

Mary Anderson was an American inventor of the 20th century born in 1866 in Greene County, Alabama. Her professional pursuits were varied, ranging from real estate development to cattle farming and managing a vineyard. After her father died, Anderson moved with her mother and sisters to Birmingham, Alabama. At the time she was 24 years of age.

As soon as she had settled into the new town, she ventured into real estate by building the Fairmont



Apartments. In 1893, she decided to move to California where she established a cattle ranch and a vineyard. She managed and operated these until 1898 but soon returned to Birmingham to care for an elderly aunt. Her aunt reportedly brought 17 trunks with her, the contents of which were a jealously guarded secret. After her aunt's death, the trunks were found to contain cases of gold and precious jewelry, which put an end to the Anderson's financial worries for good.

While visiting friends in New York in 1902, she was waiting for a trolley car and she noticed that it was very inconvenient for motorists to drive in the snow as visibility was severely impaired in the harsh weather. Drivers had to stick their heads out the windows to see properly and make frequent stops in order to clean the sleet and snow off the windshield. People were basically using their intui-

tion to get around in formidable weather, and could do nothing but be careful. Some engineers at the time had suggested a windshield which could be partly opened but it exposed the driver to direct contact with the wind and snow and did not help to improve visibility very much.

This gave Mary Anderson the idea of designing a device that could be used to clean the windshield of rain, sleet and snow without having to get out of the vehicle. When she got back home to Birmingham, she began to create a design for such a device and also hired a designer. Her efforts led to the creation of a manually operated device which could be triggered by a lever located inside the car. The device would be lined with rubber that would wipe the windshield clear of snow and sleet. Anderson commissioned a local company to produce a prototype for her.



Her initial efforts were ridiculed but she successfully managed to obtain a 17 year patent for the wind-shield wiper in 1903.

In 1905 Anderson tried to sell the rights to her invention through a noted Canadian firm, but they rejected her application saying "we do not consider it to be of such commercial value as would warrant our undertaking its sale." After the patent expired in 1920 and the automobile manufacturing business grew exponentially, windshield wipers using Anderson's basic design became standard equipment. In 1922, Cadillac became the first car manufacturer to adopt them as standard equipment.

Mary Anderson resided in Birmingham until 1953 where she continued to manage the Fairmont Apartments until her death at the age of 87. At the time of her death she was the oldest member of South Highland Presbyterian Church.

FACTOID: In 1832, Harvard professor Charles Follen became the first person in America to decorate an evergreen tree with candles.

HISTORIAN'S CORNER

In this and the coming months ahead, the "Historians Corner" will feature interesting and informative articles that pertain to our Model A Fords.

This is a copy of an article first published in February 1963 and then concluded in the April 1963 edition of the fledgling Distributor newsletter, vol., issues 4 and 6.

The member author was Pete Corti.

Why Buy a Model A?

I have asked many Ford owners, "Why do you like the Model A"? Every answer seemed to be a little different, but the answer that reoccurs most frequently is economy. Is the Model A really economical? Its gas mileage averages around 15 MPG and most six cylinder automobiles average at least that. Then economy must be in its maintenance.

The Model A was designed and built with the average person in mind, not a mechanical engineer; but just a person that knew how to use a pair of pliers, screwdriver and a monkey wrench. The early Ford owner had to know how to perform his cars basic needs, and would never imagine having a \$30.00 tune up bill like auto owners today. I believe the average person in the 30's was better prepared to repair his own car. Now days, because the automobile is complicated, and the lack of effort on the part of the owner, few people are able to perform their cars mechanical needs. Most owners either say," too much equipment is needed or "I don't have enough time". This could be true, but it is very unlikely.

Buying a Model A lowers the hurdle of concentrated effort needed to repair an automobile, which opens the world of mechanical participation and ingenuity. This makes it not only possible to perform the cars needed attention, but also conditions the participant for later model car repairs.

Few if any, special tools are needed to perform any mechanical task on the Model A. Take changing a tire for instance. The only tool actually needed is the jack, which was supplied in all new Fords. Position the jack securely under the frame and raise the car until the tire is off the ground. Then squeeze the beading of the tire towards the center of the rim. Slip the tire off the rim by starting at one side, progressing around the edge. Patch the tube and replace the tire. Then pump the tire up with a tire pump. It should be ready to use again. Try this on a late model car and you will find it is impossible.

Many Model A's were sold because of these and other economy factors. Not until the last few years has there scarcity been noticed. Because of this and the fact that their economy has been proven over the years, people are finally realizing that the old guy down the street isn't so stupid after all. Now the Model A is being brought out into a new life. Their early, somewhat discriminative life has given birth to a new role. The Model A owner today is not just the average person as that of yesteryear. Now he is a person from all walks of life, a person that appreciates tried and tested transportation. You can bet an owner has pride of ownership because he is driving a car of antique luxury.

History ~ In February 1963, the postage required to mail the two sheet mimeographed club newsletter increased from 3¢ to 4¢ according to the stamps on our archived "Distributors".

Club History ~ Did you know? Our club name wasn't always the Orange County Model A Ford Club "OCMAFC". We were originally known as the Model A Ford Club of America, Orange County Chapter



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Model "A" Information

As this is the last article I will write as Technical Director for the club I thought I'd share the sources I have used to collect parts and information on all things "Model A". For parts, in a hurry, a trip to C.W. Moss on Chapman, in Orange is always a good place to start. Ebay has proven to be a good way to spend a decent amount of money on parts that at times can be questionable at best. That being said, it can be a good way to get vintage parts, as long as you know how to tell originals from repop and the salvagablity of those parts. If you are willing to wait a bit, I like Bratton's because of the quality of the parts they sell, followed by Snyder's and MAC's. Local Model A swap meets (and many not so local) can be a good place for parts as well, again as long as you can tell original from repop and what can be salvaged. If you don't you just need to be willing to get soaked a few times buying parts you thought were original only to find they were repop or just not salvageable. Years ago the Pomona Fair Grounds shows were a good place to find Model A parts but I've been pretty disappointed as of late by the lack of Model A parts to be found there recently.

As for information a great place to check is FordBarn. The Model A forum there is simply fantastic. You'll see many well informed Model A'ers providing great information there including former club members like Glenn Johnson and Tom Endy. "Model A basics – How things work on a Model A Ford" is a great website for detailed information with fantastic graphics. The MAFCA site is a phenomenal site for information on cars as well as upcoming events. Another huge plus is their "A" of the day feature especially if you just can't get enough of seeing Model A pics! I especially love the pics that are recent but look as though they could have been taken in the 30's because of the locations.

YouTube is simply amazing. I don't know how we got along without it. You can enter just about any question regarding Model A's and find someone willing to share a video with the answer. To be honest that goes for just about any subject you can name!

Lastly some folks have asked me how'l get those videos off of YouTube. I use a site called "KeepVid.com". You simply find the video you want then copy the address from the address bar (highlight it using your mouse then use the Ctrl key + C to copy it). Open the KeepVid site and paste

the address in the field at the top of the webpage (click in the field then press, Ctrl key + V to paste). Next hit the "Download" button. You'll be presented with a list of download options. Click on the one you want, I use the "Download MP4 (Max 480p)" option but you'll want to experiment until you find the one that works best for you. The download will start and next thing you know you've got the video to share. Hint: You'll find the video in your "Downloads" folder.


