




The New Ford Roadster

Contrary to my "no freeway" promise, the



BUILD A DISTRIBUTOR WORKSTAND

In the process of rebuilding several Model A distributors, I have developed a workstand which has proven to be very helpful. The distributor casting (with the upper shaft in place or removed) can be mounted at a convenient work height and be held securely without the use of a bench vise. The stand consists of an upright portion (3" square) with a 1" hole drilled vertically to a depth of approximately 4". A second and smaller hole is drilled in the top of the upright to accept the index pin on the casting. When in place on the stand, the distributor is held securely and will not turn during restoration. A base is secured with a wood screw and glue as well as two supports for additional strength. The whole project can be constructed of scrap wood, a few screws and wood glue in less than an hour. It may not revolutionize the hobby, but it does make this job a lot more convenient and protects that metal casting!

The Reminiscences of Mr. Harold Hicks

... I was taken off aircraft work for a while to help develop the Model A engine. We knew at the time that Henry Ford was working with Sheldrick on the design of a new engine, that no one knew too much about it. Although we were in one big room, things were held quite confidential. Due to the strict deportment that everyone pursued in the Company, you didn't wander around out of your place of business too much to find out what the other fellow was doing, you paid strict attention to your own job.

In April, 1927, I was called down to the north end of the big room at the dynamometer section, there was Sorensen, Martin, and Edsel Ford. They showed me an engine that was running on the block. It looked something like the Model T. At least, it had four cylinders. On it they had a vaporizer which was used to distribute the fuel to the various cylinders.

Sorensen did most of the talking. He said, "Well, Hicks, we've got here an engine which is 203 cubic inches." (the Model T was 176, so it was a larger engine than the Model T.) He said, "It is only developing 22 horsepower, you have had pretty good success in developing, power out of engines. If we should give you charge of the development, how much could you get up?"

Well, I took the slide rule, that I always carried, out of my pocket and did a few calculations. I said, "I think I can get you 40 horsepower out of this engine".

All three of them drew long breaths at that time because they were only getting 22, and they were really in quite a predicament. Sorensen said something then that he probably never remembered fifteen minutes later. He said, "Well, Hicks, you've never amounted to much in the Ford Motor Company. Oh, you got the aircraft job, but you've never really been a big shot. How long will it take you to get it?"

I said, "Well, in about three weeks."

He said, "If you can get us 40 horsepower in three weeks, I'll make you the biggest man in the Ford Motor Company."

I could tell that Edsel, although he was anxious to get the 40 horsepower, did not entirely approve of what Sorensen had said.

At any rate, I started in. Without saying anything to any one because it was more or less a secret, and using Carl Schultz to draw up a manifold, we got our first Y-type manifold.

I had used, in calculating the manifolds, certain principles that I had obtained from Colonel Hail way back on the Liberty engine. We got the manifold out, as I remember, in about seven days, working day and night to get the casting made and so forth. Then I went to my friend Howard Menwering who was in the Zenith Carburetor Company and got from him a carburetor to put on the job. (Article continued in the May publication.)

Leaking Cork Seal

I was reading through the articles in some of the old Restorer magazines and stumbled onto an issue in 1993 where they had encountered a leaking cork seal. The author reported the cork gaskets used at the time were of a poor quality being porous and would let the gas filter through them. The author reported he was able to fix the leaking problem by using adhesive cement, blue or clear silicone, to hold the screen in place and then use the silicone on all the surfaces of the cork gasket. This might be ok for an emergency roadside fix, but with the ethanol gas of today that is a blend of gasoline and alcohol I'm not sure how well the silicone sealant would work.

Recently I was helping a club member, Frank Mowrer, do some work on his car and we took his glass sediment bowl off to clean it out. The screen was removed and Frank replaced the neoprene seal. The neoprene gasket that while deteriorated, was not leaking. We installed a new neoprene gasket that was a perfect fit and it did not leak. We were able to clean the screen that had very little debris. The screen can be difficult to reinstall on the housing. There is a recess in the housing to hold the screen in place that can be a little tough to get in place, but the recess in the housing will hold the screen

and a cement should not be necessary.

Perhaps they didn't have neoprene seals back in 1993, both are available today with the neoprene being about 3 times the cost of a cork gasket, less than \$3 each. My recommendation, keep an extra neoprene seal for future use and leave out the silicone sealant.

What Do You Think?

There is quite a group of members attending the CCRG tour to Cambria. However, those taking Model A's are trailering them and others are driving their modern iron, so there is no organized tour as such.
