

A Model A Reflection

Today I went to the Model A tech seminar on windows. It was a wellattended event and I knew many of the people there, even though I've been mostly absent for several years. I drive a non-Ford, but was welcomed just the same and the window technology applies to my car as well as the Model A Ford.

Many thanks to Don Geisen for sharing his man cave with the bunch of us. He had all the necessary tools and work areas as well as enough floor space for the bunch of us to gather around the work and instruction moments to see and participate and take notes.

Today the group worked on a window for 3 cars. First was a driver's door window for a 2 door sedan, second was the windshield for a coupe and third was the windshield for a station wagon. In all three cases I can definitely say many hands made a difficult job pleasurable.

Watching the work on the 2 door sedan exposed me to many of the frustrations and successes one discovers while restoring an old car. This activity required the window regulator to be removed from the door multiple times and the regulator to be adjusted lubricated and even altered. Some of the frustration with the parts coming out and the ones going in were typical for such a restoration. In this case the old regulator had a broken spring hub shaft making it difficult to raise and lower the window. The new part needed much altering and shaping and ultimately didn't fit the repair that was desired. At the end of the moment the original regulator returned to the door only this time very well lubricated and the window operated satisfactorily until other restoration arrangements could be made.

The coupe windshield needed help fitting screws through the new rubber seal. Windshields are heavy and awkward and breakable and so this is a repair that one person really shouldn't try to tackle by themselves. Today there were many willing and knowledgeable hands to help with this task. Even though all the screws were not completely installed today's help got the most of them in and the car owner can complete the task on his own.

The station wagon is being completely restored and today got a new windshield glass installed into a fully restored windshield frame. Again many hands really helped in this effort. Again new materials didn't work the first time and in this case the rubber that wraps around the glass in the frame was the wrong size the first time and so the glass had to come completely out and a different rubber seal installed with the glass.

Today's adventure was a clear reminder to me that a restoration process is not a clearly defined science. Often the tasks of fitting and replacing parts and modifying old parts are required. This means that frequently things must be assembled and again disassembled until the right fit and the correct operation are achieved. Restoration of anything can be very frustrating with little to show for the effort, but with so many supporters around courage is rallied and tasks become possible and resulting smiles on the project owner's faces makes it all worth the effort.

...and me. I took home a bunch of notes so when it comes to my turn I have a better idea of what to expect and also a better idea of what should be tackled by more hands than only mine.

This month we continue the three part look at the 1931 160 A, B, C series. Today we feature the **160 B DeLuxe Slant Window Town Sedan.** The purpose of this series of articles is to highlight the differences between the 160 A, B, C. To accomplish this we looked last month at **Gerry and Sherry Reid's** restored 160 A Standard Sedan. This month we will feature **Dick and Carmen Smith's** restored 160B.

The 1931 Model 160A was the economy standard model and was probably a higher seller back in a troubling economy. The exterior featured no cowl lights, limited body colors, black spoke wheels. No side mounts.

In 1931 Fords sales were plummeting, Ford was losing about \$75 every time it sold a car. Ford tried desperately to cut his losses. He tried styling changes to some models. He decided to introduce more Deluxe models and expand its truck and commercial lines. **The 160 A Std** interior came with front rubber floor material, no interior sun visor. All window trim was painted a maroon color. There were no arm rests, the upholstery was a check wool and did not have a seat strap for rear passenger lap blankets. The dome light was in the ceiling center.

The 160B Town Sedan has additional exterior features. It features cowl lights, and many additional color combinations. In June, Ford began to offer colored spoke wheels to match the body stripe on all DeLuxe closed passenger types, but not including the Victoria, Town Sedan or Cabriolet. On those models, as well as the Standard types, a charge for color was \$5.00. The standard colors were black, Chicle Drab, Kewanee Green, Maroon, Brewster Green Medium, some other colors were available thru the dealer; this 160 B as shown in

Rubelite Red, a color requiring special order. This color became available on COMMERCIAL vehicles after Sept. 1930 through 1931. (Continued on Page 7)




