

#### President's Message ~ Ottomatic Tales

or my first President's Message, I want to start off with the fun I had in high school with my 1931 5-window coupe (Model A of course). During my junior year in South Pasadena High School, I bought a 1931 Model A Rumble Seat 6-wheel Ford. It wasn't much to look at, but my grandpa had an engine built in Los Angeles just off 3rd Street.

My grandfather, Walter I. Thrall, was an engineer who helped to build and design Boulder Dam and he helped Aerojet design the first jet engine in America.

As a 19 year old student at Cal Tech, he was one of the engineers who designed and built the Spirit of St. Louis for Lindbergh to fly the Atlantic in 1929. He did all the wing struts, the sheeting for the nose of the plane and the nose cone and all the machining for decoration. He's pictured in the book "We" by Lindbergh. He also designed all the gas valves to inflate the Gaff Zeppelin before its First World Tour. It was filled with helium rather than hydrogen, so it would not blow up like the

German Hindenburg.



Before that, he converted his foundry in Alhambra to making bayonets in WWI. These were special as they had rubber handles that would not rot in the trenches. The first ones were made of leather and rotted very quickly and were slippery when wet..not much use if one could not hang on to it in combat.

As a kid in high school, I lived with my gramps and learned drafting from him. During my college years, I rented a room with him so I could be his personal draftsman. Gramps was a insomniac and did much of his designing late at night when granny and I were asleep. Each morning, gramps would leave a bundle of new hand drawn plans in my trash can next to my drafting board. By the time he came home from work, I would have finished

several scale drawings of new ideas he had for Reliance Regulator, where he worked as Chief Engineer and General Manager for 60 years.

Needless to say, my gramps was a great influence in my life, teaching me many things about mechanics, including my first Model A. I have never been much of a mechanic, but I have always been a tinkerer of things. Now that I am retired, I am relearning things about my Roadster.- stuff I should have remembered from the five Model A's I had before I was 21 years old. Going fast has always been exciting for me and that's why I have tried to get more power out of all my cars, including my Model A's and my Model T. but that's another Ottomatic Tale. I've got lots of them. At last count, I've owned over 180 vehicles (some odd cars, cycles, and trucks) in my 76 years. I love to race and I love cars, especially my 1929 Model A Roadster.



#### **MAFFI Report**

The last week of October MAFFI Vice - President John LaVoy and board member Steve Ribeau attended the Specialty Equipment Manufacturers Association (SEMA) show in Las Vegas. This is the largest auto related show/convention in the world with over 6700 members. The exhibits covered every aspect of the auto industry in convention halls with one million sq.ft.

Why would MAFFI attend this show? Well, John LaVoy spent over a year and a half putting together a 31 RPU from as many new, after market, parts as possible. The original parts he had to use were the frame, rims, front end and engine. There is a great deal of interest in our hobby in that almost every thing is available to us today. This project was followed by the Ford Motor Co. and invited John to display his stock appearing RPU front and center in their large display area, which just happened to be across the aisle from the large NASCAR display. Needless to say, his little truck was seen by tens of thousands of attendees. People were continuously taking pictures and learning about our hobby.

I spent a great deal of my time seeking out possible sponsors for the Model A Museum, explaining our hobby, offering its demographics and telling them why their company should be involved. I met a number of individuals from PPG, BASF, Sherwin Williams. DuPont and 3M. to name a few.

An interesting note is that DuPont has been sold, so expect a name change after February of 2013. I also introduced a number of US manufacturers to our hobby in hopes that, with the information I supplied to them, they might consider making rings and pinions, look-a-like generators that are alternators and look-a-like but modern starters. I spent a great deal of time with them with the understanding that if they are successful, they need to support our museum. So far, we have a company working on the generator/alternator and starter projects and I am following up on the gear project.

A number of volunteers spent the first week of November working at the various displays in the museum building. One MAFFI and MAFCA member has been working very hard on trying to convince the Henry Ford Foundation to loan us the #I Model A given to Thomas Edison by Henry Ford when production began. Hopefully, I will have more to report about this soon.

# Catch up on what happened at last month's General Meeting — Read the Minutes

#### The Past is a Blast

The fads and slang of the day: slang used for "girls or women": a broad, a bunny, a canary (one who could sing), a charity girl (one who was sexually promiscuous), a dame, a doll, cat's meow, cat's whiskers.

Jazz age jargon: Joe College better yet a Joe Yale - or a Joe Zilch , jazzbo, jellybean, blind date, upchuck, jazz babies, posa-loot-ly, and the real McCoy.

Games included mah-jongg, Ouija boards, and crossword puzzles.

Races of endurance of all sorts gained popularity and included Marathons and flagpole sitting.

In 1923 dance marathons really became the rage. Harry Houdini was the great escape of the 1920s. American Baseball and other sports were very popular. The Miss America contest began in Atlantic City in 1921. Margaret Gorman (16 years old) was the first winner with measurements of 30-25-32.

Dance crazes included the Charleston, the Black Bottom, and the Shimmy. Dining was done at Sardi's.

As for costumes and fashion: clothing for men became a bit more conservative in the 1920s. Trousers were wider, up to 24 inches in width at the

bottoms. Knickers also grew in width and length and were called 'plus fours'. Popular during the Summer was white linen. For the winter, the raccoon coat, which was considered an outstanding American coat and it was very popular.

Very popular with the college men, was the slouch hat. It was made of felt and could be rolled up and packed into a suitcase. A wool suit was only \$15.85. Garters were 40 cents. All this and a 12" long cigarette holder. Cigarettes were 10 cents a pack.


