Authentic Model A Colors in a Spray Can

Achieving an authentic look is important to many of us who choose to restore our car back to its original condition. In the area of painting, it becomes difficult without the training and equipment of a professional.

However, for small items such as interior trim and other metal components, spray cans are a viable option. Once you have the paint code in hand (acquired from guidance in the **MAFCA Paint & Finish Guide** and the PPG or DuPont customer service group), your local distributor for such popular brands can provide the authentic colors in 12 oz. spray cans. Color matching can also be achieved by providing a good sample (I used

the windshield visor) to be analyzed at your distributor by hand held color matching equipment. The spray cans are typically a single component acrylic enamel providing ease of application, excellent shine

and durability. Of course, good paint finish requires proper metal prep regardless of the spray equipment utilized.

The spray can shown below contains the popular Copra Drab for a 1930 coupe utilized to paint the dash panel depicted.

ACCC Update—Largest Gas Tax Increase in California History!

As reported in the last ACCC update, SBI has since been passed and was signed by Governor Jerry Brown. This bill is not just a threat to our hobby, but it is a detrimental to all California vehicle owners. As a reminder, SBI was legislation to increase gasoline taxes and to increase registration fees on all California Vehicles. With the passage of SBI, here is what you can expect starting January 1, 2018:

43% increase in gasoline taxes, 12 cents a gallon in new taxes

125% increase in diesel fuel excise taxes, from 16 cents per gallon to 36 cents

A 5.75% increase in the sales tax on diesel fuel

New registration fees ranging from \$25 to \$175 depending on the value of the vehicle, set to increase each year with inflation

\$100 annual fee on zero-emission vehicles (effective July 1, 2020)

\$52 Billion in new taxes paid to the State of California over the next 10 years

The registration feel is called an Transportation Improvement Fee (TIF). The TIF will be based on the market value of the vehicle with the fee range described as follows:

\$25 per year for vehicles with a market value \$0 - \$4,999

\$50 per year for vehicles with a market value \$5,000 - \$24,999

\$100 per year for vehicles with a market value \$25,000 - \$34,999

\$150 per year for vehicles with a market value \$35,000 - \$59,999

\$175 per year for vehicles with a market value \$60,000 and higher

It hurts just to share this information! Consider the increases on diesel fuel alone—what impact will that have on the cost of goods and shipping? Everything we buy has to be transported via truck. What about ordinary Californians? The cost of going to work just increased significantly. Governor Brown states that it will only cost Californians about \$10 per month—but when you consider the combined effect of all the taxes, surely it will be far greater.

So what can we do? Assembly Member Travis Allen, R-Huntington Beach filed an initiative to repeal SB1 and move it to the November 2018 ballot. He needs 365,000 signatures from registered voters within 150 days to put the measure on the ballot. Make an effort to sign Assembly member Allen's initiative or contact your local Assembly Member. Call, email and write letters to your representatives in the Senate and Assembly directing them to act on behalf of the constituents. If we don't, the hurt is going to be in owning and driving our cars.

Louis Réard: Never to be Forgotten

This is Louis Réard. He was born in 1897 and died in 1984. He was an automobile engineer but also designed a product that became famous the world over. What was it?

First, when one is discussing creatively gifted automotive engineers, a few fabled and legendary names are normally exhumed and bandied about: Ferdinand Porsche, brothers Horace Elgin Dodge and John Francis Dodge, Dante Giacosa (Fiat), Henry Ford... Too often in the midst of such discourse, enthusiasts fail to recall the accomplishments of Louis Réard. Mr. Réard was an engineer at Régie Nationale des Usines Renault SA in Billacourt, France, where he helped develop and refine such 1930's models as the Primaquarte and Nervasport. Report on June Seminars

We had three seminars on three consecutive Saturdays in June:

On Saturday June 10th, we held a "Water Pump Replacement Seminar" at Frank Reese's house. Frank decided to replace the water pump because it was leaking. We tried to remove the pump without removing the radiator, but were unable to remove one of the four studs. Fearing the stud might break, Frank decided to leave the stubborn stud in place and move the radiator out of the way. To make this job easier in

the future, there are bolts available from the online Model A parts stores that are machined to look like the original studs and nuts.

These make removal of the water pump much easier without having to (re)move the radiator.

On Saturday June 17th, we held a "Valve Seat Grinding Seminar" at Phillip Joujon-Roche's garage.

Phil's 1931 400-A Convertible Sedan was back firing and running poorly. The problem was isolated to a badly corroded valve and a damaged valve-seat. John Hollins ground the valve-seat with a grinding stone and drill.

On Saturday June 24th, we continued the job at Phillip Joujon-Roche's garage. The valves were installed and adjusted. Studs were installed in preparation for the installation of the head.

1932 RENAULT NERVASPORT

RENAULT PRIMAQUATRE

The Renault Primaquatre was an automobile produced from 1931 to 1941 by Renault, the last car built before Louis Renault's death in 1944.

However, what makes Louis notable is what he accomplished in women's ready-to-wear. You see, Louis took over his mother's lingerie business in about 1940⁻ It was located near <u>Les Folies Bergères</u> in Paris and Louis decided to change careers and become a clothes designer. While on St. Tropez beaches, he noticed women rolling up the edges of their swimsuits to get a better tan, which inspired him to design a swimsuit with the midriff exposed. [There is clue.]

Louis Réard produced a swimsuit design which was a string bikini consisting of four triangles made from only 30 square inches of fabric.

When Réard looked for a model to wear his design at its debut presentation, none of the usual models would wear the suit, so he hired a 19-year-old nude dancer named Micheline Bernardini from the Casino de Paris to model it. He introduced his new swimsuit, which he named the *bikini*, to the media and public in Paris on July 5, 1946 at a popular public pool in Paris at the time.

Just four days prior to its unveiling, the United States Navy had detonated a 23-kiloton atomic bomb over the tiny Bikini Atoll in the South Pacific. Thinking his swimsuit would have the same sort of dramatic impact on the public, Louis registered the Bikini name for his creation. His instincts proved correct. Outside France, most thought them scandalous. The Vatican issued a condemnation. Italy and Spain banned them.

Nevertheless, initially meager sales steadily built momentum, until worldwide moviegoers observed Brigitte Bardot wearing one to great effect as Juliete Hardy in Roger Vadim's 1956 film, And God Created Woman. Thereafter, Réard was able to enjoy a comfortable retirement at his Swiss villa.



Two piece swimsuits had been available since least since the

1930s, but Réard's bikini was controversial because for the first time the wearer's navel was exposed.

The bikini was a hit, especially among men, and Bernardini received some 50,000 fan letters. Réard's business soared, and in one ad campaign, he kept the bikini mystique alive by declaring that a two-piece suit wasn't a genuine bikini "unless it could be pulled through a wedding ring." As a further booster for sales, Réard commissioned renowned carbody specialist Chapron to build an extravagant "road yacht" by converting a Packard V8 car into a mock luxury cabin cruiser complete with cockpit, portholes, anchor, signal mast and other nautical regalia. The car (not an amphibian) went on advertising parades and followed the Tour de France cyclists in the early 50's, with a crew of bikini clad girls, causing quite a sensation in France.In Réard's later life, he opened a bikini shop in Paris and sold swimsuits for 40 years.

In 1980, he moved with his wife, Marcelle Réard, from France to Lausanne, Switzerland. He died in Lausanne in 1984 at the age of 87.
