Model A Excitement

Driving a Ford Model A can be exciting; especially an un-modified Model A. That would be one with the original 4 cylinder (40 horsepower) power plant, a "non-syncro" 3-speed transmission, mechanical brakes, manual-choke,-throttle,-spark adjustments and a 6-volt battery and generator supplying the electricity for starting and operating the engine and accessories. The excitement begins when trying to start the engine and, keep it running, while manually adjusting the choke, spark and throttle settings. Additional excitement comes from having to double-clutch when shifting up through the gears and having to sync engine speed to road speed when down shifting. More excitement can be experienced through driving at night with headlights capable of lighting up six feet of the road in front of the car. One might also derive some excitement from wondering whether that car, fast-approaching from the rear, can see your lonely little tail light.

However, a real rush of adrenaline can be had when it is necessary to stop at an intersection at the bottom of a hill. Standing on the brake peddle will produce a noticeable decrease in speed but stopping is another matter. With luck the vehicle will stop just beyond the intersection, assuming no cross-traffic. If there happens to be cross-traffic; then prayer may help. One or two of these episodes will have a pronounced effect upon your love of driving a Model A; not to mention your level of hypertension.

Such a recent "braking" event has prompted me to purchase and install a set of brake "floaters" into my 1929 Tudor. The floaters are the product of "Flathead Ted" Enterprises of New Zealand and were featured in a recent article in the Model A Times. After installing the floaters I am happy to report that stopping at the intersection at the bottom of the hill was accomplished without the prayer. A significant improvement in braking ability was achieved. However, I would still advise against all panic stops in a Model A. Who needs all that excitement? (Continued on Page 8)

Historian's Corner

Dick Smith, Club Historian/Librarian

For this month I have been asked to re-print the article that featured the 1931 Model 160 A, B, C; highlighting a Club Members car from each model group.

The purpose of these articles is to highlight the <u>differences</u> between the 160 A, B, C. To accomplish this we will look at one model each month. We will start with the 1931 160 A and share some facts and photos.

160 A Slant Windshield Sedan

The exterior featured no cowl lights, limited body colors, black spoke wheels. No side mounts.

The new Slanting Windshield was introduced in November of 1930 to the Victoria Model. It featured the slanting visorless windshield, which retained its opening capability.

When Ford designed the slant windshield sedans, it was determined that there would be no dimensional differences between the bodies built by Briggs, Murray, and the Ford plant, as with previous Fordors. It is therefore difficult to identify the manufacturer of a particular body. Some have Murray body badges, and others have Briggs markings, but many have no clues.

In April of 1931 the slant window was to be available for the standard sedan and in May for the Cabriolet.





I30 A The <u>Standard Sedan</u> <u>differences</u>. The <u>interior</u> came with front rubber floor material, no interior sun visor. All window trim was painted a maroon color. There were no arm rests, the upholstery was a check wool and did not have a seat strap for rear passenger lap blankets. The dome light was in the ceiling center.



The 1931 Model 160 A was the economy standard model and was probably a higher seller back in a troubling economy. But very few have survived. This is the only one listed in our 2016 Roster.

Thanks to **Gerry and Sherry Reid**, whose 160A has been in their family since new.

ACCC Legislative Status Report

The June 2016 ACCC deFender newsletter contained another table update on a number of legislative issues. This table was even larger than the prior deFender newsletter update from a few months back—more legislation on the table! In order to pass this information on to you, I have updated the table from our previous Distributor issue to have the latest information from the ACCC. For even more up to date info, Google is your easiest bet or visit www.acccdefender.org. Measures that are **BOLD** are newly added, Positions that are **BOLD** are newly revised/established.

Measure	Status/Location	Position	Description
AB932	2-Year (unchanged)	Watch	Specialized license plates for professional sports teams.
AB1591	Trans.	OPPOSE	Transportation funding: would raise license fees by \$38 per vehicle; increase fuel taxes by \$0.225 per gallon; and increase the VLF on electric cars to \$160.
AB1752	Appr. Suspense File	Watch	Registration Fees: Would require the DMV to clearly identify the registration fee as the base fee on any renewal and separate additional fees as distinct line items.
AB 1965	Appropriations	OPPOSE	Vehicle retirement & replacement: Would require the state board, in consultation with the bureau, to set specific, measureable goals for the retirement and replacement of passenger vehicles and light-duty and medium duty trucks that are high polluters and to ensure those goals are met by updating the program's guidelines no later than July 1, 2017.
AB2303	APPR	Watch	Specialized license plates: would require the DOT to apply to the DMV to sponsor a bicycle pathway license plate program.

ABXI 3	Conference Committee	Watch	Transportation funding: enact permanent sustainable sources of transportation funding to maintain and repair highways, local roads, bridges, and other infrastructure.
ABXI 4	9/3/2015-S RLS	Watch	Transportation funding: Enact legislation to establish permanent, sustainable sources of funding to improve the state's key trade corridors.
SB773	7/17/2015-A. 2 Year	Watch	Vehicle registration fraud study: authorizes a University of California study on failure to register and fraudulent registrations and recommended strategies.
SB778	1/26/2016-A. Desk	Watch	Automotive repair-oil changes-notification to customers. Requires the repairer to notify the customer of the manufacturers oil change interval recommendations per the owners manual.



SBX1-I	4/21/2016-S. APPR.	OPPOSE	Transportation funding: would provide for the deposit of various funds for road maintenance and rehabilitation for maintenance that has been deferred.
SBX14	Conference committee	Watch	Transportation funding: Declare the intent of the Legislature to enact statutory changes to establish permanent, sustainable sources of transportation funding to maintain and repair the state's highways, local roads, bridges, and other infrastructure.


