I yelled out "oil's dropping!!" just as the engine belched and then a loud bang, bang while two pistons crashed through the hood with oil spraying all over the car and us.



President's Message ~ Ottomatic Tales

Business deals with my family did not always go well. But in the case of the 1948 MG TC, all went well when my brother, Jim and I restored our jointly-owned car. It cost us \$1,300 and needed paint and lots of mechanical repairs.

lim was in high school, while I was in junior high. He got his license at 14, but I lost out on that age deal by two months as it changed to 16 for me. So, lim was our driver and I was the copilot for most of our activities and later races. Our agreement was to share the costs and rewards (if any). After a complete take down, we sanded, primed and painted (20 coats of yellow!) and then hand rubbed with corn meal. finished and, 2-3 months later, it looked super.

We rebuilt the engine, small cam, new valves and

rings and rebuilt carbs. The tranny and clutch were okay.

My dad (the race war sponsor and cafe owner) had us put a dash pump in to boost the low oil pressure to racing level. As co-pilot, it was my job to watch the pressure and pump like crazy when it was low. Dad also made us install aircraft seat belts and rebuild the brakes for safety. He always told us "you can always go fast, but you can't stop without brakes -a requirement he made us stick to if we wanted to drive-smart guy, my dad. He encouraged us to race the car in the antique road racing events, which was probably a mistake, but lots of fun and excitement for us. We figured we'd do well with Jim's guts, my efforts on the oil pump and all our hot lapping experience in the Jalopy

Races.

In our first race, our pre-race instructions were: "no tailgating, no passing closer than one car length closer than the car next to you, and no excessive speed." Jim wasn't buying any of it.

At the start of the race. lim took off as fast as he could and managed to hang in the middle of the group for several laps, with me boosting oil pressure faithfully. Then, about half way through the race, he began to "charge," passing one car after another (ignoring previous instructions by squeezing between cars with only a few inches of room to spare, tailing cars right on their bumpers until they pulled out of the way to save their antique paint jobs, and pushing the car beyond the red line two to three times each lap) until we were (Cont'd on Page 10)

OCMAFC Military Veterans — In Recognition of Those Who Have Served

Doc Ingwersen

USN 1942-1983

In 1942, when I was 19 years old, World War Two became a reality for me. My mother was a member of the South Gate draft board, and she would have to draft me if I didn't enlist in the navy. So, on July 2, 1942 I became an apprentice seaman. Not too much changed in my life, I remained at home and continued with college. I was already enrolled at UCLA in pre-dental courses. In March 1943 I became a na-

val cadet when I transferred to the USC School of Dentistry. While I was at USC I became re-acquainted with a high school classmate I had casually known. Her name was Darlene. In December 1945 I graduated with a D.D.S. degree and a navy commission with the rank of LT(jg), and with orders to report to the Bremerton Naval Base in Washington State. I served there until I received orders to Yokota Air Force Base, Tokyo, Japan. A week's leave gave me just enough time to come home on Tuesday, July 2 and marry Darlene on July 5, 1946 and report



back to Bremerton for transportation to Japan. Darlene had to remain behind in the states. I served 14 months at Yokota Air Force Base and was the only naval officer stationed there.

I served 40 years in the navy as a reserve officer. I was promoted to captain

April 7, 1979 and served as the commanding officer of the dental clinic at the Terminal Island Naval Base. I retired from the navy in 1983.

My son Bill Jr. also served in the navy and was stationed aboard the destroyer USS Maddox. The Maddox was one of two ships involved in the Gulf of Tonkin incident that led to the Viet Nam War. We attended the de-commissioning ceremony of the Maddox some years later and I was both surprised and pleased when I was given the honor of being piped aboard.

Historian's Corner—Antique Nationals, June 2nd, Drag Racing at Irwindale Raceway

On June 2, 2013 (first Sunday of June) the Four Ever Fours Club puts on their annual fundraiser event. This is a really fun drag racing event.

Spectators or racers come in around 8:00am. Admission \$15, under 12 yrs. are free. Tech card to race your car \$40.

The following article is a re-print of the last Antique Nationals I wrote about.

The year, 2008, the weather was ideal. The turn out was better than expected. **The Palomar Model A Club** was in full force along with our



Orange County Model A Club members.

