





TECHNICAL 2010

December Technical Ramblings

Guess this will be a non-technical article since we were all busy welcoming Santa and Christmas and planning the New Year Resolutions. I hope you all had a nice Christmas and were able to share it with family and friends. And since there is a New Year waiting just around the corner let me wish you all a very Happy New Year.

As you know, time flies and my 2 year stint as your "technical advisor" has come to an end but, never fear, word has it that "the do-some threesome" will be stepping up to fill the position. You will be in good hands: namely those of Bob Jefferies, Gerry O'Brien and John Knox. Let's help the "threesome" by suggesting topics of interest and attending the resulting sessions; remember donuts are made to be eaten and they will always go good with coffee and conversation.

Before I finish this article I want to thank you all for the patient tutelage that you gave me, I learned a lot about the care and feeding of Model A's. It has been fun and a real pleasure working with all of you and I hope I have managed



to be of some help now and then. I would like to especially thank Paul Steed, Tom Endy, Greg Earhart, Richard Parrish and Bob Jefferies for the help and advice given me throughout the past 2 years.

A technical clue for those of us that are "clueless"

Described below are a couple of things you can make that are handy when working with the oil pan. They are taken from the Cape Henry MAFCA Chapter Newsletter: The Grease Rag; Volume XXX No. 10, OCTOBER 2008



Oil Pump Holder – Used to temporarily hold the oil pump in the block when you drop the oil pan. You can purchase this from a Model A parts supplier (Bratton's #9895) or you can make your own. To make one you will need an adaptor with a 1/8" pipe thread and hole for a 3/16" tube. These are somewhat difficult to locate but you can get one from NAPA. Ask for a Gates adaptor part # G60596-0303. You will also need a 1/4"-20 x 1" thumb screw

and 1/4"-20 tap. The hole in the adaptor is the correct size for the tap. Cut threads in the adaptor and insert the thumb screw. To use the holder remove the plug screw on the right side of the block near the bottom of the oil pump and install the holder. Turn the thumb screw until it is snug against the oil pump shaft but do not over tighten.

Oil Pan Alignment Pins — Used to help align the oil pan and gasket when installing the pan. Cut the heads off of four 5/16"-18 x 3/4" bolts and cut a slot in the threaded shaft to accommodate a screw driver. Temporarily screw these pins into the block at the four corners of the pan opening, leaving about 1/2" protruding. Use the pins to align the pan and gasket while installing a few bolts to hold the pan in place. Remove the pins and finish installation of the pan bolts. This works particularly well when installing the pan from underneath the car.

Santa Ana Army Air Base

During World War Two Orange County California was host to one of the largest army air training centers in the country. It was an air base with no runways, hangers, or airplanes. Thousands of young men destined to become pilots, navigators, and bombardiers went through nine weeks of initial processing and training here.

Ground was broken for the facility on October 23, 1941 and it was activated on February 23, 1942. The base was located between Harbor Boulevard on the west, Newport Boulevard on the east, Baker Street on the north, and Wilson Street on the south.

Turnover of personnel was rapid so that by the end of 1942 23,470 soldiers had passed through SAAAB. By the end of 1943 that number jumped to 57,895. In the fall of 1942 SAAAB became an Overseas Replacement Depot (ORD) housing Army Air Forces personnel awaiting transportation overseas. In November of 1943 members of the Women's Air Service Pilots (WASP) began training at the base, followed shortly by members of the Women's Army Corp (WAC). In 1945 SAAAB became one of six Redistribution Centers in the country for airmen returning from overseas who were to be assigned stateside duty.

In late 1945 Japanese aliens from the internment camps who were being returned to Japan by the Immigrations and Naturalization Service (INS) were housed here while awaiting transportation back to Japan.

SAAAB continued as a redistribution and separation center for a short time after the war. On March 31, 1946, the base was officially deactivated. However, in 1956 elements of the 551st Antiaircraft Artillery Missile Battalion brought the Nike-Hercules system from Fort Bliss and temporarily installed and operated it at the old SAAAB site until their permanent installations (Site LA-88) in Chatsworth and atop Oak Mountain were completed.

In 1958 the base was declared surplus and soon afterwards the land was divided for many uses. In the postwar years private homes, apartments, Orange Coast College, the Costa Mesa Air National Guard Station, and the Orange County Fairground shared the land. Many of the base's original buildings remained in use for years by the college and the fair grounds.

It is interesting to note that a young John Riggs (Orange County Model A Ford Club) received his initial training here prior to advancing to pilot training, eventually to become a B-25 pilot and commissioned as a second lieutenant. At the same time a young Charlie Viosca trained here and became a B-17 pilot and was also commissioned a second lieutenant. Charlie currently lives in Frisco, TX (Dallas Model A Ford Club) and is the founder of the Victoria Association, the Model A Ford Youth Scholarship Program, and the Youth Restoration Program. \odot

About the teachers





Motor Trend tests an all-time great that is still going strong after more than 30 years, worth many times original price

WHEN HENRY FORD created the Model A in 1927 to replace the Model T, he felt he was offering the public only an "interim" car. The River Rouge genius wanted to give his customers a bigger, more comfortable car, with a gear shift, and a softer ride, and the engineers just about let it go at that. Ford was content, meanwhile, to watch the automotive winds blow, before shaping up plans for a bigger, and faster car in the future.

What followed was one of the success stories of the age. The Model A was not only successful to the tune of more than 4,000,000 from 1928 through 1931 (there were even 10,000 or so built in 1932 from parts), but it established longevity and value records which make it the most-often restored "antique" available today.

The Model A was a huge success, embarrassingly, even appallingly so, to Ford Motor Company. The public liked its low price, which got down to \$260 for a standard coupe, and ranged about \$500 only for such luxury models as a Sport Phaeton, Town Car and Victoria. Most of all, they liked the do-it-yourself simplicity, which meant that almost anyone with a handful of tools could keep his "A-bone" perking.

Most of all, however, the public liked the A's ruggedness its ability to take abuse and hard work without breaking down. A-owners were delighted to find that where other cars rusted out, the A's thick steel body panel, screwed over hardwood frames, showed no such problems. The four-banger engine, with its 200.5-cubic-inch capacity, its one-bolt carburetor, and its ridiculously low four-to-one compression, proved it could spin up 100,000 miles, or 200,000 miles, with minor attention to valves and bearings. Never a bear for performance, averaging only 21 mpg under optimum driving conditions, the Model A won its spurs on sheer reliability.

The 50,000 or more Model A restorers in the country today frequently tell the story of how Henry Ford visited Sweden in

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
