President's Letter

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LET'S KEEP DRIVING THOSE MODEL A's!!!

Don't forget the July and August meetings are Pot Luck dinner meetings. Please see the information elsewhere in this newsletter. This past month I had the opportunity to attend the MARC national convention in Merrillville, Indiana, from June 21 through June 26th. Unlike MAFCA's national convention every other year, MARC has a national meet every year. Merrillville is in northwest Indiana about 8 miles or so south of Interstate 80 and about a 65 mile drive from Chicago's O'Hare airport. The main location was the Radisson hotel which provided plenty of space for the raffle prize display, MAFFI, MARC and several indoor vendors in the "common room". That room also featured four Model A's on display including a Town Car. Various other meeting rooms and the ballroom were used during the week for various events including indoor, air conditioned fine point judging. The surrounding parking lots were home to Model A parking, trailer parking and one of the best national meet swap meets that I have seen.

The final registration figure was 546. This compares to last year's joint MAFCA/MARC meet at Dallas which had 877 registrations. Obviously most of the 546 were couples and even some families. There had to be close to 500 Model A's at the meet. From a stick pin map in the hospitality suite, most people came from Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin area with a smattering from various other states. I only saw three stick pins in the California portion of the map. Except for Sunday, June 21, the weather was rather warm and somewhat humid. Trips through the swap meet were best made early in the day. Among the many vendors in the swap meet area, one could easily find many used original parts, some new old stock and of course the usual

inventory of reproduction parts. There was a lot of sheet metal such as fenders, doors, and running boards available. A new NOS '30 right front fender priced at \$1500 caught my eye but fortunately would not fit in my suitcase for the return flights to California. Just kidding as both my cars are '31.

During Wednesday's fine point judging I participated on the Area 13 exterior sheet metal team. The team leader was Terry Dieter, the gentlemen who runs a restoration shop in Michigan just across the state line from Toledo, OH. Terry was contracted by Ford to do the restoration of the 20th Million Ford, a slant window town sedan. He has some very interesting stories about the restoration process and of what they found during the dis-assembly process.

There were 15 restored and 3 original cars entered in the fine point judging. Following the completion of the fine point judging, everyone had a chance to see the all cars closeup as the ice cream social was held in the same area.

By the way, it is very easy to become an apprentice judge and participate at the next national meet. This was my fourth national event as a judge and the learning process continues with every event.

Perhaps the most unusual item of the entire meet was the presence of three Town Cars, one on indoor display but the other two being driven around the meet. It is rare to see one of these models, even more rare to see three and very rare to see them actually being driven daily.

The next MARC meet is back in southwest Indiana in 2010 and the next MAFCA meet is in Vancouver, Canada, also in 2010. Get your passport early as they are now required for border crossings.

June - July Technical Session

Let's see if we can generate a little review of the technical activities

June Technical Session

The June activity was involved with the upkeep of the Model A Generator. The session was held at Paul Steeds' home on Tuesday, June 11th, beginning at 9am. The work area was set up on Paul's driveway; a table to work on, the required tools, coffee brewing and donuts displayed. There were approximately 9 club members in attendance, Gerry O'Brien, Bob Jeffries, Bill Mazurie and James Lewis brought generators of unknown condition, Pete Hyland brought a generator (operating in his car) which had excessive end-play. Over donuts and coffee the plan of attack was developed; we would disassemble the generators, verify the electrical integrity of the armature and field windings and check for excessive wear of the commutator, bearings and bearing surfaces. The generator would be reassembled with a new bearing, bushing and commutator brushes. There was general agreement on what a generator looked like but, great "in-depth" knowledge might have been a little thin. Luckily, we had some unexpected good fortune:

- 1. C. W. Moss <u>donated</u> brushes, bearings and bushings for six generator rebuilds.
- 2. Kevin Schaner loaned us a "growler" for testing armatures.
- **3.** Paul had a press-set-up for removing and reinstalling bearings; also he could provide a couple replacement armatures if needed.

