away so I spent most evenings and almost every weekend working on the coupe. Because the sheet metal was so perfect and because many 70s restorations were being done in bright colors, I decided the only color for my standard coupe was black. I had used Martin Senior black acrylic lacquer on the fenders and splash aprons of my two previous Model A restorations with good results so I bought a few more gallons of the same paint.

Over the next few months the chassis assembly, all the plating, the paint work, color sanding and hand rubbing were completed and I began reassembling the car. Along the way I learned that trying to build a "show car" can be very frustrating. Nothing I did seemed perfect enough. I did some things over with similar results but I pushed on as my deadline was fast approaching. We were already registered for the 1978 MARC national in Dearborn Mi. and the MAFCA national, a week later in Arlington Va.

I finally finished the coupe a week before we were scheduled to leave. I spent that week driving it around my neighborhood and checking each part with the minimal judging standards that were available in the late 70s. At the end of that week we loaded the coupe in the trailer, pulled by our 1976 Ford 460 Club Wagon van. The coupe, Sharon & I and our 3 girls headed East. Along the way we visited some

old friends that had moved to Ely Nevada, stopped at Yellowstone Park, Mt. Rushmore, the Black Hills, and several other points of interest. We arrived in Dearborn on time and had a great time at the MARC national meet. Our whole family participated and won awards in the era fashion show. The coupe got a second place in the car judging. The highlight of the event for me was also winning the Ditzler paint company's Best Paint trophy in a field of 800 Model A's.

After the MARC meet we loaded up the van and trailer and headed East again for Arlington Virginia and the MAFCA national meet. We stayed with my sister and her family who lived about 20 miles from the meet and I was able to spend some time correcting a few minor authenticity details on the coupe. We had a great time at the MAFCA meet and the coupe finally earned a national first place.

On the way back to Calif. we visited some of Sharon's family in Arkansas, some old neighbors in Texas and then pressed on along I 10 to home.

We showed the coupe many more times at Southern Calif. Model A events and a few Concours D' Elegance shows. My black coupe won lots of awards, but it eventually ended up stored in the lobby at my business.

When I retired in 2003 my friend and collector car dealer, Chris Unger, helped me sell three of my cars, including the coupe, to Art Astor who had a 300 car museum in Anaheim. A couple of months ago I read that Art Astor had decided to sell most of the museum collection at an auction in June. I immediately called Chris and asked if I might be able to get the coupe back. Chris agreed to bid on it for me as I was going to be at the national meet in Texas that week. Well to make a long story a little shorter, Chris won the bid and the coupe arrived here in Northern Calif. today, 7/17/08 via Passport Transport double deck semi-trailer. The coupe has now been restored for 30 years and has 1178 miles on it. About the same as it had when I sold it 5 years ago. I drove it home to my new garage where it shares space with my 4 other Model As and Sharon's 1947 V8 club coupe. Needless to say, I'm a happy guy.

Last year Sharon & I sold our house in Orange County and moved to Camino California, near Placerville. We are now members of The Hangtown As Model A Club and the El Dorado chapter of the Early V8 Club.

We participate in as many tours and events as possible and are slowly but surely getting to know our new car club friends.

My black 29 coupe looks pretty good for a 30 year old restoration. It needs a little dusting and a few small details changed to conform to the current MARC/MAFCA judging standards. When finished, I plan to show it at The Ironstone Concours in September and at the Northern California Regional meet next Spring in South Lake Tahoe. I might even trailer it up to the next MAFCA national in Victoria, BC in 2010 if I can still afford the gas.


