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ACCC Update (Part 1)

The year 2019 has greeted us with many new California laws affecting our beloved hobby and driving in general. The first order of business is the exhaust system modification law—probably not an issue for your Model A, but many of us have a few other toys in the garage. California Assembly Bill (A.B.) 1824, which was signed into law by then-Governor Jerry Brown in June of 2018 went into effect on January 1, 2019. The bill has generated significant concern among the online enthusiast community. Despite what is being circulated, enactment of A.B. 1824 does not change existing laws pertaining to exhaust noise or sale and installation of aftermarket exhaust systems.

Under existing law, exhaust systems installed on motor vehicles with a manufacturer's gross vehicle weight rating of less than 6,000 pounds, other than motorcycles, may not exceed a sound level of 95-decibels when tested under Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) test procedure J1169 (May 1998). This was not changed. A.B. 1824 amended how excess exhaust noise violations are handled by law enforcement. Beginning this year, a vehicle cited for violating the current exhaust noise law will no longer receive what is known as a "fix-it" ticket. Instead, violations will result in an immediate, and steep fine of \$1,000 each time stopped.

Consumers in receipt of a violation still have the option of seeking a certificate of compliance from the California Bureau of Automotive Repair (BAR) demonstrating that their exhaust emits no more than 95- decibels. This SEMA-sponsored program allows courts to dismiss citations for exhaust systems that have been tested and for which a certificate of compliance has been issued. There is a petition to nullify fines for loud mufflers. Here is a hyperlink to the petition:

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Distributor Lubrication

Recently I received a distributor housing a couple days before our March seminar. The shaft was seized to the bushings and the tab had broken off the lower end of the shaft. An attempt to remove the shaft was unsuccessful, the shaft was seized in the bushings. Fortunately the housing had not cracked as it could have easily resulted in cracking or breaking at the upper area from an uneven loading while pressing on the shaft from the bottom. I used a bearing separator clamped in the groove for the



retainer screw that holds the housing in the cylinder head. I was able to press the shaft out without damage to the housing. I removed the bushings and it appears the distributor can be rebuilt to a good working component once again.

Looking at the shaft it has a lubrication hole at the top and the screw holding the cam was drilled. Most of the distributor shafts made and sold from the Model A parts dealers currently have the hole drilled to better lubricate the upper bushing. To access this lubrication point the Distributor cap and rotor need to be removed. A few drops of oil



here. I removed the oil cup from the outside of the housing and found the hole from the oil cup in the housing was not plugged. Examining the shaft, it appeared the shaft had very little wear indicating this distributor might have been rebuilt recently. The housing was clean and appeared to have been bead blasted and painted to prevent rust. Fortunately the bushings remained tight in the housing and no damage occurred to the housing. Ford recommends oil should be added to the distributor cup every 500 miles, Service Bulletins page 246. I always lift the hood on my Model A before I leave the garage, check the oil and water, and especially if I know I am going to fill up with gas, lubricate my distributor before I startup and leave. A little oil can go a long way to prevent a breakdown if done often enough.

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



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
Jim's Tech Tip

Water In The Battery???



Yes, if your Model A battery has caps that you can remove to see inside, you need to add water to the cells on a regular basis. Charging the battery boils the water off while you drive. If the plates inside the battery are exposed to air, it ruins them and reduces your battery's storage capacity. So you need to check the water level about once a month.

Unfortunately the battery access plate in the front floorboard provides a small opening to work through. Not very easy to add water to each cell. I've tried pouring water in from above and just made a mess!



Remember that this is sulfuric acid in the battery. Don't splash it up by spraying the water into the cell too fast. Don't let the end of the hose go into the acid. Please wear safety glasses while working around a battery.