Everything proceeded without a major hitch until Pete's generator was presented. First we should mention that his was a "working" device having excessive end-play. Upon disassembly it was found that the bearing had spun on the armature shaft. The shaft was worn undersized enough to displace the bearing retaining ring which resulted in excessive end-play. The decision was made to discard the armature and use one of Paul's "used" armatures. At this point things get a little vague; he said/she said/we thought the armature was tested. Upon reassembly, it didn't generate! It turns out Pete's generator had a couple non-standard innovations installed i.e. a diode cut-out and a voltage regulator circuit. Could it be that we had mis-wired or blown one or more of the electronic devices? Long story short, it turned out the replacement armature was bad (maybe we didn't test it after all?). Half a dozen or so iterations of generator disassemblies and finally a second armature replacement fixed the problem. (Does this qualify Pete for the "Hard Luck Trophy?). At the end of the day we had all learned a thing or two about generator maintenance. It was said that the perfect generator repair kit is called an "ALTERNATOR", now why would one say that?

I would like to thank C. W. Moss for their generous support of our technical session. I would also like to thank Kevin Schaner and Paul Steed for their help in providing test equipment and location for the session.

Chris Foster thanked Joanie Harris and Kathy O'Brian for providing the goodies.



Hart Park, City of Orange

The property for Hart Park was acquired by the City of Orange in 1933. It was originally 17 acres along Santiago Creek east of Glassell Street. During 1935-1936 the park was developed by a joint effort of the State Emergency Relief Agency (SERA) and the Federal Work Progress Administration (WPA). The most difficult task during construction was building the retaining walls to contain Santiago Creek; the work was all done by hand. The original name of the park was Orange City Park. The park was dedicated on May 1, 1937. The bandstand was built in 1938. The National Guard Armory on the east side of the park was built in 1949. Today the park contains about 45 acres.

The park was renamed William O. Hart Park in 1964 in honor of the long time editor of the Orange Daily News. Mr. Hart was also president of the Orange Community Chamber of Commerce. William O. Hart (1885-1942) should not be confused with the silent film actor William S. Hart. The photo of William O. Hart at right was taken in 1940.

The Orange County Model A Ford Club for many years has held their annual Pancake Breakfast at the park each year in the spring. The event annually draws over 1000 people. The number of Model A Fords driven to the event usually numbers around 300 and is considered the largest gathering of Model A Fords on a single day in the state of California. The numerous antique stores in the City of Orange also attract many of the visitors who come for the weekend to attend the event. The most recent event, held on March 29, 2009, was the club's 48th annual pancake breakfast ©

We had lots of joys, surprises and almost daily challenges. We met a lot of really friendly, helpful people! We Model A people know the routine of people waving, honking, and stopping in the parking lots to chat and help when it looks like we need it. We heard many a time; as you have: "Our father, grandfather, etc. had a car like that."

We dipped our wheels in the Pacific Ocean waters, the Gulf of Mexico at Ocean Springs MS, the Atlantic Ocean waters in Wilmington NC, Lake Michigan in Chicago and the Mississippi River at our daughter Karen's in Memphis.

Just south of Chicago we went to an Oil Seminar put on by the **Salt Creek MAFCA**

and Joliet Region MAFCA held at Dave Johnson's home. We met Jerry Sund who drove his A last December from Chicago to the MAFCA Annual Meeting in Mesa, AZ.

We returned home by that wonderful Route 66 (much of it). We left Chicago in pouring rain and headed West on the beginning of "The Mother Road" The road is rough, and the directions are sketchy but we had a grand time following the brown "Historic Route 66" signs. Several signs were missing but often would be painted on the pavement. In one place the road pavement was only 9' wide, held together by pot holes.