This event is held at a sanctioned drag strip, racing is open to cars of any age up to 1954. Also era dragsters, both flathead V8's, six cylinder and of course Four Ever Four cylinders. You can race your stock or modified Model A, just have seat belts and a helmet.

I talked **Merle Mc Clellan** into going, not only is he a friend, but it increases safety for both of us on the highway.

Upon arriving, Larry McKinney directed us to good parking spots in the show car area. As it turned out I was only one car away from winning a <u>First Place trophy in the</u> <u>Antique category</u>. Well actually I was parked one car away from Merle Mc Clellan's car, who <u>actually</u> won the First Place award. I like to tell it my way better.



Merle's winning <u>near</u> **Bone Stock A Coup** is a black beauty. It does have <u>some</u> modification, like a Miller overhead B

inserted engine, .60 over with downdraft carburetor, headers, alternator, Ford truck 4-speed, includes 22% over in 4th gear, and of course 39 Ford hydraulic breaks to stop his radial tires mounted on 35 Ford 16" wire wheels. Oh, did 1 mention power windows and, of course, air conditioner?

During the day, I saw the only currently racing Essex, a Hudson roadster with a nail head Buick engine, only 11 of this body are known to exist, according to the National Hudson Club. p.s. it looks a lot like an early Mercedes. It seemed there was something for everyone.



Howard Kruegel, from the Palomar A's, showed me his near Bone Stock engine. As you can see, there is no limit to what can be done with the original engine Henry Ford created. (It's actually a Donivan engine, supercharged.) I'll tell you all about it <u>next time.</u>

Technical Tips—Bendix Starter Drive

The Bendix starter drive engages the starter motor with the flywheel ring gear to start your Model A engine. It's out of sight, so we typically

ignore it until it becomes a problem. Problems usually exhibit themselves by making strange noises or failure to engage when you try starting. Sometimes

broken parts can wedge between the flywheel and the flywheel housing, preventing the engine from turning.

Like most other parts on the Model A, the best way to prevent a problem is maintenance. When you have your starter out of the car, clean the Bendix assembly with solvent and a brush. While Ford did not use any lubricant on the assembly, a small amount of petroleum jelly on the large screw threads will make a cleaned unit work nicely.

Check the unit for cracked or broken parts, particularly, the drive head (round part furthest from the starter motor), the spring, the bolts and

books still recall the "Look. See Dick. See Dick run."

tabbed washers. The two bolts really take a beating, so pay special attention to these and replace if they look worn or bent. Use a little thread locker



on the bolts and use new tabbed washers. Bend one tab up against the bolt head and the other down against the edge of the spring that the bolt



goes through. Spring support clips were used at each end of the spring after June 1931 to help prevent the spring bolts from bending These are available from some Model A parts suppliers.

New Bendix units are available for under \$25, if yours is in really bad shape. An alternative is a modern "Bendix" unit that uses a magnet in-

> stead of the sometimes troublesome spring and bolt units. These are the preferred units for Model A's with 12 volt systems using a 6

volt starter. These are also available for under \$25.

Finally, check the starter armature shaft to insure that it is straight. This can be done by using battery cables and running the starter motor with the Bendix removed. It should run smoothly, without a lot of vibration. A bent shaft will ruin a good Bendix unit very quickly. For more detailed information, see Les Andrews' Model A Ford Mechanics Handbook, Vol. I pp I-20 through I-23.

This time we tried an oval track, hired a professional driver and watched from the stands. It was a safer and better view.

Jim continued to drive me to junior and then high school. One day, he left me in front of school and took off driving like a mad man. I later learned he had been racing in the school zone, hit water, spun out and hit a fire plug, flooding the street, and totaling both his and my half of the MG.

Next thing I knew, he was home with mom having a very serious talk. We all went to Juvenile Court and the judge gave my brother and mom a choice: One year in Juvenile Hall or walk

down the street to the US Navy Recruiting Office and sign up for four years. My mom took Jim by his ear and walked him straight to the Recruiting Office. He left the next day for San Diego. I saw Jim several times over the next four years. Jim signed up with the Naval Air on the U.S.S. Boxer and was assigned to hook the planes to the launcher for takeoff with three days on/four days off. On his off time, he raced motorcycles at Hickam AFB in Honolulu.
