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ACCC Update: Electric News!

ACCC Update:

The latest battle to ban the internal combustion engine in California (AB1745) beginning January 1, 2040 is dead. Good news for now, but there certainly is time for some other car hating politician to propose it again by the 2040's. This bill would have prohibited the DMV from registering a new vehicle unless it was a zero-emission vehicle.

The gas tax is on the ballots for November election! Over 940,000 petition signatures were submitted in early May, almost twice the required amount insuring the measure will be on the November ballot. In addition, this ballot measure will also help introduce a constitutional amendment that states that the politicians in Sacramento will be prohibited from raising taxes without a vote from the citizens of California.

One other legislative piece has popped up to keep an eye on—SB993 Services Sales Tax. The Sales and Use Tax Law imposes a tax on retailers measured by the gross receipts from the sale of tangible personal property sold at retail in this state, or on storage, use, or other consumption in this state of tangible personal property purchased from a retailer for storage, use or other consumption in this state. This bill would, on and after January I, 2019 expand the Sales and Use Tax Law to impose a tax on the purchase of services by businesses in California at a specified percentage of the sales price of the service. The bill would require the tax to be collected and remitted by the seller of the purchased services. The bill would exempt certain types of services, including health care services, from the tax and would exempt from the tax a business with gross receipts of less than \$100,000 in the previous four quarters.

SB993 states that the moneys in that fund are to be appropriated to provide tax relief to middle-income and low-income Californians and to assist in securing greater stability for California's infrastructure, its workforce, and its education services, including higher education. The bill would also "state various related findings and declarations"—whatever that means! For passage of this bill, approval of 2/3 of the membership of each house of the legislature is required.

While this appears to be a new services tax that would be charged by one business to another business, it most certainly would have an impact on pricing to consumers for goods or services. The challenge with understanding SB993's true impact on each of us is that lack of definition around what services would be included and how this would trickle down. Reading into the use of the funds, it sounds like they plan to siphon moneys from it for the train to nowhere project. Based on the gross receipts limitation, the bill would be cumbersome to enforce, so maybe this bill will fail on the floor and we won't have to worry about it.

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Starting Procedure/Using Carburetor to Check Engine Timing www.model-a.org

Starting a Model A Ford isn't as simple as in a modern automobile and can be a struggle for a novice. This procedure will help the novice. One must recognize that there were variations in even original Model A Fords. For example, the gas shut off valve was moved from under the dash to under the hood in 1931.

Starting Procedure

- 1. Engage emergency brake by pulling back on it.
- 2. Push lever left of steering wheel (Spark Control) all the way up (Retard)
- 3. Pull lever right of the steering (Hand Throttle) half way down
- 4. Turn Gas Valve under dash on passenger side to open (Pointing down)
- 5. Turn Choke Control Valve (under right side of dash) full clockwise and back off 1/4 turn. If it's quite cold out, it may be better to open a full turn.
- 6. Turn Ignition Switch on (Clockwise)
- 7. Push in clutch and put Transmission in Neutral
- 8. Pull Choke Control Out
- 9. Turn engine over 3 Revolutions Choke in on 3rd Revolution
- 10. When Engine Starts Push Throttle Lever (Right Lever) Up
- 11. Put Left Lever all the way down. (Depending on how your engine is timed, 3/4 down might be better.)
 12. Allow Engine to Warm Up. (The accelerator pedal will need to be used to keep engine running until it
- 12. Allow Engine to Warm Up. (The accelerator pedal will need to be used to keep engine running until it warms up.)
- 13. Turn Choke control (actually GAV) clockwise to smoothest operating condition.
- 14. When starting an engine, which is already warmed up, omit Choke steps.
- 15. Always put Left Lever (Spark Retard Position) all the way up when starting & then down when driving.

16. Have Fun Driving!

Here is one way to check if the engine timing is about where it should be.

Using Carburetor to Check Engine Timing

- I. Increase engine speed to twice that of idle RPM by pulling down the throttle lever at the steering column.
- 2. Gradually open the gas adjusting valve 1/2 to 1 full turn. The engine should start to run richly, and some smoking at the exhaust may occur. This verifies that the fuel passage, regulated by the Gas Adjusting Valve, is open. Turn the GAV clockwise until the engine RPM returns to where it was previously
- Choke & Gas Adjusting Valve

Hand Throttle

Ignition Switch

Gas Shut Off Valve

Spark Advance


- 3. Slowly pull the spark lever down. Engine RPM will increase up to a point. When the maximum RPM is achieved, note this as the position where you will want to place the lever for normal driving purposes.
- 4. Raise the throttle lever up to the top of its travel. The engine should idle smoothly. With the spark lever still in its "ideal" position for everyday driving, go around the car to the carburetor and ram the accelerator control rod (i.e., from the accelerator linkage) forward. The engine should accelerate to maximum speed within about two seconds if the engine timing is correct. Don't hold the accelerator rod in this forward position for more than a few seconds, because you could damage your engine. If the engine accelerates smoothly and without stumbling, your idle and ignition settings are correct.
- 5. If acceleration of engine speed is slow or sluggish, ignition timing is probably somewhat retarded. Move the spark rod up to the top of its travel, and adjust the timing. Once the timing has been adjusted, restart the engine, pull down the throttle rod until engine RPM is twice idle RPM, and return to step 3.