Our daily challenges included: Our overdrive breaking in New Mexico and **Tom Endy's** suggestion that it was a good excuse to replace it with a Mitchell. He arranged for Sue Mitchell to ship it to a Dallas MAFCA favorite gathering spot, a shop owned by Merle Gulick. Several guys gathered around to help, including George Tynan MAFCA past president. Lloyd Kerr a friend of **Piet Dwinger** and I was helpful with loaning us some carburetors to try out on the trip.

Frank Gemmell, of **Arizona MARC** set us up with a 6 bladed plastic fan from Sam Gutherie since we were overheating from pulling our 760# Mullens trailer. The question before we left was... How many parts and tools to take to fix your car when you go solo, versus how much do you take to guarantee that you do break down from too much weight? There were small things such as a fellow in NC, only 6 miles from our son, who gave us a washer to replace a broken one from our manifold. I got his name from the MAFCA directory as well as a Rich Norton, the president of a newly formed MAFCA club in Las Cruces NM. He took us to his home, high above the town, to replace our starter armature in his wonderful big shop. His wife Nancy invited us to supper and to spend the night. Two days later MAFCA member Mike Wade drove 90 miles each way to take our trailer down an 8,600 foot mountain so the freewheeling of our car with a broken overdrive would not burn out the brakes. We had talked to Mike prior to leaving about getting together with other Model A people for lunch in Artesia, NM.

In Georgia we were afraid that our increasingly loose quail radiator cap might fly through the windshield, so we stopped by Mikes "A" Ford-able Parts, in Maysville GA. and he did not have a new one, he graciously gave us a new standard cap to replace the greasy rag we'd been using as a stopper. And thanks to Charles Corry of Dallas MAFCA, we have our Quail restored. He makes a one piece tension bar to replace the tabs when they get bent.

First Street Ignitions in Ponca City, OK let us use their garage, out of the rain, for some maintenance. In Amarillo, TX Jerry Harris let us work in his garage to check over a few things and adjust our brakes as we ducked in from the stormy weather. Our contacts especially through **OCMAFC**, Santa Anita A's and the Model A Touring Club have been great. We got lots of over-the-phone advice from **Piet Dwinger**, and **Tom Endy**, even Les Andrews, by phone and from his great Model A Repair Manuals. Bob Travis of Santa Anita A's helped me restore the 160c a few years ago and was also a good back up of information.

The spring weather brought out beautiful flowers but in Carlsbad NM, we woke up with snow on the car as we set out for the Caverns. We frequently dodged hail the size of golf balls and wind driven rain. We delayed because of flooding just south of Chicago. We endured cold without a heater and a little heat without air conditioning. We seem to have hit "Tornado Alley" at a bad time and did a lot of revising our schedule. But, the springtime is mostly a pleasant time to travel with all the green and flowers. Texas was our biggest surprise with all its water, flowers and greenery all across the state.

Mid way in our trip, at a 50's drive-in in the Smokey Mountains John got his picture taken with Marilyn Monroe, standing over the steam vent, in front of the drive in. The Azalea Festival in Tyler TX was in full bloom.

Most traveling days were from 150 to 280 miles so we could see the sites. One day, on the way home, we did over 400 miles. That was too much in a 78 year old car and a 75 year old torso.

We had a grand trip yet it's good to be home. This country of ours is truly remarkable and is filled with great people who are willing to help in need and share their story about their car. They all loved seeing an old Model A drive down the road.

We look forward to giving our club a slide show of our trip in the not to distant future.

IGNITION SWITCH

The Ford pop-out switch (by Electrolock) is an ingenious device designed to prevent anyone from stealing your Model A.

The theft proof cable will resist efforts to enter by file or hacksaw. The connection in the distributor not only is difficult to connect to, but there is supposed to be a "bees wax" plug closing the distributor access hole. Even if you could jumper the distributor contact you could not start the engine because when the ignition switch is turned off, the entire ignition circuit is automatically grounded.

However, if the ignition switch should inadvertently be left in the ON position with no keys, the system could be jumpered.

It might be of interest to know that all Model A Fords sold in the Model A era were equipped with pop-out switches even though the switch design changed over the four-odd years of production.




